BRITISH LEADERS' SONS WILL TAKE THEIR OWN COURSE

Oliver Baldwin and Malcolm MacDonald To Stand For Election As Laborites

LONDON, Oct. 16—Oliver Baldwin, 32 year old son of the Conservative leader, is one who does not follow in the footsteps of his political father.

He has announced his acceptance of the Labor party's nomination for the house of commons from Chatham. He will campaign on a straight issue versus capitalism. Thus he will be arrayed against Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin, his father, who is supporting the National government.

Malcolm MacDonald has backed his father, Rt. Hon. Ramsay MacDonald through his controversy with the Laborites but will seek re-election as a candidate of that party. His sister, Isabel, is not a candidate for parliament, but is campaigning for her father in his rebellious constituency.

Megan Lloyd George is stumping the country in support of Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George's Liberal principles and is seeking to retain her own seat. Arthur Henderson, Jr., is a Labor member of the house and so far as is known will cling to his father's party in the election.

Handclasp End In Death

CHICAGO, ILLS. Oct. 19.—Malt Kolb, gambling and liquor czar of the Northwest side, was shot to death yesterday, while the assassin's accomplice grasped the victim's hand in cordial greeting.

The killing occurred in Kolb's Morton Grove, Roadhouse, which which, police said, was invaded five months ago to the day by Capone hoodlums carrying an ultimatum to the ex-associate of Jack and George "Bugs" Moran to "clear out of the district."

The killing, as reconstructed by police after questioning witnesses, occurred about 4 A. M. Two men arrived at the Kolb roadhouse in an automobile and after being admitted by the doorman, they walked across the dance floor to where Kolb stood beside a door.

"Hello, Matt," said one of the men, extending his hand. "Hello," replied Kolb, recognizing the two. One of the men, holding Kolb's hand in a tight grip, whispered something that made Kolb chuckle and leaned closer. While the grip was maintained, the other man pressed a pistol against Kolb's head and fired five shots.

The assassins started to depart, then apparently fearing the wounds had not been fatal walked back and fired several more shots into the prostrate body. Then they left.

Attempt To Beat Altitude Record

BRUSSELS, October 19.—An attempt to beat his own world record for altitude will be made next spring by Professor Piccard, who made the memorable balloon ascent to ten miles above the earth last May.

The same balloon and instruments will be used in the next ascent, but a lighter gondola, made of aluminum, is being constructed, which Professor Piccard believes will enable the balloon to climb even higher than ten miles.

The expedition will be financed by the Belgian national fund for scientific research.

"Dead" Boy Comes Home

LONDON, October 19.—Having attended this son's funeral four years ago, Mr. and Mrs. George Miller, of Radnor Park, received a considerable shock when the "dead" lad walked into their house the other night.

Six years ago their son left home, and two years later Mrs. Miller identified the body of a boy, who had been killed in a street accident, as her missing son. The dead boy was buried in the local cemetery and a tablet was erected to his memory.

But the real George Miller, who is now 18, was alive in Ayrshire and had never heard the news of his own death. Police are now trying to discover the identity of the boy who was buried in Kilbowie cemetery.

Locomotive's New Record

LONDON, October, 19.—The world's record of 78 miles per hour, held by the Canadian Pacific, by nearly ten miles per hour.

The record made on the Swin-gon Paddington run, which is 77 1/2 miles. The "Launceston Castle" steamed into Paddington Station with her train behind her on her first run over this line, having made the journey in 59 minutes and 30 seconds. Yale Gets Historic Papers

NEW HAVEN, Conn., Oct. 19.—Original copies of three proclamations dealing with the restoration of Charles II to the throne of England in 1660 and punishment of the regicides have survived nearly three centuries of time and found their way into Sterling Memorial library at Yale. The university announced yesterday.

Two are proclamations of Charles II. Demanding the surrender of certain members of the court which sentenced and carried out the execution of his father. The other dated May 18, 1660, was issued by the House of Lords two weeks before the return of the king to power and ordered the seizure of the persons and estates of certain named judges.

The names mentioned in the proclamations include Edward Whalley, William Goff and John Dixwell. Whalley and Goff were concealed by friends in New Haven when they were sought here. Dixwell lived here several years.

NOTHING WRONG RADICALLY SAYS BEATTY

C. P. R. President In Optimistic Address Stresses Need of Wisdom, Prudence And Courage In Present Crisis.

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 19.—"None of the fundamentals have changed. Canada is still a great country with actual and potential wealth of great magnitude," declared E. W. Beatty, Chancellor of McGill University, in responding to the toast of "McGill" at a monster graduate dinner here tonight.

"It can be said of Canadians, who are far from being a boastful people, that they are steady, level-headed and prone to meet their difficulties confidently and without hysteria," Mr. Beatty continued. "I believe Canada is showing more of this spirit today than ever in its history, and if the greatness of a nation can be judged by the fibre of its people, this Dominion is already a great nation. We have suffered for two years as we have never suffered, and though, because the difficulties are facing us, they may appear to be greater difficulties than ever experienced before, still it is undeniable that the problems we are meeting are new and they weigh heavily upon the citizens of this country. But if one can get away from the gloom which seems to prevail in all financial centres, and go through Canada as I have recently done, and observe and talk to those, particularly in the west, who have their own immediate and serious problems, one cannot but be impressed with the fact that there is nothing about this country that is radically wrong or anything that is not capable of solution, given wisdom, prudence and courage."

Civil Servants Set Example In Alberta

EDMONTON, Alta., Oct. 19.—The Alberta civil servants will co-operate in assisting the province to meet its present financial difficulties through voluntary salary contributions on a "graduating scale," premier J. E. Brownlee stated tonight.

The contributions will be turned over to augment the province's unemployment relief fund.

The statement came from the Premier when he was asked to amplify his reference this afternoon to "a close analysis of the whole financial situation of the province by the government and a group of civil servants."

This body, comprising the civil servants provincial executive, together with government representatives is making a study of all the angles incidental to the present financial situation, Mr. Brownlee said.

The scale of contributions will have the same effect as reductions in salary, the Premier stated. The survey of the group is a continuous study and its reports are made to the government from time to time.

How soon its recommendations will be adopted and made final by the government the Premier was not prepared to state.
