Canada's Amateur Players Compete

OTTAWA, Nov. 28.—A nationwide competition for amateur dramatic societies of Canada has been arranged, under the distinguished patronage of the Earl of Bessborough, Governor-General of the Dominion, to culminate in a festival of drama in Ottawa in May or June of next year.

Representatives of amateur players in six provinces were present at a meeting held in Rideau Hall, residence of the Governor-General, at which it was decided to proceed with the enterprise.

Under the tentative plan of operation there will be regional contests of amateur players, to be completed by the end of January. Winners in this primary stage then will be eligible for provincial competition, to be concluded by Easter, and the nine provincial champion groups will compete at Ottawa for a trophy emblematic of national dramatic honors.

LONDON, Nov. 28.—His Majesty will broadcast a Christmas address throughout the Empire this year from his estate at Sandringham, on Christmas Day.

Speeches at official functions by His Majesty have been carried over the air and from these it has been noted the King has an excellent wireless voice, clear and easily audible.

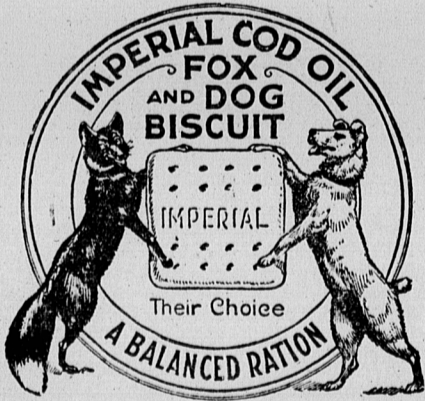

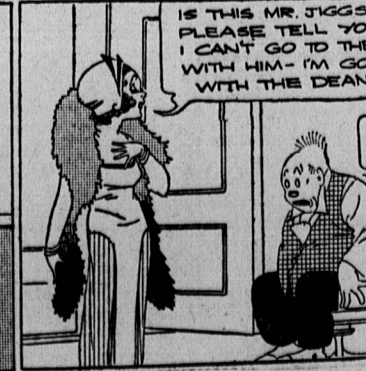
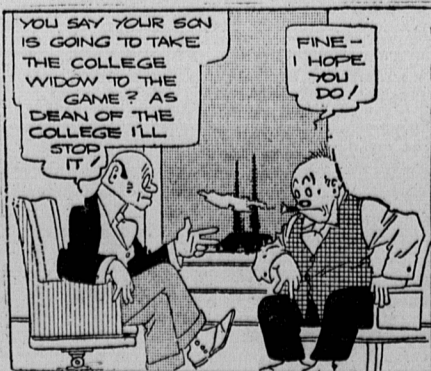
