U. M. W. Start Study Of New Wage Demands

Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, N.S. Oct. 31 (CP)—United Mine Workers (C.I.O.) district 26 convention tonight began a detailed study of new wage demands, including a \$2.50 daily increase and a 40-hour week.

The 10-point program, laid before the convention by its scale and policy committee, embodied the nucleus of demands to be negotiated with the employers of the bulk of the union's 13,000 miners in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

Aim of the negotiations will be a new contract effective next Feb. 1. The current contract calls for basic daily wages of \$5.84 and a 44-hour week.

Shortly after the committee's recommendations were made known today, the 88 delegates approved demands for the \$2.50 increase and for payment of time and a half for work over 40 hours in one week or over eight hours in one day.

But they sent back for re-consideration the clause on wage demands with directions that the committee recommend an additional wage boost for shooters and men employed at the coal face.

Shooters and loaders are paid by the ton of coal they produce. Several delegates declared that men at the coal face earned no more than fatal-paid men although their jobs were considerably more difficult.

Says Co-operation Purely Economic

OTTAWA, Oct. 31 (CP)—Karol Swierozowski, Poland's vice-minister of national defence, said today his country's "co-operation" with Russia is purely economic and that Poland has no political party comparable to the Soviets' Communists.

In Canada for a brief goodwill visit, the general said in an interview that Poland now has complete freedom of religion and that all Roman Catholic churches seized during the German occupation have been returned to their owners.

Polish authorities used no censorship on the dispatches of foreign correspondents in the country. "I think this is one of the reasons that untruthful impressions are going out of Poland today."

Through an interpreter, Gen. Swierozowski said: "There is no Communist Party in Poland and no tendency to create one. The pro-war Communist Party has been liquidated."

Approve Applications For Wage Increases

TORONTO, Oct. 31 (CP)—Silly Barrett, Canadian director of District 50 of the United Mine Workers of America (A.F.L.), today announced that the Ontario War Labor Board has approved applications for wage increases at the Toronto plant and various plant of Canadian Industries Limited and at the Sarnia plant of the Dow Chemical Company.

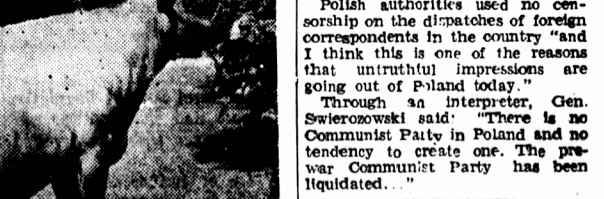
The increases amount to an average of about 10 cents an hour for some 250 Toronto workers and 50 employees at Sarnia. The Sarnia increase, retroactive to July 27, brings the minimum wage in the plant to 77 cents an hour. The Toronto increase brings the minimum to 70 cents.

OTTAWA, Oct. 31 (CP)—The Office of Price Administration at Washington today announced that American ceilings on pulpwood imported from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Quebec were being lifted on the ground that Canadian selling prices were sufficient to insure satisfactory price controls.

Canadian pulpwood ceiling prices, which range from \$5.50 to \$18.25 a cord, apply only in those three provinces.
