Chief Census Commissioner Duff of Quebec thinks the population of Canada has increased by about 25 per cent since 1891 and is now over six millions. But THE GUARDIAN thinks he is half a million at least too high. We shall see what we shall see.

In India, by the census of ten years ago there were over six millions more males than females. In Germany, France and the United Kingdom there was then in each approximately a million more females than males. In Russia the sexes are very nearly equal in numbers with a slightly greater number of males than females. Canada had ten years ago 87,707, more males, and the United States at the same time about a million and a half more males than females.

In a recent issue of Harper's Weekly are a series of cuts showing four street views in Havana, contrasting the appearance and condition of the roadways and sidewalks as they were in 1899 and as they are in 1901. The improvement is so remarkable and striking as to show most vividly the great work wrought by American energy, taste and sanitary knowledge. The change is marvellous and it has been wrought in spite of an incalculable amount of open opposition and silent, sullen inertia on the part of the resident population. It is well for Cuba and the world that the Spanish Island has fallen into American hands. Cuba Libre is at least freer from dirt and disease than ever before, an important part of her new freedom.

Andrew Carnegie's castle in the Scottish Highlands is a splendid pile known as Skibo Castle. It is situated in Sutherland, one of the two northernmost counties. It is an old baronial residence of the sixteenth century, enlarged and modernised at a cost of \$200,000. It is described as an admirable and health-giving location in summer, though in the winter it is bleak and cold, with snow-covered land and a wild and boisterous sea. Skibo Castle in the olden days was the residence of a grange of the bishops of Sutherland and Caithness, and thereafter was for a long time a fortress. The celebrated Marquis of Montrose, who was defeated by the Presbyterians at Bonar Bridge in 1653, was kept a prisoner in Skibo. Subsequently the fort was dismantled but was rebuilt early in the past century. The nearest railway station is seven miles distant.

The death of Judge King of the Supreme Court of Canada removes from life's activities one of the foremost men that New Brunswick has produced. He was born at St. John in 1839, educated at Sackville, called to the bar in 1865 and two years later was elected to the New Brunswick Legislature, of which he soon became the leader. He was an eloquent pleader, a powerful and convincing speaker and a very bold and progressive legislator. Against the strongest opposition he carried the Free Schools Act of 1870 and put it in operation. Later he passed the Municipal Act, transferring the government of the counties from the irresponsible Justices of the Peace to elective Councils. He was unsuccessful in an election for the Commons and was appointed to the Supreme Court of New Brunswick in 1880, and thirteen years later was appointed to the Supreme Court of Canada. His death vacates a high position, to be filled from either New Brunswick or P.E. Island. The late Judge King was a prominent member of the Methodist Church. During the time of his residence in St. John he was a regular attendant at Centenary Church, where three of the six Judges of the Supreme Court were at the same time pew-holders. These were Justices Tuck, (now Chief Justice) Palmer and King. The then Premier of the Province, Hon. A. G. Blair and Mr. A. A. Stockton then leader of the provincial Opposition also regularly attended the same church.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

In continuing the debate Mr. McDonald contended that 15 years ago there was \$5,000,000 due this Province. Added to the above was the interest of 15 years. Notwithstanding these facts the Government of the Province has relinquished all or the greater part of it. He was sure that Sir Louis Davies did all in his power. But he did not do it when the Conservatives were in power. He showed at that time that party spirit was very strong. The Conservatives of the Province were not jealous but were looking after the interests of the Province. If

We read of the preparations made in Ottawa, Montreal, Toronto, Halifax and St. John for the reception and entertainment of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall during their visit to Canada next fall. We do not yet know whether or not Prince Edward Island will be included in the royal visit, but we trust that it may be, and that the fact may be learned in time for adequate preparation to be made. It would be unfortunate that this loyal Province should be omitted from the route. Our people all have a natural desire to see their future King and Queen while yet they are young. It is a most pleasant recollection that King Edward visited the Island in 1860. How rare such visits are and must be shown by the fact that the late Prince of Wales now King, was Heir Apparent during the long period of fifty eight years and yet only once visited this part of the Empire. The inference is plain that if the Royal Duke and Duchess do not on this occasion visit Prince Edward Island the opportunity to do so may never occur again. The Empire is so vast that it is not practicable for the Sovereign or even for the Heir to the Throne to make its circuit at more than rare intervals. We therefore trust that every effort will be put forth to secure an extension to the Island of the royal visit to be made within a few months to come.

the amount of the subsidy was \$100,000 he would be more pleased.

In referring to the system of education he believed that the districts should have remained as in the year 1877. There are entirely too many districts at the present time and the amalgamation of many of the schools would be beneficial to all branches concerned. In dealing with the fishery award he claimed that Sir Louis Davies should put the Island in a better position than when the award was made. He wished to impress the members from Charlottetown that 28 members only received \$20,000 to expend outside of the City limits. The Opposition were in favor of the Hillsboro Bridge but were not in favor of paying for it out of the small revenue of the Province.

Captain Reid in continuing the debate said it was remarkable to hear the Conservatives talking about making revenue and expenditure meet. They have drawn \$100,000 from capital account forever. In referring to the increasing of the patients in the Insane Hospital he pointed out that the birth rate of P. E. Island is greater than in any other Province. Prince Edward Island is ubiquitous all over the face of the earth. In dealing with the road act he thought that perhaps there would be some friction but the "hot boxes" would be cleaned out and everything would resolve smoothly. He hoped that all companies that bring people into the country would not be driven out with taxation. He referred particularly to the tourist traffic. The effect of the tax upon the commercial travellers will only mean that the best men representing the best firms will visit this Province selling their goods more cheaply. The money raised by debentures is giving the farmers the use of their own money at 3 1/2 per cent, so long as the money is properly spent and the credit of the province not injured it is perfectly correct. The expenditure made for education is very small when it is realized that it comes out of the general fund. He said the claim made by the Conservatives in reference to our claims was outrageous. The interest upon \$5,000,000 for fifteen years would be \$250,000 a year for no fulfilment of winter communication, sufficient to pay for the produce exported in what is known as the closed season. No wonder they were sent home when they made such an outrageous demand. The proper way to construct public works was to issue debentures with a sinking fund. The Opposition's action at the last session of the Legislature in regard to the Hillsboro Bridge was one of the stock arguments at the last Provincial election. Notwithstanding all their argument at that time they now state that they did oppose the construction of Bridge. He reviewed the days before and leading up to confederation and the introduction of the railway bill, the construction of the road, the issuing of debentures cashed at par by the Bank of New Brunswick (Continued on Fifth page.)
