APPEAL TO PROHIBITIONISTS

Sir,—The writer of the article entitled "A Choice of Spirits" in the Temperance Bulletin of the first of March 1928, has furnished as strong evidence as could be produced in the extracts from letters, received from the better class of informers, that the so called Prohibition law, after a trial of 25 years in this Province has failed in the true cause of temperance.

This is not surprising when it is realized that the greatest weakness of human nature today is its selfishness. Again the Prohibition law was conceived in fanaticism and sustained by hypocrisy, it is without the moral sanction for a large and ever growing larger part of the people of this Island. It is class legislation because under the provisions of the law certain people who can afford to pay for a doctor's certificate and the high cost of liquor (consequent on the excessively high duty imposed by the Federal Government) can get all the liquor they want and the poor class

fraternize the run-runner, boot-logger or moonshiner, who in consequence of the high duty, can afford to sell cheaper than the Government vendor, and make a huge profit.

Amongst the passages quoted from some of the many letters received by the Temperance Alliance, is the following: "Can't you send the officer? My boy is drinking himself to death. The boy doubtless obtained the liquor from one of the many "speakeasy dens" existing throughout the Island, where not only this woman's boy but many more young men are being received by being compelled to consume the contents of a whole bottle of liquor—and vile stuff at that—in the dens because of the fear of being found with it and severely punished under the existing law.

All the Provinces in Canada except Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island have seen the wisdom of trying some other means of protecting the "weaker brother." The government vendors in the Provinces that have adopted government control sell good liquor and have diverted a large amount of the profits made by the illegal sale of liquor to the treasuries of these Provinces—amounts ranging from 2 to 3 million dollars annually. It is true they have not succeeded in putting the run runner, boot-logger and moonshiners entirely out of business because of the excessive duty on liquor till exacted by the Federal Government, but this can be done if the suggestion I will now make is adopted.

As an advocate of the true spirit of temperance I would earnestly advise the leaders in the temperance cause as men of the world and of common sense to try some other line of effort in their laudable work in the cause of temperance. I sug-

gest for their consideration the trial of Government Control under which the "weaker brother" would be "black listed" should he abuse the privilege to use liquor. Again the boys and girls under 21 years of age would also be protected in that they would not be entitled under the law to obtain liquor, of course there would still be the possibility of the "weaker brother" seniors obtaining liquor illegally from the rum-runners, bootleggers and moonshiners. To shut the door to this possibility I would suggest that the Temperance Alliance in all the Provinces approach the Government of their respective Provinces and ask them to urge the Federal Government to reduce the excessively high duty on liquor to a reasonable figure and thus put these illegal sellers out of business. It is only the large profit they can now make that encourages them to run the risk of prosecution under the law. It must always be remembered that the sale of liquor under Government Control would have the moral sanction and support of the people and do away with hypocrisy and lack of respect for the law at present shown by the majority of the people—old and young, rich and poor.

I do not think that \$200,000 a year would be an excessive estimate of revenue that would be diverted from the illegal sale of liquor in this Province which amount could be usefully employed by the government in improving the roads. Further when it is possible to obtain a straightforward drink of beer or light wine the people who are forced to drink the vile stuff at present sold by the illegal sellers, will take the less harmful beverage—and not only so but when the roads are put into good order and it is possible for visitors of the Island to obtain a drink honestly bought will, I predict, flock to the Island to see the beauties of it, especially if an up to date motor service is inaugurated as will be possible when the roads are made substantial enough to "stand up" to such traffic, and the farmers will have good roads for the transportation of the produce of their farms.

It is the wish of all Canadians to have British settlers come into Canada—successive Federal Governments have realized that Britishers accustomed to take an honest drink of beer are averse to come to a place where this privilege is denied them. I feel quite sure that as soon as Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island follow the example of the other Provinces of Canada and adopt Government Control of the sale of liquor the Federal Government will readily accede to the request of the Provincial Governments for a reduction in the duty on liquor.
