The dog, which is a French bull, was given to its owner, George R. Wadsworth, Jr., on Christmas day. Recently, the puppy suffered a throat infection, and as its condition did not improve under the treatment of Cleveland veterinarians, the boy's father, to relieve his son's anxiety, brought the patient to Boston, travelling in a drawingroom of the Twentieth Century Limited.

The puppy has the services of a special attendant and the comforts of a private room, and has so much improved on its diet of whites of eggs, cream and whiskey that it is now able to take occasional walks through the corridor. Daily bulletins are sent to the little boy in Cleveland and he is very happy to learn of the favorable condition of the pet.

**ABANDON STEAMER HEMMED IN BY ICE.**

CHICAGO, March 11—A woman and two men passengers on the steamer Flora M. Hill and a crew of thirty men deserted the vessel today when it began to sink after being crushed by ice. The refugees started out to make their way over five miles of ice to the mainland. The Flora M. Hill has been icebound for a week. Life-savers and the steamer Indiana put out in an effort to render assistance to the refugees.

Special services will be conducted in the North Winsloe Methodist Church next week commencing on Monday and lasting until Friday evening when they will close. The services will be in charge of Rev. L. J. Watson, the pastor, and will commence each evening at seven o'clock.

Much interest is manifested in the Church Union vote which is at present being taken in the various Methodist and Presbyterian congregations in Charlottetown and in this province. The vote as recorded in other churches of these denominations in other provinces is being closely followed to obtain the trend of the sentiment abroad. The following are recent reports from St. John's Church union voting was completed in St. David's and Carleton Presbyterian churches and continued in Fairville Presbyterian and Centenary Methodist churches yesterday. The result in the two Presbyterian churches showed them to be almost equally divided on the question, as follows: St. David's, elders for, 6; elders against, 6; members for, 10; members against, 10; total for, 16; total against, 16. Carleton: For union, 53; against union, 47; for proposed basis, 29; against basis, 40. Fairville will be the last Presbyterian church of the city to be counted and the vote has been so close that on the result in this church will have a bare majority in the six city churches. The voting in the Methodist churches will continue during March and April.

The Reid Newfoundland steamer Bruce arrived at North Sydney yesterday afternoon after a forty hour trip from St. John's. The steamer called at Port Aux Basques on the way over and took on board at that point a number of passengers and some freight. This is the first trip of the Bruce to the regular summer calling port. On the run across the south coast of Newfoundland the ship steamed and hunted her way through unusually heavy fields of drift ice, the heaviest, perhaps, that have visited the shores of the colony in a quarter of a century. Up to the time the Bruce left Port Aux Basque no cross country train had arrived at that point from St. John's. It is now upwards of a month since an express made the cross country trip the line being impassable owing to the deep snow drifts which piled high on the rails as storm succeeded storm. February was a hard month on traffic in the interior of the island. The government steamer Stanley reached port yesterday afternoon at 6.30, from Halifax. The Stanley will take the mails to the Magdalen Islands. The steamer made the trip to the islands once already this winter. The ship entered the drift ice some miles off the harbor entrance and had considerable difficulty in forcing her way through. She will likely sail tomorrow.—Sydney exc. (The Stanley was formerly of the port of Charlottetown and the new Bruce is earning quite a reputation as an ice fighter. She is similar to the Minto in appearance and is intended for heavy work in ice.)

Rev. E. S. Weeks, Mt. Stewart, has decided to accept the invitation of the Official Board of the Church to return for a third year—subject to the voice of Conference in June next.

Miss Ella Schurman, and her sister Mrs. McLure of Summerside, also Mrs. J. W. Callbeck and Frank and George Callbeck, were among those who visited the Seed Fair in Charlottetown yesterday.

The lecture on Scotland, with stereoscopic views, which was to be delivered in New Glasgow Hall by the Rev. H. R. Bell on Monday evening last has been postponed until Friday March 15th.

Rev. Wm. Lawson of Marysville, N. B., supplied recently in St. John for Rev. Mr. Berrie who has been ill, but who, his friends in this Province will hear with pleasure, is improving.

The Moncton Transcript reports that while coming out of church recently, Miss Pietman, sister of Mrs. (Rev.) S. T. Teed, who is well known in this Province, had the misfortune to fall receiving severe injuries.

Mrs. (Prof.) C. M. Wright, Charlottetown, left last evening for Amherst to join her husband, Mrs. Wright, who will be greatly missed by her large circle of acquaintances, was the recipient of a purse of gold from her lady friends in Charlottetown, as a mark of appreciation.
