Annual Meeting The Maritime Women's Club of Montreal Inc.

At the annual meeting of the Maritime Women's Club of Montreal, Incorporated, held Tuesday night in Tudor Hall, Montreal, the President, Mrs. A. D. Ross, expressed her pleasure and gratification in the growth of the Club during the past two years. To the many other activities were added public speaking and dramatics, and a definite interest is developing in civic affairs.

Miss Florence A. Sutherland, Treasurer, in her report showed that the Club's finances were in a satisfactory state after donations were made to the following: Save the Children Fund; Canadian Red Cross; Family Welfare; Montreal Boy's Association; Montreal Children's Library; School for Crippled Children; Art Association of Montreal; Anti-Tuberculosis League; Mackay Institute for the Blind; Salvation Army; Old Brewery Mission; and the Women's Voluntary Services.

Total receipts for the year were \$3,338.00. The membership stands at 291 members. In addition to 1200 scholarships were provided for, totalling \$200, Miss E. Jean Ellis, winner of the scholarship granted to the McGill School for Graduate Nurses, was a guest at the meeting, and in a few well chosen words told of her work, and expressed her thanks to the Club Members. The other three scholarships were given to Dalhousie, Mount Allison and Acadia Universities.

Mrs. A. J. Moore, Chairman of the Committee who visits the Military Hospital at St. Anne de Bellevue, makes certain at each of the 24 annual visits, that all the Maritime ex-service men are contacted, and receive the gifts and comforts distributed. \$653.00 from Club funds was spent during the year; in addition to which 60 Christmas baskets were packed and presented, the content of which had been selected and wrapped by individual members of the Club. Mrs. Moore stated that while at present there were only 55 men on the visiting list since we began visiting the Hospital two and one-half years ago 470 different Maritime men have been cheered by the visit of this committee. Mrs. Moore and her committee wrote numerous letters to the families of these men, as well as entertaining a number of men at their homes at times when they were allowed to leave the Hospital for a few hours.

Mrs. A. J. Boyd, Chairman of the Personal Parcels for Britain has been sending one box a month to five needy families in Britain. In all 50 parcels have been sent this year at a cost of \$25.00. This is in addition to any parcels which individual members are forwarding.

The Ways and Means Committee under the Chairmanship of Mrs. H. T. Mitchell, planned and executed during the year a Marathon Bridge, a Telephone Bridge, and a very successful sale of handwork and home cooking.

The Red Cross group still meet regularly to aid in preparing surgical dressings and other articles needed in the peace time work of the Red Cross. During the year this Group sponsored two very enjoyable teas, the funds from which were used to purchase life certificates in the Club for Miss Sarah Isabel Livingston and Mrs. A. B. S. DeWolf for their outstanding services to the Club and also to the Red Cross. These certificates were presented by the President, Mrs. A. D. Ross.
