CONFLICT OF OPINION IS MANIFESTED

In Report of Conciliation Board Which Heard Application of Can. Railways for a 10 Per cent. Decrease in Wages of Employees.

PARIS, Dec. 2.—League of Nations officials were agitated tonight by reports that Japan will demand the evacuation from Manchuria of the Chinese civil government as well as the Chinese army.

Dr. Alfred Sze, Chinese spokesman, explained to the twelve neutral members of the council Nanking's desires in regard to the organization of a neutral zone, and reiterated his government's unwillingness to withdraw troops now in Chinchow to positions behind the great wall without guarantees

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MAHATMA CONTRACTS SEVERE COLD

LONDON, Dec. 2.—(A.P.)—Mahatma Gandhi, India's Nationalist leader who has braved the chill, damp and fogs of London's weather for the past week in his scanty native costumes, went to bed tonight with a cold and fever.

He was exhausted from his labors at the Indian Round Table Conference, for which he came to London several weeks ago, but before he would go to bed tonight, he insisted upon observing his usual period of evening prayer.

Not only has the Mahatma, who is 63 years old and frail of body, insisted upon wearing his customary join cloth and shawl here, but his diet has been almost as scanty. His conference work was heavier than during the last week, ending with a vigorous speech after midnight yesterday, and the weather has been cold.

The Mahatma had intended leaving London Saturday to return to India by way of Switzerland.

Expected To Reduce Prices Of Newsprint

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 2.—(By the Canadian Press)—The Star today says:

"Canadian newspaper producers are expected to reduce their prices from \$55.50 to \$50 per ton F. O. B. at the consumers door this month it is understood here. The matter of prices has been discussed in group conferences of the larger producers as they have been drawn together here for discussions of the proposed merger of central and eastern Canadian mills. These meetings are again in progress and will be continued at more frequent intervals as the preliminary details are cleared away and the negotiations reach a point where the ultimate formations begin to take form.

Donates \$20,000 In Interests Of Agriculture

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 2.—A letter containing a cheque for \$20,000 to aid in the spreading of agricultural education among the farm boys and girls of Canada has been received by Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture. The gift came from George A. Ramsey, Vice-president and Treasurer of the International Harvester Company. The money goes to the Canadian council on boys' and girls' club work. A permanent trust fund will be established, the income from which will be used in furthering the extension and usefulness of the movement.

Will Negotiate For Separate Trade Treaty

(Special to the Guardian) OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 2.—Hon. Harry H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce accompanied by his secretary K. G. Chamberlain and William Gilchrist, tariff officer of that department, will sail from Vancouver on Dec. 19 on the Canadian Pacific steamer Empress of Asia for Honolulu where he will negotiate with Hon. Downie Stewart, Minister of Finance for New Zealand a separate trade treaty with that Dominion, according to present plans. In addition to a new deal with New Zealand, it is understood Mr. Stevens will endeavor to negotiate more advantageous trade arrangements with the Fiji Islands.

A Five Million Cut In Public Expenditure

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 2. (By the Canadian Press)—Addressing a luncheon gathering held under the auspices of the Liberal-Conservative business men's club today, Hon. W. H. Price, Attorney-General and acting Premier of Ontario, announced a slash of public expenditure to the extent of about \$5,000,000 for the coming year, closer provincial supervision over municipal expenditure and a closer check on the activities of Communists in Ontario. The luncheon was attended by several hundred men and women, including the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, former Premier of Canada.

MACHINE GUN BULLETS USED IN CAPTURE

Rum Runners Lose 1,200 Cases of Liquor In Battle With Coast Guard off U. S. Coast.

(Canadian Press) WESTPORT, Mass., Dec. 2.—A motorboat was showered with machine gun bullets and sank, thirteen men were arrested and 1,200 cases of liquor, which police said were valued at \$100,000, seized as three branches of the law swept down on alleged rum runners early today.

The motorboat Star, out of New Bedford, burned and went down off Horse Neck Beach after a chase by a coast guard speedboat and her crew of seven were arrested. Six other men were captured and the liquor seized at a cottage on the shore here during a raid by coast guardsmen, customs officers and Westport policemen. A group of about fifteen men escaped during the raid.

Strike Ends

P.E. ISLAND DELEGATES PRESENT CASE

Local Board of Trade Men Ask For Fair Treatment Re Train Service — Congratulated By Ry. Commission On Manner In Which Application Was Placed Before Board.

TRURO, N. S., Dec. 2.—Two applications on behalf of the town of Truro for subways under crossings, and one set forth by the Prince Edward Island Board of Trade for re-establishment of two train connections were heard here today by the Canadian Board of Railway Commissioners, assistant chief commissioner Dr. S. J. McLean sitting as Chairman, with Hon. T. C. Norris, in association.

Truro seeks a subway under the Bogleman crossing on the Halifax road, and under Forrester Street, where the C. N. R. mainline bisects the town. In all three cases Alastair Fraser, K.C., Counsel for the railway, declared lack of funds explained the railway's non-concurrence in the request.

Island Application

The Prince Edward Island application was based on a brief presented by R. E. Mutch and George J. Tweedy, who were complimented by the chairman on the manner in which their case was placed before the board. They sought reinstatement of trains 41 and 42, cancelled

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Fire Near Alberton Causes Heavy Loss

George Clark of Hills River near Alberton lost his valuable barn, the head of a prize herd of Guernsey cattle and some of the cows, two valuable horses, his entire crop and farm machinery and a newly erected machine house on Tuesday evening by fire of unknown origin. The men had been working that afternoon crushing grain and had only left the barn about 15 minutes when they saw flames issuing from the building. The loss was all abate when they opened the barn doors.

The Alberton fire brigade came out and rendered what assistance they could and were the means of saving Mr. Clark's residence. The roof of the house caught several times and some of the furniture was damaged. The fire was discovered about 5:30 p. m. and in a short time the buildings were in ruins.

ISLANDER DIES IN ST. JOHN

He is survived by his wife, formerly Miss Mary Irene Connell, daughter of William T. Connell, of this city; three sons, Ralph S. Hayes, of Toronto; W. Harold Hayes, of the staff of the Vocational School in Saint John, and Dr. R. T. Hayes, of this city; and four daughters, Mrs. G. D. Steel, of Charlottetown, P. E. Island; Mrs. R. C. Cream, of Quebec, and Misses Helen and Margaret Hayes, at home. He also leaves one brother and three sisters.

Bryson of Lethbridge, organizer of the Miners' Union, who was sentenced to 30 days in jail on a vagrancy charge on Oct. 21 by Magistrate D. Banatyne.

Patterson of Ontario, in the Herefords breeding cattle competition, Canadian entrants in the breeding sheep division of the Lincoln breed made a clean sweep of all award in that class at the International Livestock Exhibition today.

H. M. Lee of Highgate, Ont., led the way with five firsts, and from which he took two championships, and a reserve, while R. S. Robson and Son, Denfield, Ont., followed close on Lee's heels with three firsts from which they took one reserve.

PLEADS GUILTY TO BRIBERY

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 2.—Lionel Chartrand, of Aylmer, Quebec, pleaded guilty to four charges of accepting bribes to enable applicants to obtain Civil Service positions in the Post Office Department, before Mr. Justice Louis J. Loranger, in the Court of King's Bench today. The prisoner will be sentenced on December 15.

Chartrand's plea of guilty came as a surprise. Georges-Etienne Bergeron and Bernard Gauthier, of Montreal, two co-accused of Chartrand, will stand trial on similar charges in the Court of King's Bench next Monday.

NEW ZEALAND NAT. GOV'T. IS RETURNED

Prime Minister Forbes And Cabinet With One Exception Re-elected.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Dec. 3.—Prime Minister W. W. Forbes' national government was returned to power in the general election on the basis of official returns today and all his Ministers were re-elected except the Minister of Agriculture. The Government lost 9 seats. The United Party lost 1 seat, reform party 9, Independents gained 1 and Labor 5, obtaining a majority of 28 seats. The State party's coalition won 52 seats in Parliament. Labor Party 24, Independents 3 and country party 1. The Coalitionists comprise 28 reform members, 19 united party members and 5 Independents.

D. Jones, sole member of the Cabinet to meet defeat is a member of the Reform Party.
