Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole heir of a man or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made in Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

On a 160-acre homestead, a homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside on the land in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside on the land in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

HON. H. D. McEWEN CONTINUES DEBATE

(Continued.)

HON. H. D. McEWEN having concluded his remarks in regard to the charges which had been made by the Opposition against the Hon. James McNeill, Commissioner of Public Works, last year, while charges, he said, had been proved to be absolutely false and was nothing but a mischievous attempt to secure a victory in the bye-election in Souris, proceeded to deal with the Agricultural Grant in this respect, he said, there had been a great deal of criticism by the Opposition and charged of extravagance and the mis-application of money. "We want criticism, said Mr. McEwen; "We want fair and honest criticism, but we don't want vague charges spread all over the country without foundation. The Opposition make all sorts of charges of extravagance, but when asked to point out a single item on which there has been a needless expenditure, they are silent. It is not fair to discuss matters in this way. It is not honest, it is not gentlemanly to make insinuations and never submit facts. Now, those gentlemen are very glib at finding fault, criticising and making gross charges, but they would just as soon see their great-grandmother's ghost on a dark night as see their own record! They say we have not spent "the Agricultural Grant properly. Well, one of the ablest men in the Dominion of Canada, is I think, if I mistake not, the late Mr. C. C. James, stated that THIS MONEY WAS SPENT TO BETTER ADVANTAGE IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND THAN IN ANY OTHER PROVINCE IN THE DOMINION. And I will take his word and opinion in preference to that of the members of the Opposition. That alone is not spent by us; it is spent under instructions from the Dominion Government and can be spent in no other way except according to the regulations laid down.

The attitude of the Opposition of the Sanatorium, their attitude on the war tax, their attitude on the land scheme, is nothing but opposition for the sake of obstruction. Every one of those measures, intended for the benefit of our soldiers and to uphold the right hand of the Empire, is ruthlessly opposed by the Opposition, but no suggestion is offered as to a better course to adopt. I don't say they are disloyal. They are as loyal as we, and the great Liberal Party in the Province are as loyal as any people in the country, but I must say that the stand of the present opposition in the House is not doing justice to their friends in the country. A great Liberal told me a few days ago "I am ashamed of the stand the party is taking in the House." They have not one suggestion to offer; it is nothing but objections to everything all along the line. I will not say very much more in this connection, because I hope you believe that I will change my course and help those things which are intended for the advancement of the welfare of the Empire in this awful struggle.

Mr. McEwen went on to point out the fallacy of the suggestion of the Opposition that the expenses in connection with the war should be raised by a loan instead of by taxation. He said he was sure the loyal farmers of this province would not agree with the Opposition that it was wise to issue debentures for one dollar on every farm, and the only way the money could be taken out of the ordinary revenue without special taxation would be by starving some Department, either the Education Department or the Public Works or some other department. Would the Opposition undertake to suggest what department should be starved? The Parish claims that there was an enormous deficit. One of the members of the Opposition a year ago advocated a poll tax of \$3 a head on every male over 21 years of age for war purposes. That would mean that a man with three boys would have to pay \$12 in taxes, and yet when it came to a question of voting \$20,000 for war purposes he voted against it.

Mr. McEwen then disposed effectively of the criticism of Mr. Hughes, that there were too many officials. Last year that gentleman was going to produce a list showing where there had been an increase of \$45,000 in salaries, but so far he had not produced that list, because he could not. "The salaries today of the employees of the Government are as low as they can possibly be," said Mr. McEwen, "and I don't know of any person in the employ of the Government whose services can be dispensed with. If the Opposition know of any who will be glad to have their names. Until they mention specific cases I fail to see their remedy."

THE HON. MEMBER FOR WEST RIVER MADE ONE TRUE STATEMENT IN BEING CANDID ENOUGH TO ADMIT THAT THE FINANCES OF THE PROVINCE TODAY ARE IN BETTER CONDITION THAN THEY EVER WERE.

He is the only member in the Opposition who has so far been candid enough to admit that fact.

Mr. McEwen proceeded to say that a statement had been made by a member of the Opposition that a certain amount had come from Ottawa and not credited at the proper time. He said he would take that member back to 1907 to a little incident that took place then. The Public Accounts Committee tried to find out when a certain payment was made to the Government. They asked for the Assistant Provincial Secretary and he appeared before them and said: "Yes, I know, but I won't answer unless they give me permission," and he did not get permission to answer the question. Why? The year ended on 30th September, and they actually credited in the Public Accounts ending September 30th 1907 a sum of \$25,000 that was not received by the Government until two months later.

Speaking on the land settlement scheme, Mr. McEwen said that Sir Robert Borden, as well as Mr. Bonar Law, was very much interested in the scheme of settling returned soldiers, and Sir Robert had communicated with this government on the matter very shortly before he went to London. Every other province in the Dominion, he pointed out, had been doing something in the way of settling returned soldiers, and he would like to know what this government would do. Would the hon. gentlemen opposite suggest something? "Every other province in Canada has the matter under consideration," said Mr. McEwen, "and if you can offer anything better than what the whole Dominion is doing, let us have it. Nova Scotia has very much to offer in the way of settlement scheme, not for soldiers but for immigrants. The government there is a Liberal government about 24 years old and some years ago they spent hundreds of thousands of dollars in buying land, equipping it, building houses and settling immigrants on the land, selling to them on a certain plan of payment. They made an effort, and I don't think the Opposition will find fault with the government of Nova Scotia. But when we start anything of the kind here they immediately start to criticize and oppose it as strenuously as they can, but never suggest where any improvements can be effected. We cannot look ahead far enough, said Mr. McEwen, and see the possibilities of this country and when the war is over hundreds of thousands of soldiers from the British Dominions and those of the Allies will seek a home in Canada. Money will come to Canada, and why should we not get some here? Besides doing our duty to our own boys we might be able to help others in need. In this country there are thousands of acres of waste lands which can be of great value if cultivated. Is it not worth an effort to try to bring those lands into a state of cultivation? The question of increasing the supply of food is a serious one and everything we can do towards that end should be done. The cultivation of these waste lands would solve the problem and prove highly beneficial to the province. There is an agitation in every part of the world to make every acre of land produce its utmost.

Mr. McEwen dealt with the public works, pointing out that the present government had built more permanent public works in its five years than the Liberals did in 20 years, while they had to pay interest on the borrowed money with which their predecessors had built their institutions.

In regard to fisheries Mr. McEwen said he wanted to see the fishermen get full value for their labour. "It is for us," he said, "to work out some kind of plan to ensure that they will get that value of their labour. Just how I can't say, but it will be worked out."

Mr. McEwen said he wanted to see new industries encouraged. He commented on the Report of the Development Commission, which he said was an admirable one, yet it received nothing but sneers from the Opposition. There were suggestions in the Report, he said, which would be dealt with in due course.

In conclusion, Mr. McEwen administered a trenchant rebuke to the Opposition on their petty and contentious obstruction of measures intended for the welfare of the province and of the soldiers especially.

QUARTERLY MEETING OF BOARD OF TRADE

The quarterly meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held last evening, the President Mr. H. R. Hillson presiding. Others present were Messrs E. H. Beer, Secretary; J. O. Hyndman, H. V. Buntain, Isaac Carter, J. E. B. McCready, G. H. Harrison, E. T. Higgs, N. Rattenbury, R. H. Jenkins, R. E. Mutch, James Patton, M. L. A. E. Aitken, J. A. Messervey and J. A. Robertson.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A letter was read from the Minister of Railways acknowledging receipt of the report of the committee on transportation.

The question of standardizing the P. E. Railway was discussed. The general opinion was that the importance of having this work done this summer should be impressed upon the Department as forcibly as possible. It was felt that if the matter was properly represented something could be accomplished. It was thought that it would be well to appoint a committee to confer with the Premier and the Federal representatives from this Province and the other Boards of Trade.

A vote of thanks moved by Mr. H. H. Jenkins, seconded by Mr. J. A. Messervey was tendered unanimously to Messrs E. T. Higgs and J. O. Hyndman for their excellent services in trying to have cars constructed in Charlottetown.

Mr. Hyndman in a few fitting words acknowledged the vote stating that he was glad to know that when they have a little success it is appreciated.

The matter of the widening of the quays was referred to the Council of the Board for consideration.

A communication was read from a western firm anxious to purchase crushed oyster shell, and wanting to know if it would be possible to purchase a charter ship that there was no crushed shell available in any quantity in this Province and that the firm buys it in car-loads from the United States.

The Secretary was instructed to write a suitable reply.

Some discussion followed in reference to harbor improvements. Messrs B. R. Holman, P. W. Turner, Charles Earle and S. C. Moore were nominated for membership in the Board and elected by the casting of a ballot.

Mr. J. O. Hyndman referred to the great advantage of such an industry as that of Bruce Stewart & Co. to the City. The Board of Trade and every business man and all who can do so, should, he declared, do all they can to boost this company, help them to get their new stock and plant and start things humming.

Mr. E. T. Higgs suggested that it would be well to get in touch with the steamship company, which it is understood will run a steamer between Boston, Halifax, and St. John's Nfld., and endeavour to get them to make Charlottetown a port of call. It was decided to act on this suggestion.

It was announced that an offer of \$25,000 had been made by a firm in Quebec for the steamer Harland. Mr. Hyndman in reference to this announced that the deal was off, the offer being declined.

Meeting adjourned.

HALIFAX, April 10.—Captain Eric Dennis has been killed in action on the western battle front, according to a cablegram received here. He was twenty-two years of age and the eldest son of Senator William Dennis of Halifax. He enlisted in 1915 as a Lieutenant and went to England with the second battalion that was recruited in Nova Scotia. He saw much fighting in France, and was recommended three times for the Military Cross and promoted to the rank of captain of the field.
