The Presbytery Of Prince Edward Island

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in annual session on Tuesday, Nov. 3rd in Zion Church Hall, Charlottetown and was opened in due form by the Moderator, Rev. W. O. Rhoad, assisted by Rev. G. Carlyle Webster and Rev. M. E. Genge, D. D.

Those present were Rev. W. O. Rhoad, Moderator, Rev. R. Hensley Staver, Clerk, Rev. Fred Williamson, Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, D. D., Rev. J. Keir Fraser, D. D., Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, Rev. D. L. Griffiths, Rev. J. H. Douglas, Rev. Edwin J. White, Rev. M. E. Genge, D. D., Rev. T. Owen Hughes, Rev. Walter McCleary, Rev. V. E. Orsborn, Rev. John C. McNeill and Messrs. John R. Staver, Angus McLean, Augustus Waddell, Stewart McKinnon, Wm. J. Montgomery, Alex. McKenzie, A. E. Morrison, A. A. McDonald and Jas. H. Andrews representative Elders, Messrs. Lauchlan Bruce, James Jardine, Alex. C. McKenzie, Heath McLeod, and Angus Green, Elders, and Messrs. Donald Campbell, Allan Campbell, Allan A. Campbell, Col. Allan McLeod and Angus McDonald representative laymen.

There were two sessions, morning and afternoon. One of the first matters brought before the court was that of a request from Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, D. D., asking for a three months leave of absence from his congregation for the months of May, June and July 1937. The request was unanimously granted.

A letter was received by the Clerk from Rev. Alex. Craige, D. D., Clerk of the St. John Presbytery asking that the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island release Rev. E. Orsborn from his appointment to the New London congregation in order that he might be appointed to the First Church, Moncton.

Rev. Mr. Orsborn having sent in his resignation from the New London congregation it was agreed that the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island accede to the request of the Presbytery of St. John and of Mr. Orsborn and release him. The motion was carried.

Messrs. Angus Green and Heath McLeod, Elders, from the New London congregation were present and told of the splendid work which Mr. Orsborn had done since he had come to that field some five years ago and of how sorry the people would be to lose him. But while all could wish that Mr. Orsborn would remain yet if he felt that this was a call to a larger sphere of service they could only acquiesce in his decision and wish him God-speed. These two Elders were supported in the sentiments thus expressed by two laymen, namely Messrs. Allen Campbell and Allan A. Campbell who were also present to represent the New London congregation.

Rev. Mr. Orsborn will say farewell to the New London people on Sunday, Nov. 15th and Sunday Nov. 22nd will be his first Sunday in the Moncton congregation.

A nominating committee was named by the Moderator to select the officers of the Presbytery and the conveners of the several committees of Presbytery for the incoming year. The Committee was as follows: Rev. R. Moorhead Legate, D. D., Rev. M. E. Genge, D. D., Rev. D. L. Griffiths and Messrs. A. A. McDonald and Lauchlan Bruce, Elders. The committee will bring in their report at a later date.

Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, interim moderator of the Brookfield congregation presented a very hearty and unanimous call from the Brookfield congregation addressed to Rev. Howard A. Doig. The call was signed by 91 members and concurred in by 225 adherents and was accompanied with a guarantee of \$1200.00 with the use of the manse and a four weeks holiday. A grant of \$400.00 will be secured from the General Board of Missions making the stipend up to \$1600.00. The call was supported by Messrs. J. H. Andrews, Col. Allan McLeod and Angus McDonald. These men told of the splendid impression Mr. Doig had made on the people and of how anxious they were to have him as their minister. The call was sustained as a regular gospel call and ordered by Presbytery to be sent on to Rev. Mr. Doig and that Presbytery should make the plea for his acceptance of the call as strong as possible. Rev. Mr. Webster reported that the congregation of Caledonia had a successful summer under the care of Mr. John Young, student Catechist. The congregation is now asking for student supply for the winter. After the matter had been discussed at some length it was agreed by Presbytery that Mr. Webster the interim-moderator be given full power in the matter of securing winter supply for Caledonia, satisfactory to the congregation and to the Presbytery. Mr. Webster also spoke briefly

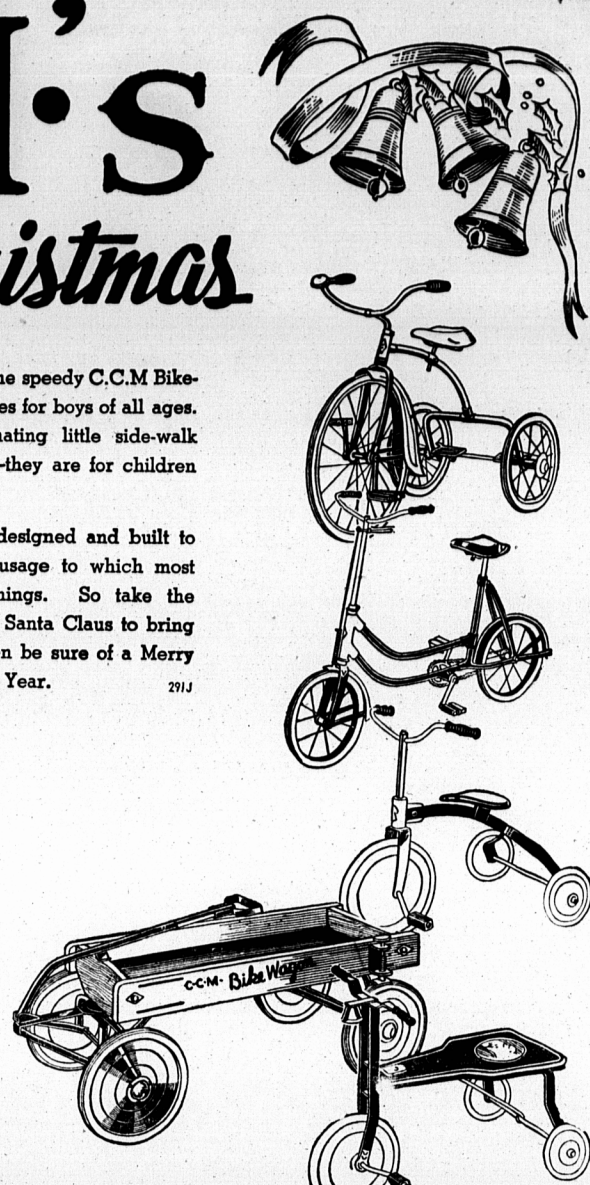
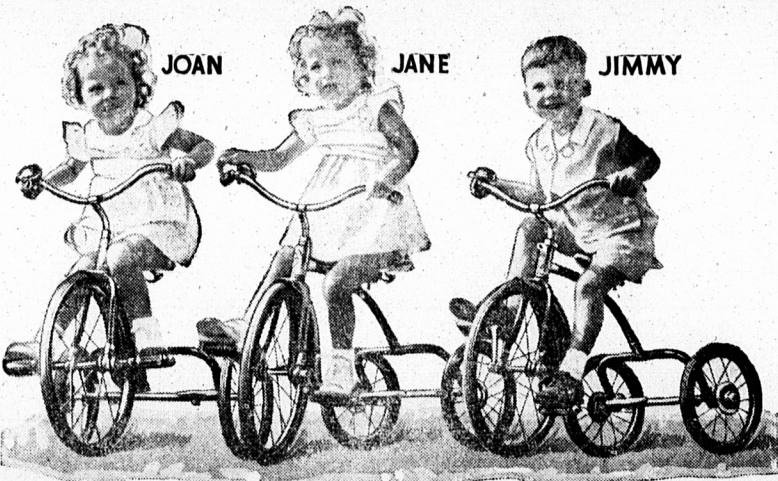

Gratz a former minister of Alberton to take charge of the work in this congregation for a period of six months. It was then moved, seconded and carried that Rev. H. G. Gratz be appointed to the pastoral charge of the Alberton congregation for a period of six months, starting from Nov. 3rd 1936.

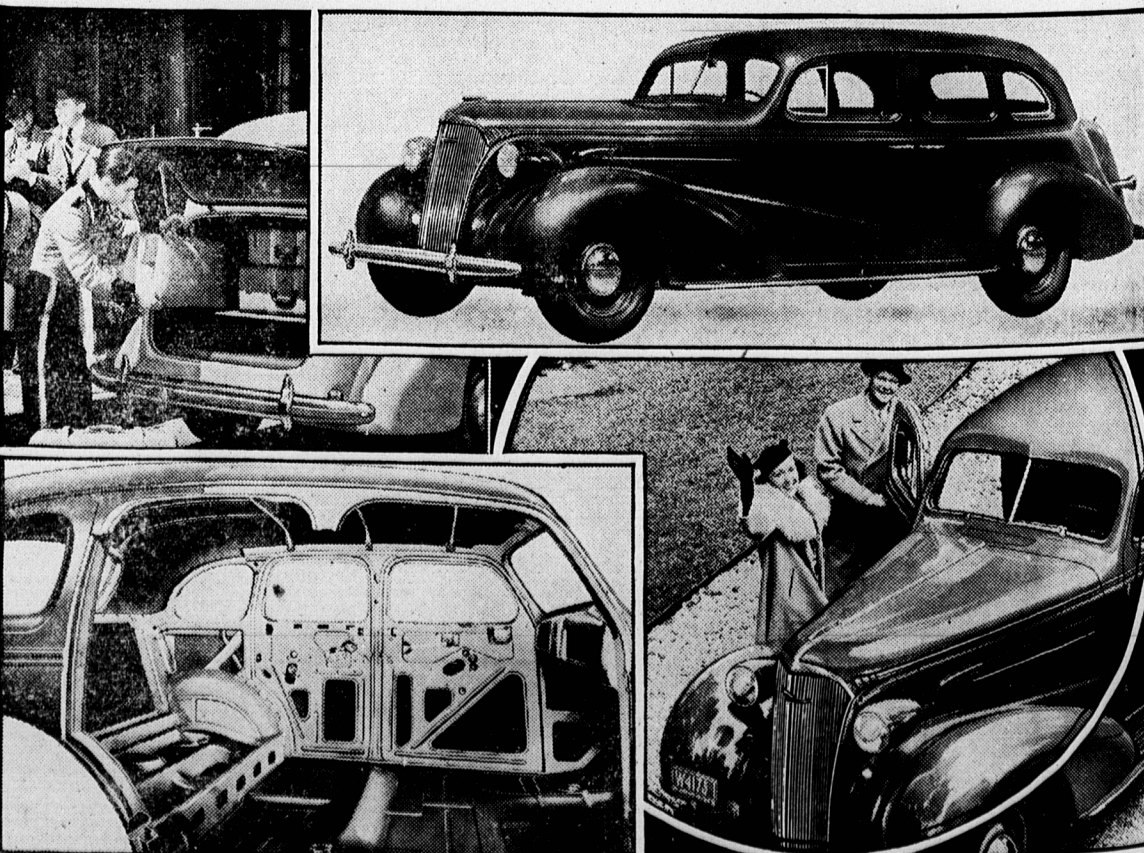
The people of the West Point mission field have sent in a request asking that Rev. Mr. Gratz give them occasional supply during the next six months. The arrangement for these services was left to be agreed upon by Mr. Gratz and the people of West Point. Under the head of the Home Mission report, Rev. G. Carlyle Webster reported that Mr. Joseph Muchan had done a splendid piece of work in the West Point O'Leary and Coleman field. The people had paid all of their indebtedness to him and had presented him with several gifts besides.

Rev. T. Owen Hughes convener of the Budget committee, gave a report on the standing of the budget. The contributions at this date are not as large as they were at this time last year.

Mr. Hughes recommended that the Presbytery and our congregations should hold a conference for the purpose of discussing the various problems of our church—the contributions to the budget and other vital questions. The report was adopted.
