BETTER AND HAPPIER DAYS TO COME

On the eve of the Crucifixion there is heard a passage in which Jeremiah foresees the future as the prophet of assured faith in the better age that was to dawn with the advent of the Messiah. His optimism, if the word may be rescued from its too easy identification with a shallow credulity, is most impressive looking forward to a time when he does not himself expect to see, he denounces the backness of the present, the result of man's sin and God's judgments, passing away in the brightness of the future when God would deliver and restore his people.

"The days come," and they will be days of renewal, of freedom and security, when the people of their own countryside men can go about their work with hope to make them ardent, his gaze is fixed on the day of his return, with a serene confidence which contrasts sharply with the misery that almost overwhelmed him when his gaze was fixed on the travesty that was working itself out in the last days of the kingdom of Judah.

It is in the power to remember that the future belongs to God and that the future is needed for the full revelation of his purposes, the spirit of true religious hopefulness may be discerned. That does not involve any disparagement of the guidance which present experience can give; the prophets never made little of such guidance. But they never made the mistake of supposing that God worked to a plan which man could know and with great exactness describe in advance. They trusted him absolutely because they were sure, however their assurance was derived, that his righteousness and holiness, which, in themselves, would lead men simply to fear before him, were moved out of accord with his loving-kindness and mercy, with his readiness to receive back the repentant man, a nation that had turned against him.

The Gospel, as well as the Epistle, speaks of a coming. Then there were men who had seen the sign that Jesus did, and this is of a truth the prophet that should come and sign with him. But he was more than prophet; he was not just the climax of the prophetic line. If he had been, he would have come with the day of the Lord, affirmed every time the phrase *Annus Domini* is used, was the day when the prophetic hopes concerning the future were fulfilled, but transcended. The King should come and reign in righteousness, but it was only through a glass, darkly, in veiled vision, that any one of the great prophets foresaw who the King should be, and the manner of his kingdom.

The joy that comes when hopes long cherished begin to be fulfilled is to-day moving the hearts of men. They are hopes not far distant from Jeremiah's vision of a return to a beloved country and a life there of peace and security. Those days when they come will be better and happier if they are offered for his blessing to Christ, the King, and are used in the service of his kingdom.

THE COOK'S CORNER

CHEESE MUFFINS

2 cups pastry or 1 3/4 cups all-purpose flour
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of paprika
2-3 cup grated cheese
1 cup milk
1 egg
2 tablespoons mild flavored fat, melted

Mix and sift flour, baking powder and salt. Add cheese and paprika. Beat egg, and add milk. Make a depression in the flour mixture, pour in the egg and milk mixture stir as little as possible in mixing. Fill greased muffin tin two-thirds full. Sprinkle with additional grated cheese. Bake in a moderately hot oven, 375-400 degrees F. 20-25 minutes. Makes 1 dozen medium muffins.

SWISS ROLL

3 eggs, well beaten
1-4 teaspoon vanilla
3 tablespoons pastry flour
3 tablespoons baking powder
Pinch of salt

Beat eggs very light, add vanilla sift dry ingredients together, fold into beaten eggs. Pour into an 8 x 8 inch cake pan that has been lined with greased paper. Bake in hot oven 400 degrees F. 10-12 minutes. Turn out on a damp cloth lined with a paper towel. Remove

KING'S MESSENGERS RIDE IN BROUGHAM

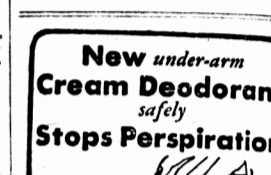
