## Canucks Turned Back By Rangers

### World Champs Lose Opener On Home Ice 4-1.

FORUM, Montreal, Que., Nov. 12. (By the Canadian Press)—The world's hockey champions, Montreal Canadiens, started the 1931-32 National Hockey League season on the wrong foot, dropping their opening game to New York Rangers here tonight 4-1. It was ragged hockey, and chief referee Cooper Smeaton and his conferees Shaver watched play closely and handed out a record total of 35 penalties during the evening. There were seventeen penalties in the opening period, sixteen in the next and only two in the third. Many of the penalties, however, came from infractions of the new rules instead of roughing.

The Rangers were given full value for their victory. They were better tonight than Cecil Hart's Canadiens, who were careless in their passing, casual in their back checking and lacked finish around the nets. The Rangers reserve lines got plenty of work, and gave excellent account of themselves.

Keeling counted for Rangers in the second period on a lone effort. Then Bill Cook rattled one behind Hainsworth from a skirmish. The third Ranger goal came from a formation attack. Somers slipped the rubber to Dillon, who netted a goal from ten feet out.

Canadiens went into the final period with a burst of their old time speed and color. Morenz slipped a perfect pass to Jollat on left wing and the little fellow picked a corner to beat Roach. It was the kid team of Somers and Dillon who combined for the final goal. Somers picked the puck out of a scramble around the Canadiens' net and passed to Dillon, who shoved it into the twin's. Both teams

gave a typical first game of the season performance.

Hey fellows, Doug Hickson is in town! In case you do not know who the gentleman is, we might state that he is the new Abegweit hockey coach who has been chosen to pilot the red and black through the long, tough grind of 1931-32.

As previously mentioned, the Toronto boy comes here highly recommended by Lou Marsh, one of Canada's foremost authorities on hockey, and it appears as a pleasing personality count for anything, Doug Hickson will go over with a bang in Charlottetown this season.

Interviewed last evening, Mr. Hickson stated that this was his first visit to the Maritimes and was much impressed with the little he has seen of "Down East," especially the Island and Charlottetown in particular.

In answer to a query with regards to coaching, he replied that he had charge of the Sea Greyhounds the past two seasons and the two years previous handled the Parry Sound team. Besides coaching he has had also a wide experience in refereeing in and about Toronto.

What struck Doug most shortly after his arrival in the city, was the magnificent Forum and its modern equipment; its comfortable seating arrangement and last but not least, the excellent sheet of ice which met his gaze as he entered the large building. "I was amazed," said Hickson, at the general up-to-date surroundings." He stated that the Queen City boasts of three artificial ice Forums, which are somewhat larger, but not one bit more modern than the Charlottetown Forum. "You surely must have an enthusiastic hockey public down here to support such a remarkable structure," concluded Doug, adding the remark, that Sault Ste. Marie and Parry Sound, larger cities than Charlottetown, have yet to boast of an artificial hockey and skating Forum.

The new coach stands about 5 feet 10 and weighs in the vicinity of 180 pounds. He is a clean-cut and likeable chap with a very engaging personality. He possesses a pair of steel grey eyes with that peculiar glint typical of the clean liver and close follower of athletics.

Given full charge of the team, it is a safe bet that Hickson will land them somewhere up front this season, and if they don't get there, it won't be for want of good sound coaching and hard work.

He takes charge of his team this morning when they will practice from 10 till 11.

## THIRD SAINTS CHICAGO 2 WIN FROM TORONTO 1 P.W.C. 5-3

Second Prince of Wales and Third St. Dunstan's clashed yesterday afternoon at the C. A. A. Grounds in one of the best football games seen locally thus far this season. Although the Saints came out on the better side of a 5-3 score, territory was about evenly divided between the two teams. The P. W. C. boys excelled in forward line work, while the S. D. U. backfield worked on occasion like a machine.

Both tries came in the final period, the Saints scoring first, after ten minutes play in that session, and the Red and Blue crossing their opponents line on the first rush from the subsequent kick off. The St. Dunstons score was the result of a dribble beginning at the 25 yard line, a style of play with which the P. W. C. backfield seemed unable to cope. The kick for convert was made from a favorable angle, and the two extra points were added. Two minutes afterwards Nial Burnett, heady P. W. C. forward, pounced on a loose ball for the P. W. C. try. The latter player with his fellow forwards "Suds" McLeod, and Gordon Rice, followed the ball and tackled hard throughout the game.

The Saints' backfield developed an effective passing game, which enabled the team to make goodly gains in territory despite the heroic efforts of the opposing forwards, who at times bore down all opposition.

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## To All Hockey Clubs On Island

A Maritime effort is being made this year to foster and encourage Junior Hockey. It is being realized more and more that the calibre of senior hockey in the years to come depends largely on the interest shown now in promoting hockey in the younger grades.

The Upper Canadian provinces have been operating in the younger grades of hockey for a considerable number of years, and to this, and this alone, is attributable the abundance of good hockey material in the higher grades in those provinces.

The following age standards have been adopted throughout the Dominion by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association:

Junior—under 20 years on the first of January.  
Juvenile—under 18 years on the first of January.  
Midget—under 16 years on the first of January.  
Bantam—under 14 years on the first of January.

It is desirable that wherever possible Hockey Clubs will make the necessary effort to organize Junior teams. In the small country towns, now playing intermediate hockey, the Clubs would be well advised to confine their efforts to Junior operations. If a sufficient number of teams are available leagues will be formed and a system of play-downs arranged, so that a Junior Island Championship may be declared. The Island Champions will be eligible for Maritime playoffs, and the Maritime winners this year will play off with the Province of Quebec champions for the Dominion Junior Championship.

This year an amount of money

has been made available through Mr. C. A. H. A. grant to encourage Junior Hockey. This money will most likely be used to help finance teams which reach the playoffs and which have considerable travelling to do. This financial assistance is only available to the Junior or younger grades. It is not available to Intermediate.

Clubs in all grades will be required this year to become affiliated with the Maritime Amateur Hockey Association and their players properly registered prior to the opening of the season. Rules and regulations which reach the playoffs and which likewise govern clubs and teams of the lower grades.

The undersigned invites all Clubs interested to write him or to visit him personally and he will be more than pleased to advise them, or in any way possible assist them, with the object in view of becoming properly organized in time to get to work as soon as the ice arrives. A Maritime Junior Championship is there for the taking—let's get going.
