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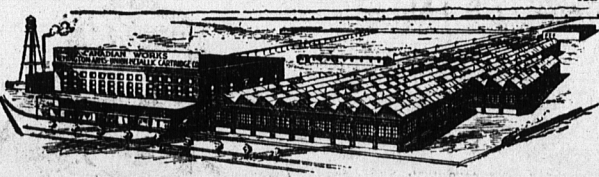

DISABLED SCHOONER.

A despatch from Louisburg says:—"The schooner Blanche M. Thorburn was reported disabled off the coast and the steamer Olive went to her assistance and towed her into port. The Blanche M. Thorburn is 70 tons and was on voyage from North Sydney to Charlottetown with a cargo of coal. She is owned and commanded by S. Brown, of Murry Harbour. The Captain reported the accident off Port Nova. There was a strong breeze and a heavy sea running and his mainmast head gave away carrying with it the foremast head, all sails and running rigging came down on deck, and things looked rather bad for a time, but temporary repairs were made to enable them to get a part of the foremast up to steady the vessel. A passing sword fisherman came alongside and offered to report the vessel at Louisburg, where assistance could be procured. The vessel will either tow direct to Charlottetown for repairs or effect repairs at Louisburg."

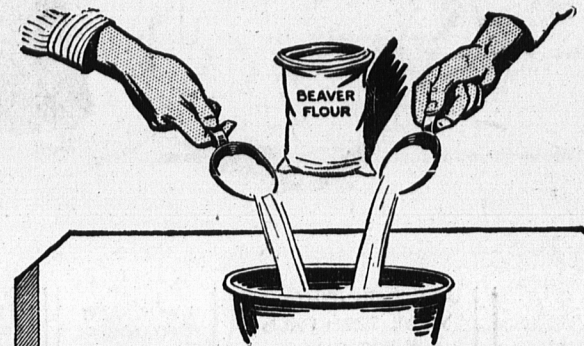
