ETHIOPIANS MASS

nearly 5000 Ethiopians had broken camp at Etem, south of Makale, and were advancing toward the latter city over a caravan route. Scattered parties of tribesmen also were sighted near Maraco and Nadire, east of Hausien. The Italian command immediately ordered blackshirt detachments sent out in search of the tribesmen, who it was feared comprised a defence force preparing to give battle in the hills outside Makale.

Advance patrols from the first army corps tonight passed through Wogaro and Mukasa. They did not stop here, but continued south toward Makale. General Ruggiero Santini's main Asakari corps tonight entered Ghelobda and Dongilo, two little settlements in the Gheralto region less than 25 miles north of Makale. Driving forward from Hausien, which the left wing of the second big Italian drive on this front occupied this afternoon, Gen. Sanini's troops split into two columns and pushed ahead.

Reports were received by the Italian command that 100,000 Ethiopians concentrated south of Makale were preparing to move into position for a defence of that objective. A lone Ethiopian attack on Gen. Pietro Maravigna's extreme right wing was the only resistance encountered so far. The tribesmen ran into a barrage of machinegun fire and were thrown back with heavy losses, the Italian command was informed.

Meanwhile General Rodolfo Graziani was reported launching a new push in the Webbe Shiblel River Valley in the southeast. Dispatches from Italian Somaliland said an imposing air squadron attached to Gen. Graziani's forces had bombed Gorrabel, Ethiopian base on the Fafan River.

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 4—An Italian war raid on the town of Gorrabel, which the Ethiopian government described as the most serious yet suffered in Ethiopia, left 30 women and 15 children dead, it was announced officially today. Emperor Haile Selassie, beginning his sixth year of rule, was deeply affected by reports of the bombing Saturday, which the government stated caused greater casualties than earlier attacks on other cities, including Adowa in the north. Gorrabel, Ogsden Province in southern Ethiopia, was said to be unoccupied by troops, as they were at the front. The women and children were said to have been killed while watering their cattle, 100 of whom also were reported killed.

No Official Reports
Government officials stated they had no official reports of the Italian advance in the north toward Makale, but the Emperor expressed great confidence his warriors would defeat the Italian invaders. Ethiopia's funds to repel the invasion were increased by dozens of feudal chiefs after a vigorous plea by Tege Hwarisate, former Ethiopian Minister to Paris, who himself contributed 50,000 francs (about \$3,250). Hawariate warned the troops to fight like lions—in pairs, instead of in great concentrations, and in the night.

King George Ready To Return To Greece

(A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) LONDON, Nov. 4.—(A.P.)—George II of Greece, former monarch whose Throne was offered to him again as the result of yesterday's plebiscite in Greece, drew up a proclamation tonight to announce his imminent return to the Throne. "I am delighted," he said, "that my people want me to return to them." (The Greek Government announced the plebiscite showed the people favored George II's restoration by about 45 to 1. It stated there were 1,491,992 votes for the Monarchy and 32,454 for continuance of the Republic.) A telegram from the Greek regent, General George Kondylis and the council of ministers was handed George this morning by the Greek Minister to London, Charalambos Simopoulos. It informed him both the government and the people of Greece were eagerly awaiting his return, and offered the government's congratulations. Simopoulos described the King as "very pleased."

Britain, France To Renew Peace Effort

LIVERPOOL, England, Nov. 4.—Britain and France, Prime Minister Baldwin announced tonight at Liverpool, are to make a renewed effort for peace in East Africa. "There is undoubtedly throughout Europe," said Mr. Baldwin, "a strong and resolute desire for peace, and it is shown, I think, by the way in which the League of Nations, not at our initiative, desired France and ourselves to do what we could to pursue peace and to try to find some solution that would bring peace—a solution satisfactory to Italy, Abyssinia and the League." "The attempt will be made by France and by ourselves with the knowledge and with the backing of the League. It will be made inside the framework of the League, realizing as every League member does that if you have failed to prevent the outbreak of war the next thing is to bring that war to an end with all the speed you can."

Ensign Of Scotland Flown In Welcome

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Nov. 4.—The ensign of Scotland flew today from the Chateau Laurier, across Connaught Place from the Union Station, to welcome Baron Tweeddale as he arrived to take up residence at Government House for the next five years. The flag was there, however, after an argument.

The Chateau management thought the flag with its red lion rampant on a yellow field would be a good idea because the Baron is a Scot. The man who hoisted it, however, was no herald. He hung the flag to indicate mourning for a prominent person. A Scottish engineer staying at the hotel noticed it and called the management. An argument followed. The engineer knew the flag was hung incorrectly but could not say how to hang it. The management called the Secretary of State office and an official there settled the question. Up went the flag again.

JEWEL THEFT IN TORONTO

Jewels of Prince of Asturias Stolen.

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) TORONTO, Nov. 4.—(C.P.)—Jewels said to be valued at between \$7,000 and \$8,000 disappeared today from the hotel suite of the Prince of Asturias, it was learned late this afternoon. The theft occurred while the heir presumptive to the Spanish throne and his bride, Maria Mercedes were at a luncheon somewhere north of Toronto. Chief Constable D. C. Draper declined to discuss the matter, referring questioners to hotel officials. These were equally silent, but R. B. Willis of Toronto, solicitor for the Prince, said the loss consisted of brooches, bracelets and watches. The Prince's orders, including the Jeweled Order of the Golden Fleece were in the room but were not taken. Everything stolen was insured. Willis said. The Prince and Princess did not bring their most valuable gems to this country, he added. No clue had been found late today as to how the robber or robbers gained entrance to the quarters occupied by the royal couple. Prince Juan and his princess came here yesterday from Europe. They were married a month ago, and planned to visit Niagara Falls before leaving for the United States.
