 NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—(AP)—The stock market charted its course Saturday for a moderate recovery and, in the majority of cases, achieved a fair amount of success. The mild comeback, however, left the list well down on the week.  
 The Associated Press average of 60 stocks managed to finish up 1/4 of a point at 40.5 but on the week recorded a loss of 7 net and for October showed a net drop of 2.6 points, largest monthly recession for the year to date. Transfers for the brief proceedings aggregated 239,740 shares compared with 269,140 a week ago.  
 Canadian stocks showed a few plus signs on the big board. International Nickel was up 1-4 and Walkers 3-8, while Seagram and Ford showed unchanged. Lake Erie lost 1-8.  
 Utilities not far from their five-year-lows established in 1938, slipped a trifle further with North American Public Service of N.J. and Commonwealth Edison hitting bottom levels for 1941. At new year's lows also were Union Pacific and American Tobacco "B."
