IN THE CORNER

Ever since Canadians took that 8-0 drubbing at the hands of Toronto Maple Leafs last Saturday night many and often has been the query "what happened Canadians. Leafs can't be that much better."

Personally this column without attempting to rib the Montreal team's defeat is of the opinion that Canucks were away off color and just couldn't click. Hearing it over the air waves it was easily discernible that Leafs were far from that much better than their opponents.

Without a doubt the Toronto team had a distinct and big edge in every period with their shooting decidedly accurate. The opposite can be said of Canucks when they did have open scoring chances either tossed them away by poor ill-timed passing or shot at everything but the net.

But we will not attempt to judge a game from its distance. Rather here is how Baz O'Meara, who journeyed to the Queen City for the tussle summarises the encounter in his usual brilliant style.

"Disorganization set in early and stayed late." This summary of Canadiens defeat by Leafs voiced by Terry Reardon as he detached his canabans from clenched teeth, more or less explained the defeat.

The score of 8-0 indicated such a wide margin of superiority by Leafs that explanation is superfluous. For ten minutes Canucks forced the pace, should have had three goals but only hit two goal posts. Thereafter they gradually subsided till their efforts in the third period were concentrated on avoiding a shut out.

They drew well over thirteen thousand indicating that the name of Drillon still has persuasive powers in that sector. Drillon, given fair reception, had Terry Reardon and Blake as companions early in the game. The change didn't register very well.

Whatever effective hockey Canucks played was crammed into the first period. Behind 2-0 at the end of that period they steadily still the score mounted to 4-0 at the end of the second.

The defence crumbled in the third and Leafs roamed at will on Biheuult, who played well but couldn't be expected to stand off such a furious assault.

Brilliant Gaye Stewart scoring the second goal on a shot from behind the net that hit a Canadian and went in rest put the quietus on Canadiens. Previously Schriener had scored on a close in attack.

Davidson shot from well out unassisted by any checker in the second session. Canucks seemed to fight in to meet a close range shot off a Copp pass. Copp had been knocked down but reached out and tapped the pass to Apps. That gives a rough idea of how Canadiens' defence was operating.

Carl Poff, Schriener and Hill contributed goals in the last period. Canadiens couldn't do anything right. Leafs had luck as well as skill, and irresistible combination.

Canadiens Stage Thrilling Third Period Rally To Gain Draw With Detroit

MONTREAL, Nov. 24 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens staged a thrilling rally in the third period of a National Hockey League game with Detroit Red Wings tonight to end in a 4-4 draw with the league leading wings.

The Wings maintained a first place draw with Chicago Black Hawks who tied Boston Bruins 3-3, while the Canadiens' fifth-place position in the standings was unchanged.

The Habitués scored four in a row to draw even with the Wings, with Joe Benoit, Joe Bonot, Ray Getliffe and Gordie Drillon sharing the scoring honors. The spree came after a series of pointless hockey, in which the crowd, estimated at 8,000 showed little interest.

It was the second time in a row that Canadiens have staged a third-period rally to earn a tie, but also their sixth consecutive game without a win. They got a 3-3 draw in Chicago Sunday night.

After a scoreless first period, Sid Abel opened for the Wings in the second, with Don Grosso and Eddie Wares in on the play. Abdel went through the session Syd Howe put Mud Bruneteau combined to made it three with two minutes of the period remaining.

Wings kept up the pressure as the third period opened, and Carl Liscombe shot them into a four-goal lead on passes from Bruneteau and Howe.

Then Canadiens began to click. Before the crowd settled down af-

ter Liscombe's tally, Toe Blake had bagged the first Canuck goal. A minute later Joe Benoit made it two, and Ray Getliffe nabbed a third tally near the mid-way mark. Climax of the game came with Gordie Drillon evened the count after a passing bout with Buddy O'Connor and Getliffe.

Before the game, Detroit's Jimmy Orlando was presented with the Sports Fan Trophy after being voted the most popular player in the league last season.

Boston Bruins And Chicago Black Hawks Battle To Tie

BOSTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Boston Bruins and Chicago Black Hawks each lengthened their National Hockey League streak of undefeated games to five by staging a 3-3 tie tonight before a 9,000 crowd at the Boston Garden.

The Bruins, winners of their last four starts, came from behind to deadlock early in the final period, when Murph Chamberlain bashed a straight 14-footer through goalie Bert Gardiner after being set up by Herb Cain on a rush started by Captain Dit Clapper.

Little Musty March scored twice for the Black Hawks and Doug Hamilton, a former Bruin, put his forces into a 5-4 lead during the third minute of the finale.

But in his first shot of the game on the Boston ice slipped through Frankie Brimsek.

Chamberlain set up the first Boston score, made by Busher Jackson and rookie Ben Guldin, the 17-year-old left winger was in action on Boston ice for the first time. Ben Guldin also beat Gardiner before being shot by the Bruins into a 4-3 lead. This

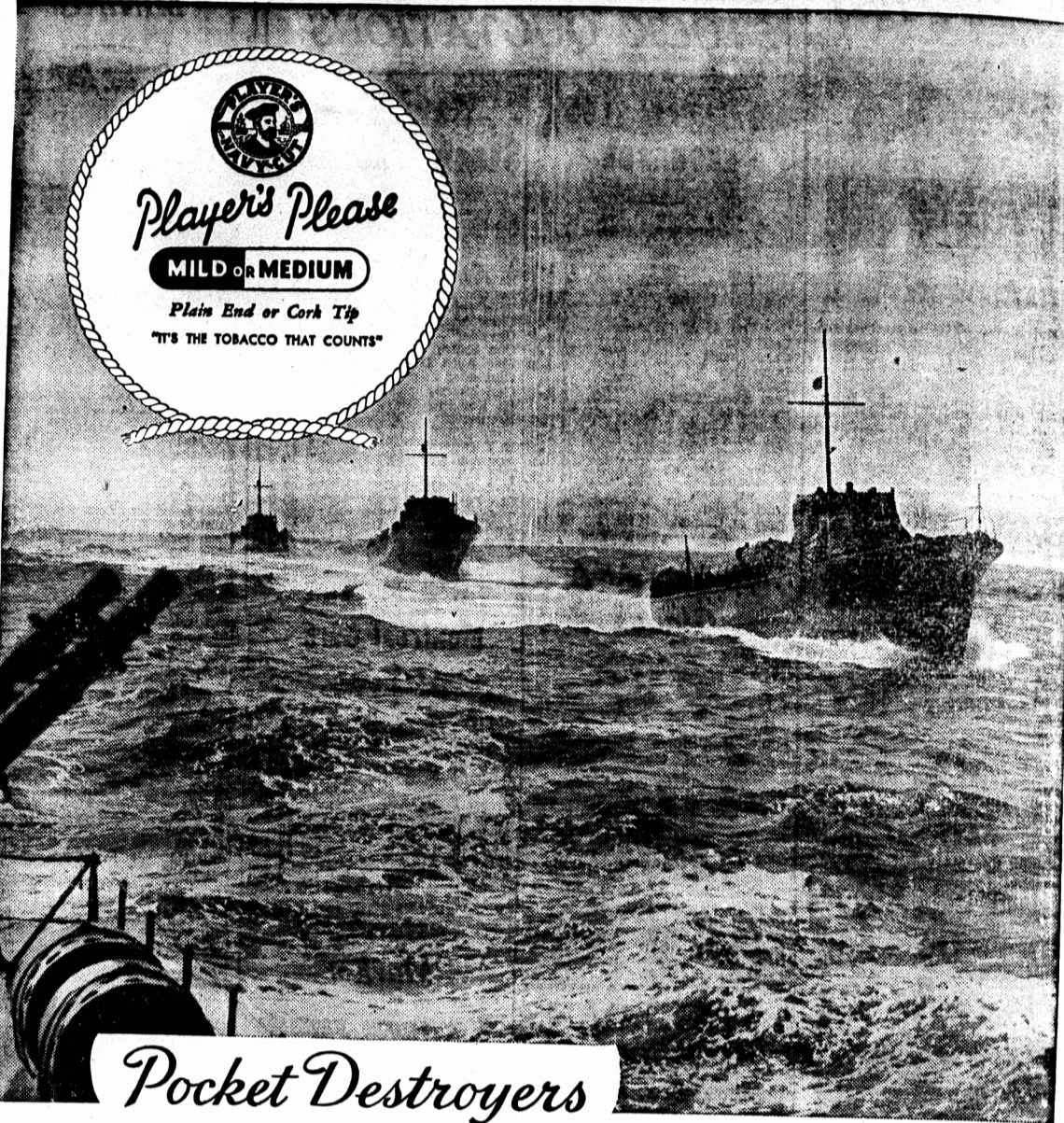

Hanover Shoe Farms To Stop Racing

HANOVER, Pa., Nov. 24 (AP)—Hanover Shoe Farms, breeder of three Hambletonian winners and owner of two other champions of the outstanding trotting classic, today announced it would discontinue racing of its standard-bred horses.

A spokesman said, however, that the stable would continue to breed trotters and pacers for sale. The farms turn out nearly 100 standard-bred horses each year.

The three Hanover Shoe-bred horses who triumphed in the Hambletonian were Hanover's Bertha in 1930, Shirley Hanover in 1937 and Bill Gallon in 1941. Shirley Hanover was a daughter of Bertha. Although bred at Ashley Hanover, she was owned by the R.H. Johnston stables of Charlotte, N.C., at the time of his victory.
