APPLE SAUCE CAKE 1-2 cup shortening, 1 cup sugar, 2 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda, 1-2 teaspoon cloves, 1-2 teaspoon lemon juice, 1 cup raisins, 1 cup warm apple sauce, unseasoned Cream shortening and sugar, Add egg. Mix in dry ingredients, then add raisins and apple sauce. Bake in a pan 8 by 8 at 350 F. about 65 minutes.

LEMON SPONGE PUDDING 2 tablespoons butter, 3-4 cup honey, 4 tablespoons bread flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, Juice of 1 lemon, 3 egg yolks, 1-2 cups milk, 3 egg whites, beaten. Combine honey and the flour, add the egg yolks, which have been beaten until light. Add the milk, salt and melted butter. Stir until smooth. Fold in the stiffly whipped egg whites and lemon juice. Pour into individual moulds holding 1-2 cupful each, and place in a pan of hot water. Bake in a moderate oven (350 F.) until firm. Serve with cream.

THE COOK'S CORNER

MARMALADE NUT BREAD 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-4 cup sugar, 1-2 cup nuts, chopped, 1 tablespoon grated orange rind, 1-2 cup marmalade, 1-2 cups milk, 1 egg.

Method: Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Add the walnuts, orange rind and marmalade. Beat the egg thoroughly and add to the mix, and stir this mixture into the dry ingredients. Just mix until the ingredients are moistened. Turn into a greased loaf tin and let stand for 15 to 20 minutes. Bake in a moderate oven (350 deg. F.) for about an hour. Cool and wrap in wax paper. Let stand for about 24 hours before cutting. The last is a recipe for drop cookies flavored with marmalade.

MARMALADE DROP COOKIES 2-3 cups flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon baking soda, 1 cup butter or shortening, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup marmalade, 2 eggs, w.-l.-beaten. Method: Sift the flour, salt and soda together. Cream the butter or shortening and gradually cream in the sugar, then add the well-beaten eggs. Add the sifted dry ingredients to the creamed mixture gradually, and add the marmalade at the last. Drop in mounds 2 inches apart on a greased baking sheet and bake in a fairly hot oven (400 deg. F.) from 10 to 15 minutes. Remove from the pan immediately on taking from the oven. This will make about 4 dozen cookies.

How Much SUGAR Should Children Have?

Children need sugar. It helps provide energy for active little bodies. But too much sugar does more harm than good. Sweets between meals tend to dull children's appetite for the foods they need for growth.

Satisfy their sweet tooth with these, instead: Fresh fruits, fruit juices, dried fruits such as prunes, raisins, dates, figs, apricots. (50% to 75% of dried fruits are natural sugar.) They're much better for youngsters... and they help save sugar for Canada and our allies.

The lawful allowance of sugar is 1/4 pound per person per week. No one is allowed to have more than two weeks' supply on hand at any time, except in remote areas.

Retailers have the right to refuse to sell or to limit sales to any person they believe is attempting to disobey the law. Penalties provided for breaking the sugar ration law are imprisonment for as long as two years and a fine up to \$5,000.00.
