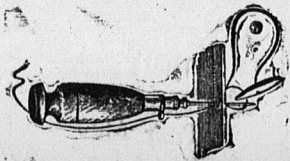

He will also preach in Bedouque at three o'clock and again in Summerside at seven o'clock taking for his theme The First Christmas Anthem.

The annual report of the fisheries, just issued, shows that the whole catch of fisheries in their waters by Canadians, including fish products, seal, etc., during the season of 1906 is valued at over \$26,250,000. With the exception of last year, when the phenomenal catch of salmon in British Columbia swelled the total value of the fisheries beyond \$20,000,000, this is the largest aggregate on record, exceeding the famous catch of 1901 by 500,000. This decrease is mostly attributed to the British Columbia salmon industry. The deep sea fishermen of the maritime provinces received \$159,015 as bounty for their respective catches of fish for the season of 1906. Of this amount the owners of 957 fishing vessels and their crews received \$98,203. The balance \$60,807, was distributed amongst 20,571 boat fishermen. For the past season the province of Nova Scotia received nearly double the amount of the bounty paid to the other three provinces viz, \$99,518; Quebec \$34,410; New Brunswick, \$16,217, and Prince Edward Island, \$8,830. Since its inception (1882) the sum of \$3,919,701 has been distributed amongst the fishermen of the maritime provinces.
