AMERICANS DEADLOCK SERIES WITH LEAFS

New York Team Scores Lone Goal Of Hectic Game

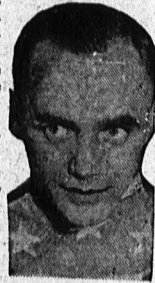
Jerwa Is Marksman As Worters Gives Sensational Display In Blanking Toronto Squad.

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York, March 31.—An acrobatic mid-air of barely 125 pounds, Roy Worters, rose to the topmost heights of goal tending brilliance to thwart the big, bruising Toronto Maple Leafs and give New York Americans a sensational 1-0 victory before 14,000 enthusiastic fans here tonight.

The match was the second of the best-of-three series in the Stanley Cup final. Toronto won the first game in the Ontario capital 3-1 and took the ice tonight odds-on favorites to win the game.

Leafs were 6-1 choices to take the series prior to the match. The third just to decide the team to meet Detroit Red Wings, National Hockey League champions, in the finals, will be played at Toronto Thursday.

Joe Jerwa, Americans high scoring defence star, scored the lone goal of the hectic clash, which gave the home club victory and stunned even the most ardent New York supporters. The marker followed a fine strategy and brilliant passing. Both teams were a man short at the time whereas the Americans tumbled the Leafs into the New York end then broke fast with puck and caught only one Leaf defenceman in position. He was Andy Blair, but Art Chapman outguessed him by passing to the league's leading marksman, Dave "Sweeney" Schirmer, who flipped a short pass back to Jerwa at the goal mouth and the latter netted easily as the Leaf cage guardian was drawn out by Schirmer.

The counter that exploded Toronto hopes for a quick and decisive victory came at 16:15 of the middle frame. From then on the match belonged strictly to Tiny Worters, for years ranked as one of the best cage guardians in the league, but who has never seen his Americans get farther than the first round of cup play-offs in the club's 11 years existence.

Leafs, with three powerful lines capable of travelling at top speed for 60 minutes and with the ability to shoot with deadly accuracy attacked with a vengeance after that middle period set-back.

Previously the contest had been fairly evenly contested but Jerwa's goal roused the Toronto hockey-men to such a pitch the game was just a panorama of blue flashing about the American end.

Time and again Leaf marksmen had Worters at their mercy but the little fellow was unbeat and frequently the game was halted while the ice was cleaned of the showers of paper and fruit that descended after some of Roy's spectacular saves.

A tribute to the Americans gallant stand against powerful foes was seen in the action of the fans who remained to the last minute and cheered the star spangled skaters to the echo after the match was over.

While the game was fast and of a bruising type throughout only seven penalties were called, Leafs getting four. Toronto outshot their opponents 30 to 25.

Lightweight Title Bout For June

NEW YORK, March 31.—A lightweight title fight between champion Tony Canzoneri and Lou Ambers of Herkimer, N.Y., likely will launch the outdoor fight season here early in June.

The bout virtually was assured to-day when the New York State Athletic Commission named Ambers as its No. one candidate for Canzoneri's crown.

Ambers is to post a \$1,500 forfeit tomorrow binding him to meet the champion within 60 days after Canzoneri fights Jimmy McLarnin, here May 8.

Magedomas Confident Of Ending Series

TORONTO, March 31.—From the hotel camps of Brockville Magedomas and Sudbury Falcons came quiet words of confidence tonight. The Magedomas and Falcons, battling for the Eastern Canada senior hockey championship and the right to meet Kimberley Dynamiters for the Allan Cup, resume their best-of-three series here tomorrow night. Brockville won the first game 5-4 in Ottawa last night. Free from injuries, Brockville can end the series with a victory in the second game and coach Jess Spring was confident they would do it.

Manager Sammy Rothschild reported his speedy Falcons in good condition with the exception of "Blinky" Bellinger, starry forward. It was almost certain Bellinger, who suffered a dislocated shoulder in practice and did not play at Ottawa, would not be on the Sudbury lineup tomorrow.

Rivulettes Turn Down Western Offer

PRESTON, Ont., March 31.—Manager M. J. Dykeman of the Preston Rivulettes today turned down the offer of Winnipeg Rangers to stage the series for the Lady Besborough trophy, emblematic of the Canadian Women's Hockey Championship, which would be played on the home ice of the western champions.

Rangers advised the Preston management they had obtained the Winnipeg arena for April 8 and 10 and offered the easterners 50 per cent of the gross receipts if they would come west. Dykeman, seeking a definite guarantee, refused to accept the proposition and in return guaranteed the western club \$300, in addition to a gate receipt percentage to play the games here.

According to schedule the games should be played on the home ice of the western champions. Due to the lateness of the season, it is believed here the series will be cancelled.

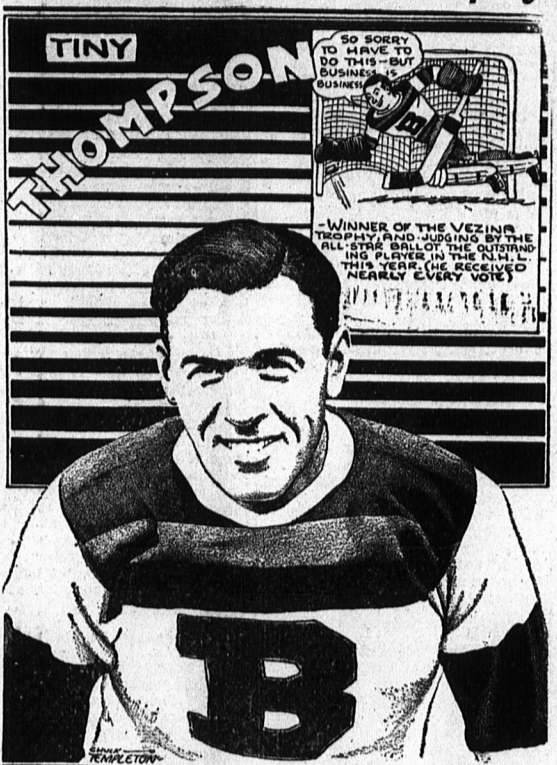
Question Unsettled
WINNIPEG, March 31.—Despite exchange of several telegrams, the question of whether Winnipeg Rangers and Preston Rivulettes will meet to decide the Canadian Women's Hockey Championship, remained unsettled tonight.

Mrs. James Dunn, Secretary of the Winnipeg organization, announced tonight the Rangers Club was "totally unable" to accept a second offer of the Rivulettes to journey to Preston, Ont., to stage a series to decide possession of the Lady Besborough Trophy. The Preston Club wired a guarantee of \$300 and a percentage of the gate receipts.

This decision, she said, has been conveyed to Manager M. J. Dykeman of the Preston Club, with a counter-proposal the Preston team reconsider Winnipeg's proposal to come here for a two-game series to be held April 8 and 10.

The Winnipeg Club, she explained, would find it impossible to make the journey to Preston unless the eastern team guarantees \$900 to defray expenses.

South Africa Cadets Lead Empire In Miniature Shoot

LONDON, March 31.—Younger Canadian marksmen failed to qualify for the King's trophy for miniature rifle shooting amongst boys of the Empire in 1935 but cadets and others from the Dominion won the largest number of silver and bronze medals for individual high scores.

The competition, results of which were announced tonight, was won by South Africa with 82 points. Great Britain was second with 77 and New Zealand third with 76. Australia and India, like Canada, failed to qualify.

Canada won 127 bronze and silver medals for individual high scores. Britain was second in this category with 71.

Makes Ruling Re Size Of Baseman's Mitt

CHICAGO, March 29.—The American League's four top fielding first basemen last year will have to operate without aid and comfort from those "butterfly net" mitts this season.

For, at the request of the club-owners, Commissioner Kenesaw Mountain Landis has laid down definite restrictions on size.

From now on, first basemen may use mitts measuring not more than 12 inches from top to bottom, and eight inches across the palm. Also, the lacing between thumb and palm must not measure more than four inches and "shall not be enlarged, extended or reinforced by any process or material, whatever."

Syracuse Chiefs Boast Strong Team

SYRACUSE, N. C., March 31.—Syracuse Chiefs, winners of the International League Governor's cup in 1935, should be tougher this year. Just how tough will be a matter of conjecture until opening day, when the Boston Red Sox ship a few more of their lower-priced workmen here.

However, the squad now training in Mineral Wells, Texas, is the strongest Syracuse has sent south since its return to the International League. The big need is pitchers, and three or four good prospects are expected from Boston.

Outstanding among the newcomers is Babe Dahlgren, the fancy-fielding first baseman pushed off the Red Sox initial sack through purchase of Jimmy Foss.

The only holdover who pitched regularly for the Chiefs last year is Hy Vanderberg. He won 13 and lost seven. Outstanding additions are Leo Mangum, veteran right-hander acquired from Montreal, and Ray Stairs, whose iron-man feats with Rochester a few years ago earned promotion to the Cardinals, and who has since served with the Giants, Boston Nationals and Toronto.

Canadian Open Tournery Dates Are Set Back

TORONTO, March 31.—The Canadian open golf championship will be played over St. Andrew's golf club, Toronto, Sept. 10, 11 and 12 instead of July 9, 10 and 11 as originally scheduled, president R. M. Gray of the Ontario Golf Association announced last night.

The dates were moved back because they conflicted with dates for the Ontario amateur championships and because Ontario professionals had complained they would be unable to get away for the open if held in July.

The Canadian ladies' close championship is slated for the Beaconsfield Golf Club in Montreal from Sept. 21 to Sept. 28.

Cruickshank Impressive In Practice

Practicing for the third annual \$5,000 invitation tournament, starting here Thursday, the Richmond, Va., professional toured the out-going half of the Jones-designed layout in exactly 29 strokes, seven under par.

Cruickshank did not complete his round in an attempt to lower Jones' practice record of 64 for the course. Jones, registering his fourth successive sub-par round, had to do some scrambling on the last nine to register 36-74—70, two under par.
