Claim Russian Coal Cost Prohibitive

MONTREAL, Oct. 22—(CP)—Russian coal will not benefit by lifting of Canada's embargo unless Soviet exporters reduce present prices, Montreal dealers declared today before resumed sessions of the Tory Commission.

With freight charges and duty added, cost of Russian coal to the Canadian market would be prohibitive, the royal commission probing the Canadian anthracite situation heard.

Alan Rogers, Manager of the Weaver Company, testified his firm sought a contract with the Russian Amtorg concern but no agreement was reached.
