### Rangers Capture Trophy

The Ranger midgets, clicking in all departments, last night defeated the Highfield midgets at the Forum 8-2 to capture the trophy donated by His Honour Lieutenant Governor DeBlois. It was the fifth game of the best three out of five series, the Rangers having previously won two and drawn two. After a scoreless first period in which both teams played a close checking game the Rangers rapped home five goals in the middle canto to their opponents two. "Burr" Worth, "Ab" MacKinnon and Saunders figured in the scoring for the Rangers while B. Trainor and Raymond MacKinnon chalked up the markers for the visitors. Led by McEachern and Whitlock in a spirited third period the Rangers found the net for three more counters while the Highfield team disorganized in their attack went scoreless. Both goalies turned in an effective game, Ivan Friswell in the Highfield cage being especially brilliant under fire.

MONCTON, March 13—Wielding their hockey sticks with much the same effectiveness as their namesakes of yore, Moncton Red Indians routed a courageous band of Bearcats from Truro seeking the Maritime Junior Hockey Championship here tonight. The young tribesmen rattled in fifteen goals to win the opening game of the home and home, total-goal series 15-1. The second engagement will be played in Truro Friday night.

Red Indians were far the superior team on the night's play and only for some sensational work on the part of goalie Clark in the Truro cage in the first period, the score would have been much larger. In this session the Bearcats, although outplayed, held the Indians in check and permitted them to score only one goal, but in the second period the visitors collapsed completely.

The New Brunswickers found big holes in the Truro defence and swept in on the Bearcats cage repeatedly. Left without protection goalie Clark "blew up." Indians rattled six goals behind him in the first ten minutes of play and later scored three more within a minute and a half and fired in their tenth counter of the period, around the seventeen minute mark.

Henry Jones, hard-working centre ace for the Bearcats and the outstanding man for the visitors scored the only Truro goal early in this period when he banged a pass from Bob Burgess past goalie Roger Lewis from close range.

The Red Indians, eager for more goals, fired in four more in their closing third period rush. Jimmy Innis and Yvon Gould led the Indians' attack each with three goals while MacArthur, Dud White, Calhoun and LeBlanc, scored two and Bell contributed the other one. Fraser Milton, defence man, who "blew" three wide-open chances to score in the first period and another in the third, was the only Moncton player except the goalie, who did not have a hand in the scoring. Gould led in the matter of assists, figuring in five goals, in addition to the two he scored.

The game was cleanly played before the largest junior hockey crowd of the season, well over 3,000 fans, only three penalties being handed out by referee Cy Taylor of Dorchester.

The penalties all came to the Indians for minor tripping infractions.

### Detroit Tigers Prepared For Another Attempt At American League Pennant

(This is the fourth of a series of stories, gathered first hand, on the training and prospects of the major league clubs for 1935.)

LAKELAND, Fla., March 13—Unshaken, apparently, by the savage mauling of the Dean boys and the rest of the riotous Cardinal crew in last fall's World Series, Mickey Cochrane's Detroit Tigers, with malice aforethought and kindness in their hearts for no other American League champion-

ship. "We got a taste of what it was like last year," says the embattled Irishman, "and we liked the taste."

**Award Trifle Early**  
The award of the 1935 flag to Cleveland Indians or New York Yankees, as many of the experts are doing right now, is a trifle premature, Cochrane thinks.

"Who are the Indians?" he asks. "We beat them easily over 154 games last season and they've got the same ball club this year. The Yankees, even without Babe Ruth, are the gang I'm watching. But we're young and we'll be better this year. We're still climbing."

Mickey admits only one weakness, lack of real outfield strength. While he has enough to go along all right, he tried mightily hard in the off season to pick up one more clouting fly-chaser. Leon "Goose" Goslin, one of baseball's perennial rambling brooks, still rolls steadily along on his bowed legs. "Jo Jo" White is a first class centre-fielder, but Pete Fox in right and the reserves of Bob Seids, Gerald Walker, and a likely looking youngster, Chester Morgan from Beaumont, could stand a little more help.

**Pitching Staff**  
The rest of the team is the 1934 steamroller, Lynwood ("Schoolboy") Rowe, ace of the pitching staff, looks bigger and even faster than ever, and with Tommy Bridges and Elden Auker, more right handers, provides a first bowling line averaging slightly over 26 years of age. Rowe won 24 games, Bridges 22 and Auker 15 last year. They figure to be better.

On top of these Cochrane has a flock of capable pitching support and some of the brightest rookies in any training camp. Alvin Crowder and Fred Marberry, the latter with 15 victories last year, are still exceptional right handers. Elton Hogelet and Charley Fischer are full of left handed relief work. Then there's a young southpaw named Clyde Hatter from Louisville, Mickey says "If he isn't a big league pitcher, then I never saw one."

Mickey will carry 10 pitchers, probably, through the season. Among them will be a big right hander, Steve Larkin, with Beaumont last season, and Joe Sullivan, southpaw from Hollywood, who won 25 games in the Pacific Coast League. Luke Hamlin has a fractured arm and is out most of the season, and the veteran Vic Sorrell may not stick along.
