FOR THE OVERSEAS BOYS.—The women of the "Women's Auxiliary Massachusetts Department of the Navy League," have started a movement to provide the American boys at the front with Christmas gifts, and to carry out the same have arranged for a real red, white and blue Christmas ship to carry the gifts over sea. In their appeal they say, "Fill up a 'Good Cheer Bag' and we'll send it along. Oct. 1, is the date fixed for the Xmas ship to leave. Don't let this Province be behind the Yankee sisters in this movement. Let everyone remember the boys also, and a movement in this direction will meet with a cheerful response. Explaining the plan for sending Christmas to the trenches and the battlefields, Mrs. Gardner Hall, chairman of the Women's Auxiliary, who has been directing the knitting service in New England, said "It is the intention to make the Good Cheer Bag more of a 'gift' than a 'comfort' bag, as the term is generally understood. We want to send Christmas to the trenches and ships, wrapped in tissue paper, tied with bright ribbons and decorated with love and hope and prayers, just as it is wrapped and tied and decorated when we keep it at home. It is strongly recommended that a Christmas card, with a personal message of good cheer and Christmas greetings with the name of the giver be enclosed, and the bag directed, as desired, to Army, Navy or Marine Corps."

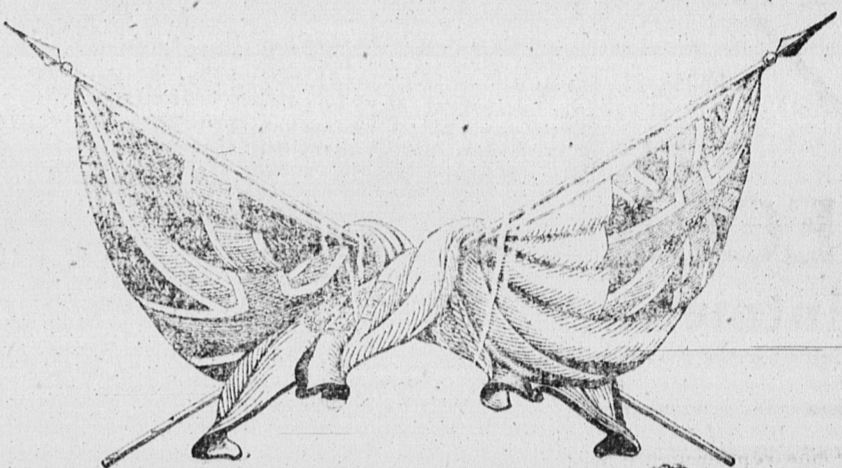
