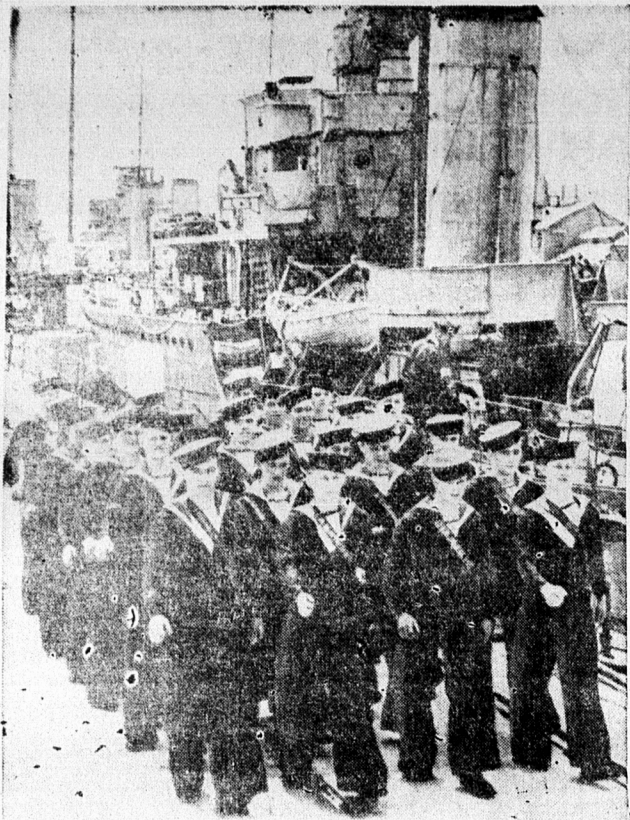


NEWS of the WORLD in PICTURES

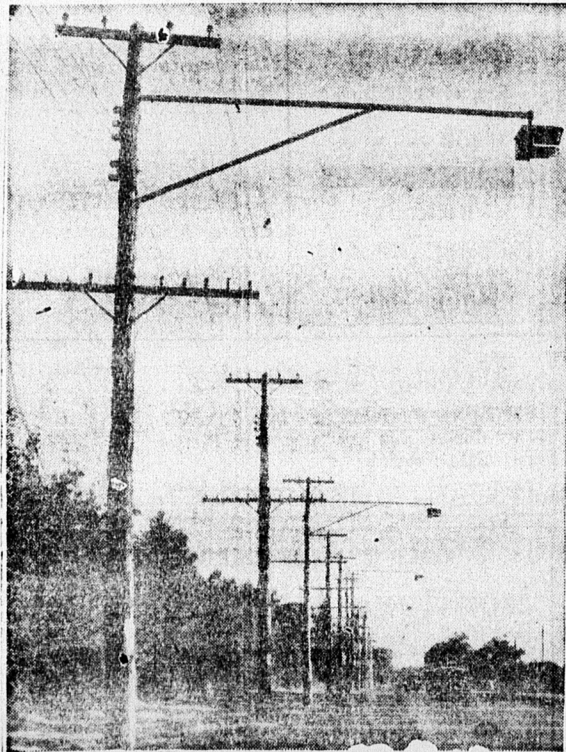

The gardens at Rideau Hall, Ottawa residence of the governor-general and his wife, will have the full interest of Princess Alice, who spends many hours in her own spacious grounds in Sussex. When Premier Hepburn returns to his Queen's Park desk, he will have to settle a controversy over costs of provincial highways, particularly the new Queen Elizabeth Way from Niagara Falls to Toronto. In Mr. H.P.'s both in the cabinet and among the rank and file of the large sums of money are being spent necessarily on "betterment" schemes and non-essentials. The lighting system, a section of which is shown, will cost \$200,000. Members contend the money and electric power could be used for war work. Additional thousands have been spent on extras like the road markers shown in (UPPER) picture. While the country is at war, expenditures should be pared and only absolute essentials retained on highway work, members say. At the approach to the Humber river in Toronto, thousands of evergreen trees (LOWER) have been planted.

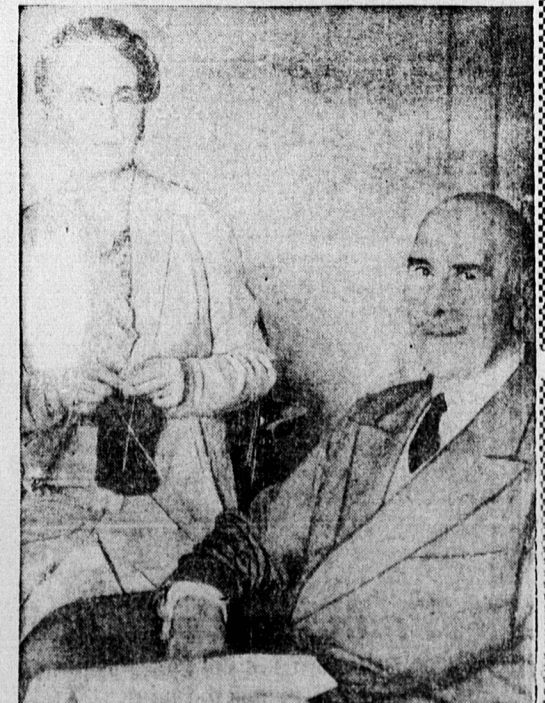
