## In Memoriam

**GEORGE H. PARKER**  
 DICKINSON, North Dakota, July 26.—George H. Parker, pioneer ranchman and banker of the North Dakota Badlands north of Medora, died at 7 a. m. today (Thursday) at the home of his nephew, A. S. Parker, in this city. Death was due to cancer. Conscious to the end, Mr. Parker, a few minutes before the final summons came, requested that he might be taken from his bed. He died in the arms of his nephew displaying the unconquerable spirit which is so characteristic of that rapidly vanishing race of old time cattlemen.  
 Although he had not been in the best of health for several years he did not realize the seriousness of his condition until this spring. He began to put his affairs in order and two months ago, accompanied by his wife he left for Prince Edward Island his childhood home, to pay his relatives a last visit.  
 While there he learned the nature of his ailment and decided to return to his western haunts to spend his last days, accompanied by his wife and sister-in-law, he arrived in Dickinson Sunday.  
 Funeral services will be held from the First Congregational Church Sunday at 1.30 p. m. Rev. Ralph V. Conard, the pastor, will officiate. Burial will be made in Dickinson cemetery. Pall bearers have been chosen from his associates among neighboring ranchers and associates at Medora. They will be William Follis, Jake Tomrichael, Chris Rasmussen, William Kunkel, William Neuns and G. R. Osterhout.  
 George Herbert Parker was born in St. Peter's Bay, Prince Edward Island, May 27th, 1861. On March 29th, 1887 he came west with his brother, the late J. C. F. Parker, to locate at Wibaux, Mont., then Minneapolis. The two entered the employ of the railroad G. H. Parker as bridge inspector, until 1896 when they established the P. D. ranch on the Little Missouri river, north of Medora. Later J. C. F. Parker came to Dickinson to enter the retail business. G. H. Parker remained on the ranch which he conducted until his death.  
 No rancher in all the Slope country enjoys a wider acquaintance than the deceased. He prospered in his cattle raising operations and took an active part in the development of the country and in neighborhood affairs. He was one of the organizers and at the time of his death was president of the Stockmen's State bank at Medora. He was married November 28th, 1901 at Lower Montague, Prince

 Discussing on that occasion what he described as "The restless en- croachment of that arrogant pre- tensions of bureaucracy in our midst," he said: "The name of self-government would be an irri- tating mockery if it became a vast army of anonymous officials hid- den from view placed above the law and administering a topsy-turvy system whereby the servants of the public would be its masters. That is a proposition upon which I do not propose to hold my tongue, so long as I have a tongue to use."  
 In a memorable address to the American Bar Association at Buf- falo last year he argued that the Rule of Law involved the absence of arbitrary power on the part of the Government and equality before the law.  
 Was there not, he asked an in- creasing development of bureau- cratic pretensions, the aim of which was to withdraw more and more matters from the jurisdiction of the Courts and to set them apart for purely official determination?  
 In the last few months the Lord Chief Justice has reiterated the warning he gave at Buffalo. At the Manchester Reform Club in Decem- ber last he argued that it was cer- tain that if there were superfluous or swollen departments the evils which they involved would not be limited to waste of money.
