POPE'S ANSWER ANTICIPATED

Members of Sacred College Urge Pontiff to Abandon the Neutral Stand.

Indications are that his holiness, the Pope, may declare for the allies in the name of justice and Christian humanity, and abandon his past position of strict neutrality, under the urging of members of the sacred college, prominent among them being Cardinal Mercier, Archbishop of Malines; Cardinal Amette, Archbishop of Paris, both of whom have pointed out that the Pontiff has unquestionable right to take a firm stand for moral principles which would govern all Christian nations in their reciprocal relations.

It will be well remembered that the late Pope's death was directly due to his grief over the stubborn Austrian intention of reprisal upon Serbia and that the Vatican bent every energy to prevent the terrible struggle in Europe is well known to the whole world. It never has been believed, however, that even with the influence of the Vatican brought to bear upon the German side of the debate, the allies at this stage of the strife will consent even to an armistice without a complete capitulation of the invaded territory and the granting of gigantic indemnities by Germany.

However, that is not impossible, for it appears that Germany has subtly intimated a willingness to discuss terms advantageous to Germany, this being of course the usual trend of diplomatic dicker, wherein Germany could expect nothing more than a restoration to status quo of the former state of affairs before the war.

The allies, however, will require of Germany the last tithe of repentance, and repayment for her aggressive, unbusiness, and loyal Canadians on that great day as well as all through the impending weeks of strife should show their approval of the nation's course by displaying on their house-fronts the Union Jacks now being supplied by The Guardian on practically gift terms to readers.

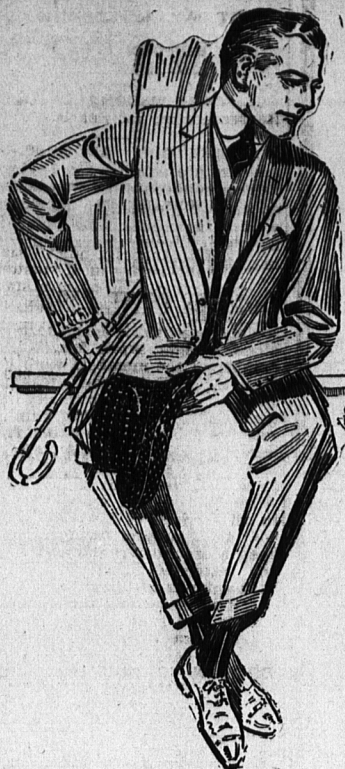
3,500 TROOPS ARE AT VALCARTIER

Three Units of Mounted Men Among Those Now Under Canvas.

QUEBEC, June 14.—All told there are now close on 3,500 men under canvas at the camp at Valcartier. Among the visitors to the camp on Saturday besides His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught, was Major General Hughes, who spent an hour on the grounds. Major General Hughes and staff, after assisting at the testing of several bombs and many rounds of artillery ammunition, left again for Ottawa.

Included in today's influx of troops to the camp were the 5th Canadian Mounted Rifles, Sherbrooke, in command of Lt.-Col. G. E. Baker, 550 strong, Lt.-Col. B.B. Morrill, is second in command.

Being the first to reach the camp today, the Sherbrooke unit dined up at Valcartier and welcomed the other units arriving during the day. The 4th Canadian Mounted Rifles, numbering 628, in command of Lieut. Chalwick also went under canvas today.

The 6th Canadian Mounted Rifles, 550 strong, in command of Lt.-Col. R. H. Ryan and Major Ings from the Maritime Provinces, are also at Valcartier.

Other detachments on the grounds are 41st French-Canadian battalion, Lt. Col. Archambault, O. C. strength about 850; 27th Field Battery, 154 strong, in command of Lt.-Col. Bruce Payne, Field Ambulance Depot, Montreal, 592, in command of Capt. Merseure; 57th French-Canadian battalion, in command of Lt.-Col. Paquet, strength 500.

After the main detachment of the 57th battalion had reached camp another group of 200 men in charge of Capt. P. E. Osteguy and Capt. U. Dupuis arrived with other small detachments from Fraserville and Three Rivers. Capt. Osteguy returned to Montreal this evening for more recruits.

Other units at the camp before yesterday were No. 5 Company, C.A.S. Co., in charge of Capt. Gillis, about 109 strong; Canadian Ordnance Corps, numbering twenty, in command of Major W. F. C. Sullivan and the 87th, strength 50, in command of Major Rinfret. The 87th, which have been at Valcartier for several weeks in furnishing guards for the internment camp where Austrian and German prisoners of war are held. These prisoners of war are being kept occupied during their sojourn in clearing bush lots, repairing roads, etc.

FRANCE TO INCREASE OUTPUT MUNITIONS

PARIS, June 10.—The French Government took action today for the purpose of increasing the country's output of war munitions. The plan decided upon is designed primarily to facilitate production by the private manufacturing concerns which are working on the national defence. Workmen who have been called to the front, but whose services are considered indispensable in particular branches of the industries affected will be brought back and sent to the factories, other men taking their places in the trenches. Everything possible will be done to increase the output of munitions.
