### PROMOTER RICKARD SUMMONED BY JURY

NEW YORK, July 26—Tex Rickard, promoter of the Dempsey-Carpentier fight and E. C. Quimby, motion picture producer, were summoned to appear before the Federal Grand Jury today to testify concerning the alleged transportation of movies of the fight into this state from New Jersey in violation of the Federal law.

Mr. Rickard has said he knows nothing of the transportation of the pictures or of the plans to show them here. Mr. Quimby also denied any part in their transportation, though admitting plans to exhibit them. His contention is that the Federal law prohibiting interstate transportation of pictures of a prize fight does not apply to the Dempsey-Carpentier bout as that historic sporting event was a boxing match and not a prize fight.

Several hundred persons attracted by advertisements and electric signs stop a theatre announcing first showing of the fight pictures last night, found the box office dry and were unable to gain any information as to when actual showing would take place.

### Heavy Fighting By The Moors

Spanish Troops Defeated in Early Engagements, But Recover Much of Their Lost Ground in Morocco

MADRID, July 27—Spanish forces which suffered a reverse at the hands of rebellious tribesmen in the Mellilla zone of Morocco have received reinforcements and repulsed all subsequent attacks against them. The newspapers say that the fighting continued, the enemy having received reinforcements, and that the Spanish troops, both peninsular and native, offered stubborn resistance.

Rumors are current here that Gen. Silvestre, commander of the Spanish forces at Mellilla, committed suicide on finding himself cut off and surrounded at the head of a small detachment some distance from the main Spanish position.

### King Confers With Cabinet.

King Alfonso, who was called to the capital from San Sebastian because of the Moroccan situation, visited the War Minister immediately after his arrival and then presided at the Cabinet meeting. The Moorish tribesmen, who were in great force, took from the Spaniards at the onset a position which the Spanish troops had previously captured and which the Spanish command mistakenly considered a small garrison was sufficient to retain. Under the terrific attack the Spaniards were obliged to yield this ground. The war minister issued a com-

unique saying that a native attack had compelled the Spanish troops under Gen. Silvestre to evacuate the Iberiguen, position and retire to the Annual position. The natives, however, the communique said, cut the lines of communication and a further retirement was necessary.

### Dairy Produce Markets Weaker

Butter Sold 4 1/2c Lower at St. Hyacinthe and 3 1/2c at Farnham Than Week Ago

MONTREAL, July 25.—The receipts of butter for the week ending July 23rd, were 21,718 packages which show an increase of 4,865 packages as compared with the previous week, and an increase of 4,986 packages with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1st, 1921, to date show an increase of 28,391 packages with the corresponding period in 1920.

The feature of the trade since this day week was the decided weakness that developed in the market, which resulted in auction sale prices closing with a net decline of 3 1/2 cents to 3 3/4 cents per lb., and late country board prices at a reduction of 3 3/4 to 4 1/4 cents per lb. for the week. This to some extent was attributed to the weak market for sterling exchange, but more so to the falling off in the demand from English importers for supplies and the weaker cables the prices bid being 10s to 15s per cwt. below previous purchases. This, coupled with the increased receipts of creamery butter, and especially so from the West, along with the falling off in the local demand were the depressing factors, and the market closed quiet with a weak undertone. The highest price paid for pasteurized creamery at the auction sales held here last week was 41 3/4 per lb.

and the lowest 38 1/8 cents per lb. while at the boards in the country the highest price was 40 7/16 cents per lb. and the lowest 35 1/4 cents per lb.

The receipts of cheese for the week ending July 23rd, 1921, were 74,880 boxes, which show an increase of 2,219 boxes, as compared with the previous week, and an increase of 15,149 boxes with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1st, 1921, to date show an increase of 63,471 boxes with the same period in 1920. Of the total receipts for the past week there were 10,400 boxes received from the United States, which makes a total for the season to date of 24,147 boxes.

A much weaker feeling has also prevailed in this market during the past week, which has been due chiefly to the same factors that depressed the butter market, and in consequence prices at the boards throughout the country scored declines ranging from 27-32 cents to 4-5 cents per lb., as compared with those paid the previous week. The highest figure paid was 23c per lb., at St. Paschal, and the lowest was 19 cts. per lb. at Perth and St. Hyacinthe, while at the auction sales here the highest price realized was 22 9/16 cents per lb. for No. 1 white and colored, and the lowest 21 1/4 cents and 21 5/16 cents per lb. while No. 2 white and colored sold at 21 3/4 cents and 20 3/4 cents. With reference to the above receipts of American cheese, exporters here in some cases state that they have been able to buy it and lay it down here for export at a much lower price than Canadian goods. The market on the whole for the past week has been much quieter owing to the somewhat limited demand from foreign buyers and the volume of business has been small.

Spencer Relph, custodian, department of state, according to a statement issued by Mr. Relph this afternoon. Those to whom either Bulgarian or Austrian nationals owe money should also notify the department. Canadians are now forbidden to pay debts to nationals of Czechoslovakia, without the written consent of the department of state.
