Chevrolet Announces Numerous Improvements

OSHAWA, Feb. 24—A product of three years' development work and more than a million miles of engineering research, the 1949 Chevrolet goes on display soon in dealer showrooms across Canada.

The latest model Chevrolet has been completely restyled, according to an announcement by General Motors Products of Canada. It is lower, wider and more distinctive than any previous series. Not only does the design introduce superior beauty to the lowest-price ranks, but numerous body and chassis improvements promise to add to Chevrolet's reputation for comfort, safety and convenience.

Two series of cars, the Fleetline and Styleline, are included, with De Luxe treatment an option in most body types. De Luxe cars lay increased emphasis on the styling of fabric, trim and appointments. The lineup shows:

Fleetline — Two and four-door sedans. This design is distinguished by the extension of the roof line in an unbroken sweep to the rear. Known to the trade as a "fast back," the form achieved great popularity on the 1948 two-door Aerosedan.

Two and four-door sedans, sport coupe, and special business coupe. Styleline sedans carry the "notch back." Here the curvature of the roof meets the rear deck at the body belt line.

In both styling and performance, the 1949 series continues the "big car" aspects that have always been traditional with Chevrolet. The design is fresh and substantial-looking without approaching the extreme comfort is reported demonstrably "ruled and ruled" by the rugged six-cylinder, valve-in-head engine remains fundamentally the same, but refinements will increase appreciably the car's handling ease and owner satisfaction.

The first impression of the new cars is one of smart styling, structural strength and generous dimensions. The entire passenger compartment has been moved forward, lengthened, broadened and lowered, affording a pleasing balance in proportions. The front fenders have been absorbed into the body, their vertical planes built flush with the doors. Crowns of the fenders have also been raised to fit more snugly into the hood and low, clean ensemble of the grille. To add grace and protect body surfaces, a partial rear fender has been retained.

From the passenger's standpoint perhaps the chief improvement in bodies is the immense increase in glass area. All windows have been deepened and widened. The windshield takes full advantage of broader bodies, curving inward at the narrowed pillars to improve sideway as well as forward vision.

ACE GALAXY OF STARS IN MGM'S TROPICAL MUSICAL, "ON AN ISLAND WITH YOU"

You'll yearn to be on an island with Esther Williams, Peter Lawford and Jimmy Durante when you see M-G-M's tropical Technicolor musical, "On An Island With You," current attraction at the Prince Edward Theatre.

With its all-laugh plot highlighted by such spectacular production numbers as an underwater ballet in which aqua-star Miss Williams is seen to advantage, and some wonderful dance routines featuring Ricardo Montalban and Cyd Charisse (reminds them in "Fiesta") the fast-paced story revolves about a motion picture troupe on location in the Hawaiian Islands. Jimmy Durante, as the company's harassed assistant director on whose slim shoulders all the "dirty work" falls, finds himself driven to the breaking point when the crew is augmented by a technical adviser in the person of Peter Lawford. For Lawford, in an attempt to break up the romance between Miss Williams and Montalban, kidnaps the star and holds her prisoner until her resistance melts away.

Durante's patience, in the meantime, melts away as well, but not to the extent of preventing him from giving forth with such hilarious ditties as "I'll Do the Strut-Away," with plenty of strutting, "Takin' Miss Mary to the Ball" and the now almost classic, "I Can Get Along Without Broadway."

Lawford also has a hit number in the plaintive "If I Were You" and his romantic scenes with Miss Williams will have both bobby-soxers and elder-agers wishing him well. Montalban scores as the fiery Latin leading man, Cyd Charisse proves herself a superb trouper, and the cast is given additional musical flavor in the person of Zaxier Cugat and his popular orchestra.
