CONDITION IMPROVED - The condition of John Cullen of Bordier, the driver of the car involved in the train-car collision near Boxwood on Thursday evening, shows some improvement but he is still on the danger list, according to reports from the Prince County Hospital last evening. His sister, Mrs. Thomas Talbot, who was a passenger in the car, is improved. Her injuries were not so serious as those of her brother. The accident took the life of Mr. Cullen's mother, Mrs. Joseph Cullen of St. Theresa's.

FUNERAL SATURDAY - The funeral of Thomas Soubis was held Saturday morning from the A. A. Hennessey Funeral Home to St. Dunstan's Basilica where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. P. F. MacDonald who also conducted service at the grave. Pall bearers were William McCobb, Frederick Carr, Edward Blanchard, Norman Campbell, Chester Brehaut and James Llewellyn. Interment was in the Catholic Cemetery. Representatives of the Canadian Legion B. E. S. L. attended the funeral and Comrade MacDonald read the service at the grave. Rev. MacDonald sounded the last post. Mr. Soubis was a veteran of the South African and First Great Wars.

One of the big events of the surrounding districts of St. Anthony's Credit Union was their annual meeting held on Tuesday night, October 18th. A well filled hall of members and visitors were present.

The meeting was called to order with the singing of O Canada. The order of business was the report of the Executive Committee followed by the report of the last annual meeting. The President, Mr. Melvin Bridges gave the report of the Directors. He stated that regular meetings were held and that the annual picnic held at Maxfield's shore on July 1st, and the annual dinner for all the officers and members was held on Tuesday evening, October 18th. A well filled hall of members and visitors were present.

Work started on Saturday on an addition to the Prince Edward Island Hospital which will provide extra office space and 14 new adult beds on the main floor and a thoroughly up-to-date modern nursery. The addition will provide 32 additional cubicles for infant cots on the second floor.

The addition will extend out from the east corner of the building in a north-easterly direction. It is the first stage of a larger plan for the development of a new wing of some 50 beds or more. The new wing will extend out from the south-west corner of the present main building and will be started when circumstances permit. Dr. J. Wendell McKenzie, medical representative on the Hospital Board told The Guardian last evening.

Messrs. M. F. Schurman & Co. Ltd. have been awarded the contract and it is hoped that the basement will be completed and covered over this fall. The remainder of the addition will be built of brick and a similar finish to the present structure, is expected to be completed next summer in May or June.

The death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital yesterday of William (Bill) Chandler, 32, well-known in Charlottetown sporting circles and a veteran of the Second World War. He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Harry Chandler, Charlottetown.

Not many friends of Bill realized the seriousness of his illness and his demise will come as a great shock to a host of friends, especially those with whom he was closely associated in the 2nd Medium Battery, R.C.A., and the Charlottetown Branch of the Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L.

The late Mr. Chandler, since his return from overseas, was employed in the Postal Department of the Charlottetown Post Office. Just prior to his last illness he was actively engaged in his duties and his friends were pleased to see him out and about apparently much improved in health. However a heart condition from which he suffered continued to beset him, and it was during an attack that he suffered an attack which eventually proved fatal.

The late Mr. Chandler had a pleasing personality, and his easy laugh and good nature made him a welcome guest at any function. He was a member of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown, and a strong supporter of the Canadian Legion. He served on the Executive of the Charlottetown Branch and was prominent in the promotion of the Legionnaires' hockey team. He attended West Hill School and entered the University of Nova Scotia, Charlottetown.

Fire breaking out about 9:45 last night completely destroyed the dwelling house of Mr. Frank H. Roper on the Mount Edward Road about a half mile from Charlottetown. Damage was estimated to be about \$8,000.00.

The fire was fanned by a south-wind which carried the sparks onto the large barn about 200 feet away. Valiant work by the City and Parkdale firemen prevented further outbreak.

The fire broke out in the attic of the house and was first detected by Mr. Roper's housekeeper, Mrs. Ella Platts. She warned Mr. Roper who ran out of the house to see the origin of the fire in flames. The origin of the fire was not determined.

Neighbors and firemen rallied quickly but the fire was too far advanced for the house to be saved. Most of the household effects downstairs except the stove and some of the furniture upstairs were carried out. Several men were nearly struck by falling plaster in their last attempts to salvage articles.

There were five persons in the house at the outbreak. Mrs. Platts, Mr. Roper and his wife, and Major and Mrs. McRae who were visiting.

This was the second serious fire in the house in recent years. In 1943 he lost a dairy and machine house.

The Parkdale Fire Department was standing by last night to smother any further outbreaks. The loss was partially covered by insurance.

Mr. Roper is a foreman with Schourms. His son Arnold who lives near the homestead operates the farm.

The blaze attracted a large number of people with all who arrived on time pitching in to help. The houses were parked all along the road and in the fields.

Mr. Nesbit has many relatives on Prince Edward Island and is very well known here. Since the death of his parents about twelve years ago he has been an annual visitor to the Province. The present Prince County Hospital with details will be retained and used, probably for chronic cases, after the new hospital is completed, according to Mr. W. E. Darby, K.C., president of the Board of Trustees of the hospital. Mr. Darby was queried on the matter in connection with a recent announcement that the full governing body of the hospital, approximately \$300,000, would be paid only if the old hospital is retained, as the grants are for additional hospital accommodation only.

Work on the new annex to the Red Cross building at the corner of Dorchester and Sydney Streets is progressing well and should be finished as far as carpenter work is concerned in another month. It was learned from the foreman, Mr. James Burke, Saint John, yesterday afternoon.

The building is being shingled and the windows are being installed at present. The partitions inside are up and will be ready for finish in about another week. The structure has a hopper roof with a three-foot projection.

The windows are of insular glass blocks and are being installed one at a time. There will be a transom above the windows.

The building will contain a demonstration, cloak and waiting-room and offices.

The Little Theatre Guild of Charlottetown began their seasonal activities last night with a three-act selection of plays presented in three one-act plays at the Empire Theatre that were well received by the good sized audience in attendance.

Judge H.L. Palmer, chairman of the 1948-49 adjudicating committee, expressed the opinion of the committee on last year's activities. They adjudged the play "Bygone Days" to be the best of the season. The best one-act play was adjudged to be "The Late Mary Cordell". The best female performance was stated to have been given by Miss Esther Pritchard, the best male performance by Mr. Frank Moran.

As intimated in The Guardian of October 21, His Honour Judge C. Gavin Duffy, K.C., retires today as Judge of the County Court for Queen's County, on attainment of the retiring age of seventy-five years.

A native of Kinkora where he was born November 2, 1874, Judge Duffy attended public schools, the University of Wales College and St. Dunstan's University before taking his law examinations. While at Prince of Wales in 1892 he took the scholarship for Prince County. After being admitted to the Bar in 1903 he went into partnership with Mr. Walter A. O. Morson, K.C., under the firm name of Morson and Duffy. He was appointed a K.C. in February, 1921.

He was Speaker of the Legislative Assembly under the Bell Government from 1919 to 1923 and was appointed County Court Judge in February, 1930. In his twenty years as a judge Judge Duffy has tried thousands of cases but not more than three were upset on appeal.

A few years ago Judge Duffy passed through a serious illness but he is now fully recovered, and his many friends will wish him continued good health in his well-earned retirement.

Concrete piles are being cast on Bruce Stewart's Wharf and dredging operations are well underway as the Canadian Dredge and Dock Company continue their preliminary work on the construction of the Railway Wharf.

There are 156 concrete piles to be cast and driven under the Railway Wharf. Half of these are termed long piles and half short piles. There will be twenty-six sets of six piles, with each set a different length. The longer piles will be used at the outer extremity of the wharf where the water is the deepest.

About 75 steel piles have been shipped to Bruce Stewart's Wharf from the Algoma Steel Company, Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario. They are about 70 feet in length and were estimated to weigh between two and three tons. More are expected soon.

The concrete piles, which vary in length, are 20 inches wide and 20 inches high. They are tapered at the end and topped off with a six-inch head of cast iron. One set is at work at the dredging operations on the east side of the Railway Wharf. A derisk scow arrived at the wharf from Tormentine several days ago.

Egg production on Prince Edward Island continues at a low level, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, supervising poultry products inspector. Pullets are not being brought into production as early as other years. This is probably due to poultrymen endeavouring to keep the adult flock into production due to prevailing high prices for eggs. Eggs are becoming more plentiful in the Maritimes with the result dealers have reduced paying prices. Quotations to producers for the ungraded product are now: A Large 48¢, AP 45¢, B 41¢, C 36¢, D 31¢, E 26¢, F 21¢, G 16¢, H 11¢, I 6¢, J 1¢. Dealers are quoted as retailing to consumers at AL 67¢, AP 63¢, AP 59¢, B loose 59¢.

The Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian National Railways will be allotted 500 National cars for the shipment of Island turnips this season. They were provided with last year. They were learned last night from Mr. H.C. Grayston, Montreal, Chief of Car Service.

Mr. Grayston, together with Mr. C.W. Rand, Moncton, Superintendent of Car Service, C.N.R., is carrying out a survey to determine the number of cars needed for the shipment of turnips from the Island during the season. They conferred with C.N.R. and Government officials here yesterday.

About 1,600 cars are to be allotted for the shipment of turnips, and about 1,500 for potatoes which will be approximately the same as last year. Mr. Grayston stated that the C.N.R. would have more cars in their disposal for service this year than they had last year.
