Formal Opening  
Of Montague  
Memorial School

The citizens of Montague School  
District are justly proud of the  
new school building which has  
just been completed and taken over  
from the contractor. It marks the  
consummation of years of planning  
by the leading men and women of  
the community, and the school it-  
self is really a credit to Prince  
Edward Island. The building is  
84 ft. long by 59 ft. wide—of bungal-  
o type. It has six large airy  
class rooms on the main floor,  
three on either side of a spacious  
hall, while the basement, which  
extends under the whole building,  
is divided into seven compart-  
ments. A splendid play room ex-  
tends the whole length giving a  
room in which the children can  
play on wet or stormy days. This  
play room is approximately 82 ft.  
by 30 ft. and has a 10 ft. ceiling.  
The other half of the basement is  
divided into six rooms—a toilet  
room, containing all modern con-  
veniences is provided at either end,  
one for the girls and the other for  
the boys. Then between these is  
located the pump room, that con-  
tains the pump, storage pressure  
tank, electric motor and automatic  
controls. Next is the furnace room,  
where an up-to-date steam heating  
plant is installed. Adjoining this is  
a room for storing equipment,  
supplies, etc.

Two double front doors, one on  
the East and one on the West,  
give entrance to the building. Broad  
stairways lead to the basement at  
both ends of the hall, so that no  
danger of crowding can occur. All  
doors open outward, and those of  
the class rooms open towards the  
nearest front door, thus giving  
quick exit.

All the woodwork in the hall and  
class rooms is of Douglas Fir,  
varnished natural colour, and gives  
the school a wonderful appearance.  
The rooms are 27 by 23 ft. and  
have a 14 ft. wall, which affords  
ample fresh air. The windows are  
high—coming within 18 inches of  
the ceiling—and each room has 48  
panes of glass 12 x 24 inches. The  
windows are all on one side of the  
room, thus permitting the light to  
enter under most modern ideas of  
lighting.

The building is ideally situated,  
very near the centre of the town  
on land partly purchased by the  
District and partly donated by  
the Community Welfare League. To  
the north extend about 9 acres of  
meadow, owned by the League,  
which is intended for a park and  
recreation purposes, so the child-  
ren will have more than enough  
play ground for all purposes.

The committee of citizens who  
had the work in charge are deserv-  
ing of the highest praise, and Mon-  
tagne School District is to be con-  
gratulated on this magnificent  
step forward.

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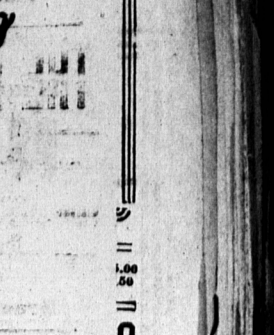
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
