TO CURE PORK

For 100 pounds of pork take 4 pounds salt and 2 pounds white sugar. Mix thoroughly, divide into three equal parts. Rub with one part of salt and sugar. Let it stand three days, then rub with second part, and in three days more rub with third part. Let it lie for about five days, then wipe off and dry. Hang it up to dry. When dry, slightly smoke, with hickory bark, if possible to get, or corncobs.

Are There Twice as Many Widows as Widowers Today Because Wives are Naturally More Devoted? Not at all, Says Dorothy Dix; It is Because Most Men Haven't Sense Enough to Marry Them

The census report shows that there are twice as many widows as there are widowers. Judging from the number of relics of the late 80 or 90 that we personally know, most of us would have thought that the ratio was even greater, for widows strew the earth as plentifully as the leaves in autumn, while widowers are almost as scarce as hens' teeth. Why a frail little woman should so often outlive a big, husky husband is one of the mysteries that science has not yet solved. It can't be because the wife works less hard than the husband does or because her burdens are lighter, because no other human being on earth toils such long hours or has such a nerve-wearing and responsible job as does the poor woman who does the cooking and washing and scrubbing and sewing and mending and penny-pinching for a big family. No man works as hard as she does, and in addition she throws in child-bearing, which is as dangerous and hazardous as being a steeplejack or a big game hunter.

Still, for all that, Mrs. Murphy has twice as good a chance of putting flowers on Mr. Murphy's grave as he has on hers. Two rich widows are manna from heaven to investment brokers where one man is, and the only plausible explanation that can be offered for this state of affairs is that somehow women being more patient and long suffering and inured to afflictions that man, stand matrimony better than they do.

Of course, the real reason why we number among our friends so many more widows than widowers is because being a widow is so often a permanent state with a woman, whereas with a man it is merely an interlude. Generally speaking, a widow stays a widow, but a widower rarely remains a widower. As soon as a decorous period of mourning is over he goes a-courting and gets him another wife. That is why the Bible is full of promises and consolations to the widow, while never a word is addressed to the widower. It isn't necessary, because he can go out and console himself any time he has a mind to.

That so many more widows than widowers remain apparently faithful to the memories of their dear departed need not be accounted unto them for superior faithfulness and devotion. It is only too often the dire result of necessity, for quite as many women as men would like to remarry and re-establish their homes if they could. Only the widowers can and the widows can't.

For whatever else marriage does to people it unfits them for living alone. A man and woman may not have been particularly happy with their first mates; they may have found a thousand faults and shortcomings in their Marias and their Johns; while their wives and husbands were alive they may have secretly longed for the single estate and felt that if they were free of the partners of their bosoms wild horses could not drag them to the altar again.

But let death emancipate them and as soon as the first wild joy in having their ball and chain stricken from them has passed they begin to feel like lost children who belong to nobody and have nowhere to go. The man who has been used to the routine of a home and to having a wife take care of him and to women's society discovers to his amazement that he is as helpless as a baby to look after his own comfort and that he has lost his taste for the company of men.

He finds out that it was one thing to have a night out now and then with the boys and another thing to spend every evening listening to club stories and club politics. He finds out that it was one thing to have a little fling, even if one had to pay for it by listening to a certain lecture, and another thing to be free to come back to his room whenever he likes because nobody cares whether he ever comes back at all or not. And he finds out how dreary it is to return from work to an unlighted room, to have to eat solitary meals that he orders himself, to have aches and pains and symptoms that nobody wants to hear about and to have no one to whom he can boast of his good fortune or on whose breast he can weep when things go wrong.

The widow finds herself equally stranded. Her husband may have been grouchy and cantankerous and hard to live with, but even so, he gave a point to life. He made things worth while. He was somebody to go out with. He was somebody to please. He was somebody to keep house for.
