### STATE COUNCIL OF KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS



**Destroying an Island**  
Breaking up an island is a feature of the construction of the great naval dockyard at Rosyth, Scotland, which is going on night and day uninterruptedly, except for the usual Sunday rest, there being over 3,000 men engaged in the work. An interesting feature of the work is the destruction of a whole island composed of whinstone. It lies right in the line of the channel and lock leading to the main basin, through which the largest battleships will be able to pass. Twice a day blasting operations are carried out, and the island is being conveyed ashore piecemeal, to be crushed by the stone-breaking machines for use with concrete.

**Signals at Grade Crossings**  
Danger signals at grade crossings being installed by one of the eastern railroads are expected to prove to be very effective. As soon as a train comes within a mile of the crossing the signal shows a red light and a gong that can be heard 500 yards away begins to ring. Both warnings continue to act until the train has passed, when the gong ceases and the red light changes to white. Should the wires become deranged, or should anything happen to the mechanism, the signal on the disk flashes to danger and remains there until repairs are made.

### NORTHWEST BRONCHO

Old-time Pony is Replaced by Finer Types

A rather pitiable thing about the advance of civilization is the shutting out of the broncho. The range horse of to-day is no more like the broncho of 10 years ago than the nerve-strained thoroughbred is like the Indian cayuse. All are passing away. Eastern methods of breaking are now used and gentler horses are the result. There is no longer a demand for the tough pony of 10 years ago, and so having passed the period of usefulness he is vanishing, but, as a reward of his fidelity, to reappear in a higher type.

The "mustang" combined with the ordinary horse produced the real broncho of the Northwest. There is not a phase of Western history that has not been largely influenced by this animal. Pioneer, cowboy, sheriff, Indian, prospector, all have used the broncho. He has been the cheerful companion of each of them. In fact he was the "sine qua non" of the exploitation of the West. The broncho has a good deal of treachery about him still, though not so much as the mustang. He is a rugged, useful animal that can travel along mountain ledges and live on next to nothing. When the Western broncho is broken he often becomes the gentlest of horses. No one, it is said, has ever successfully taught a wild horse to buck. As a matter of fact, it is not necessary. Bucking is a part of the animal's stock-in-trade. It has learned it instinctively. It is possible to break a horse of bucking, but to do it is not necessary to break its spirit, and the "wrangler" does that when he thoroughly conquers the animal. The broncho-buster who wants to preserve the spirit of the horse does not ride it to a finish. Horses are intensely human and "pestehy." Feeling that they have conquered makes them buck harder the next time, the cowboy attempts to ride them.

### AROUND THE FUR RANCHES

In a note published in this column with reference to the formation of the Mascot Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd., inadvertently the name of Mr. D. J. McMurdo was omitted from the list of provisional directors of the company.

"The Magic Silver Black Fox Co., Ltd." are increasing their capital stock. From \$190,000 they intend extending it to \$500,000, divided into shares of the same par value as before.

The Salisbury Black Skunks, Ltd., is one of the latest ventures in fur farming. The company is making application for incorporation in New Brunswick.

"The Leader Silver Fox Co., Ltd." and "The Henderson Silver Black Foxes, Ltd." are the proposed names of the two latest fox flotations in this Island. The former will have a capital stock of \$20,000, divided into shares of \$100 each, its chief place of business will be located at Tryon, and its provisional directors will be Dr. Nelson R. Boyver, of Crapaud, and Messrs. Walter B. Lea and Percy P. Callbeck, of Tryon. The Henderson Company will be formed with a total capital of \$100,000 divided into a thousand hundred dollars shares; its office will be situated in Bedeque, while its provisional directors are Dr. John C. Bailen, Mr. James F. Henderson, of Bedeque; Messrs. Alexander Henderson, of Fernwood, Lewis Trueman, of Sealstown; Maurice Weight, of Vancouver, B. C.

### PROHIBITION CASES AT SOURIS YESTERDAY

Before His Honor Mr. Arthur P. McQuaid, stipendiary Magistrate for King's County, at the Souris Magistrate's Court yesterday, J. A. G. Ellis, of Montague, appeared for trial on three charges of infractions of the Prohibition Act alleged to have been committed since December last year.

The charges were laid by Prosecutor Mead, and while Mr. J. D. Stewart appeared on behalf of the prosecution, Mr. J. Johnston appeared for the defendant. The sole purpose of Mr. Johnston's appearance was to make objection to Mr. McQuaid's jurisdiction as Stipendiary Magistrate, taking the same grounds of objection as he had taken in the cases in which the Supreme Court has just given its ruling upholding the Magistrate's jurisdiction.

Ellis was convicted on all three charges. For a second offence, of having sold, committed on the 17th December, he was fined \$200 and costs. For a first offence, also for selling, committed on the 18th December, he was fined \$100 and costs. The third charge was for having troated on his premises between the 16th and the 18th December, and upon that the defendant was fined \$20 and costs.

### MILITIA NOTES

It is gazetted that Supernumerary Lieut. P. H. Crockett, of the 82nd Regiment, having qualified himself for his appointment, is now confirmed in his rank; his appointment dating from June 27th, 1913.

Among alterations in Militia nomenclature recently announced, is that the Prince Edward Island Light Horse will in future be designated the 36th, P. E. I. Light Horse.

The P. E. I. Heavy Brigade, C. G. A., is among the Artillery units that are authorized to send detachments to the Artillery Practice Camp at Petawawa for four days' training. Before detachments are allowed to go to Petawawa, batteries or companies must have attained such a state of efficiency at their annual training as to enable them to carry out gun practice with advantage. No officer or man will be permitted to attend gun practice who has not attended annual training this year.

No. Four Battery of the P. E. I. Heavy Brigade had a very successful drill on Monday night, the turn-out being 118 of all ranks. Another drill will be held this evening, beginning at half-past seven o'clock promptly. Every member of the Battery must be present, as there are only three more drills before inspection day.

The parade of the Prince Edward Island Heavy Brigade will take place on Thursday evening, at seven o'clock sharp. Both Nos. Three and Four Batteries will turn out in full strength, together with the staff and the Regimental Band. The Brigade will move to Victoria Park, where they will engage in a series of Brigade manoeuvres and then will march through the principal parts of the city.
