**THE MASTER CALLS**  
While yet their brother Lazarus lay dead in the tomb, Martha brought word to her sister: "The Master is come and calleth for thee." As far as the narrative is concerned there is no peculiar significance in these words; but if we detach them they become like so many other words of Scripture, replete with suggestions. Let us apply them to ourselves: "The Master is come and calleth for thee."

Before He was born it was said to His mother: "Thou shalt call His name Jesus"; but He was known to mankind by many names.  
The call of this Master comes in many different ways. The call of duty which comes to men and women amid their various circumstances may be considered a clear call of a Divine Master. It is well to remember this, because the Christian life in its outward manifestation is about one hundred percent a matter of duty-doing. The farmer who wakes on a summer morning hears a call very different from a soldier who wakes in a military camp in a time of war; but to each the call may be considered a Divine call. Sometimes the Master calls in the contacts we make with our fellows.

But there is an inner ear which man possesses and within the human heart a call is heard which those who hear it may know to be the voice of Christ Himself. A doubting world may be deaf to any such voice; but to those who hear it and heed, it becomes one of the most real experiences in life. The voice has been heard and men and women who were living like wild beasts of a jungle have turned from their wicked ways and begun the ascent towards sainthood. Lives all feverish and storm-tossed and aimless have heard it and found a calm, a rest and a purpose which makes life worth while.

Rudyard Kipling speaks somewhere of "masterless men," and the one great tragedy in life is the man or woman who does not hear the call of Christ, nor own His way. In a world such as is ours in the present hour how great is the need that above the noise and strife the clear voice of Christ be heard. To each of us it may be said: "The Master is come and calleth for thee."

**Egg Receipts Are Increasing**

The increasing volume of egg receipts in this Province continues to keep assembly points at Charlottetown taxed almost to capacity. Mr. F.M. Nash, senior poultry products inspector announced yesterday in a regular Dominion Department of Agriculture egg and poultry market report Mr. Nash continued, three carlots were inspected for the Special Products Board during the past week bringing total shipped to date to the Board to 440,040 dozens. Retailers report egg sales heavy. Quality is holding well. Receipts for the past week are now equal to those of corresponding week last year. There are no changes in prices. P.E.I. stations are quoting for ungraded eggs delivered: A large 30-2; A medium 28-90; A pullets & B 23-4; C 17.

Graded shipments delivered Charlottetown: A large 35-6; A medium 33-4; A pullets & B 29; C 22. Specialized producers are receiving for cartoned pack: A large 40-1; A medium 38-9; A pullet 33. Poultry receipts are very light, consisting mostly of fowl, and are not sufficient for local demand. One cannery continues operations.

**Forecasts New Wage Demands**

**OTTAWA, April 2** — (CP) — Pat Conroy, secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Congress of Labor, in a statement today said removal of a large number of price controls, announced yesterday by Finance Minister Abbott, would lead to "further wage demands by workers and to industrial unrest."

He charged the "disparity" between productive capacity of industry and consumer purchasing power was becoming "steadily greater," and would lead to another economic depression.

The 400-word statement added that it was apparent the Government had yielded to pressure from a "small minority," and had paid "no attention" to the mass of the people. It said partly: "In the face of demands by the entire labor movement and by farmers and consumers' organizations throughout Canada for the restoration of price-controls, the government has now removed controls from thousands of additional items."

"A larger number of these items enter into the budget of every worker and farmer in Canada, and have the effect of a general reduction of income for every consumer. Even before this latest evidence of disregard for the wishes of the people, the government has removed controls much too rapidly, as was shown by the fact that the price of the items decontrolled were immediately advanced."

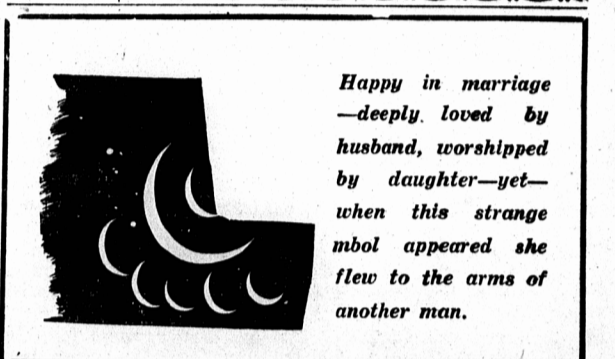

**Much Used Lumber Salvaged At Debert**

**OTTAWA, April 2** — (CP) — A total of 1,666,702 board feet of lumber, salvaged from the Debert, N. S. military camp has been sold to veterans at a total price of \$68,066. A. J. Brooks (PC-Royal) was informed today in a return tabled by Reconstruction Minister Howe.

Preference in the purchase of the lumber has been given to veterans, the sales being made by War Assets Corporation to veterans designated by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation.

Of the total, 461,832 board feet were sold direct to veterans at a price of \$18,846, while 1,204,870 board feet was sold for \$44,541 to Dwelling Electrical and Construction Supplies, the officially-appointed agents of Central Mortgage and Housing, for re-sale to veterans. The latter price did not include a 15 per cent handling charge, the return said, which brought the actual price to veterans to \$51,222.

**Subsidies On Oats, Barley To End Aug. 1**

**BRANDON, Man., April 2** — (CP) — Agriculture Minister J. G. Gardiner said here last night that the subsidies paid by the Federal Government on barley and oats used for feeding purposes will be discontinued next Aug. 1. The present subsidy on barley is 26 cents a bushel and on oats 10 cents. Speaking at a banquet tendered the Manitoba winners in the national barley contest, the Federal Minister said the only guarantee
