DENOUNCED TIPPING IN LABOR SERMON

HAMILTON, Sept. 11.—The tipping system was bitterly denounced from the pulpit here on Sunday night by Rev. A. E. Mitchell, pastor of Knox Presbyterian church, in the course of a labor sermon.

"If there is one thing that I detest, and, perhaps it is not as bad in Canada as other countries, it is the miserable system of the tip," said Mr. Mitchell. "I would that the working people would rise up in rebellion and compel corporations to pay an honest wage and destroy the barabaz system, for it is nothing more than a relic of barbarism. There are people who live today for the tip. It is a tip everywhere you go. I am told that the girls in some of the large hotels of the country pay the proprietors to be allowed to wait on table so profitable is the tipping system. It is one of the evils we should use a battering ram to smash."

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY UNDER NEW REGIME

MONTREAL, Sept. 11.—Hon. Henry R. Emmerson, former Minister of Railways, is suspending his judgment as to the success of the new regime on the Intercolonial railway. At the time Hon. G. P. Graham made the announcement in Parliament he expressed his doubt that the change would result in the finances of the road, and he is still in rather a sceptical attitude.

"It is not much of a change, you know," he said to the Star at the Queen's hotel this morning, in reply to a question as to how the new regime was succeeding. "It is merely substituting a one-headed management for a one-headed management. The road is now managed by four men instead of one, and each man has one-fourth of the power of a manager. That is all."

"Well, they are reducing the staff and economizing, are they not?"

"The question is," replied the ex-Minister, "whether it is economy. I have always maintained that the Intercolonial was not overmanned. Of course, it may be, if a some cases two men have been doing one man's work and they have let the extra man go and the work is being done just the same, and they are economizing. For any case of that character the new management will deserve the highest praise. But you can easily cut down your repairing staffs without economy. If you have so much repairing to do, you need so many men to do it. It is easy to let some of the men go and have the repairing go on to another year. But would that be economy? The repairing would have to be done sooner or later. No, I do not think that the Intercolonial is overmanned, and I have the figures which will prove it, that is, as compared with other roads."

"Is there dissatisfaction in the Maritime Provinces as a result of the new management's reductions in staff?"

WESTERN PEOPLE SURPRISED.

"As to that I cannot say. I have been there very little of late. The Maritime Provinces—people are just as anxious for wise economy on the Intercolonial as is anybody. They know the road better than the western people do, however. I have taken a number of western people down to see the road, and they have been surprised how well it was operated."

"But there is one idea which you want to make clear," added Mr. Emmerson. "That is, that the road is not managed by a commission. It is being managed by the Minister just as it was formerly. The only change is that four men have been substituted for one. It is not commission control."

"Would you favor commission control?"

"I would favor anything that will make the road a success. I was the cautious answer. I am anxious above all to see the road pay and give the people a good service, and I will favor any system which will produce those results."

Mr. Emmerson was passing through Montreal on his return from a trip to Virginia and Ohio, where he is inter-

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land, Ore. He went to Seattle in 1895 and was appointed to the police force June 15, 1898. For three years he was a patrolman, then was clerk for three years, and was appointed sergeant February 1, 1904.

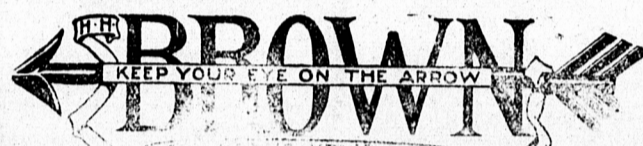

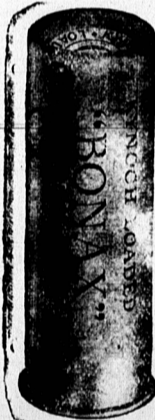

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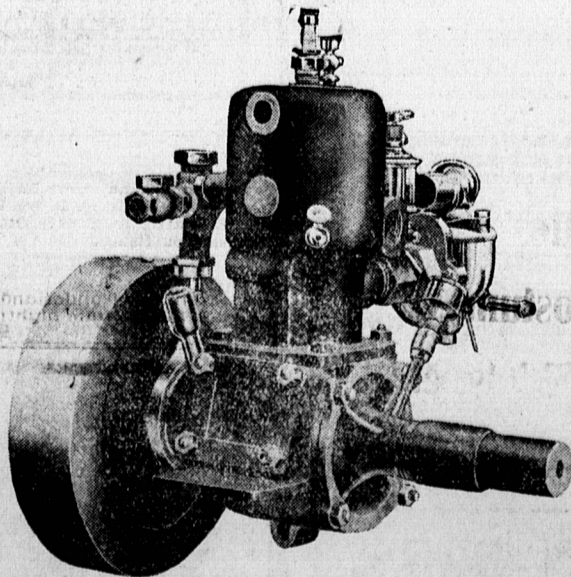
