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SUGGESTS PRINCE OF WALES FOR THRONE OF IRELAND

Lord Hugh Cecil Has Novel Scheme to End the Present Situation: Ireland Would Have Army but no Navy Under the Proposal.

BELFAST, May 17.—Lord Hugh Cecil, member of the Privy Council of Great Britain, who is the guest of Lord Londonderry's family in Mount Stewart, County Down, has suggested a scheme by which Ireland would be made an independent kingdom, its king to be a member of the Windsor family, probably the Prince of Wales, to be appointed by the King.

No Navy Allowed

Ireland under the plan would be allowed to have an army but no navy and in the event of war the King of Great Britain could suspend the Irish constitution. Irishmen in the colonies would have the right to choose whether they should be subjects of the Irish or English king. If favorably received by the Irish leader the scheme would be submitted to a constituent assembly.

MONTREAL, May 17.—Indicting England as the greatest murderer in history and declaring that as long as such murderers were going about the world under the Union Jack he would be a rebel and that he was a rebel because he was a Christian, Armand Lavergne of Quebec City, last night ransacked the dictionary for denunciatory epithets in respect of Great Britain, when he addressed a crowded meeting here held under the auspices of the self determination for Ireland league.

Sinn Feiners On Rampage In London

LONDON, May 17.—Three arrests have been made by the police in connection with Saturday night's attacks on residences in London and suburbs on relatives of members of the Royal Irish Constabulary and attributed to Sinn Fein campaign to terrorize London, a number of houses and other buildings were set on fire, three persons wounded and one probably fatally.

70-Year Old Australian Man Succumbed to Over-Dose of Regeneration

The cause of his death has not been established, but it is believed to have been heart failure.

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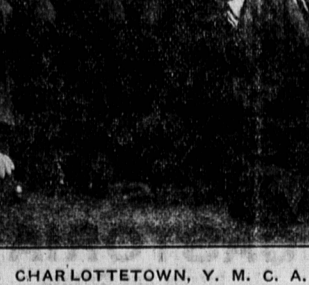
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CHARGES BY SINCLAIR

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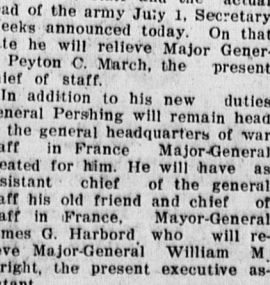
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NURSES' GRADUATION
