MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Nothing of importance before Board—Firemen Making Preparations for Tournament

The regular meeting of the City Council took place last night. His Worship Mayor Pate presided, and all the Councillors, with the exception of Councillor Frowse were in attendance.

After the reading of minutes and routine business, a number of communications were read and considered. An application from the Firemen's Tournament Committee for the use of Victoria Park, on the evening of August 2nd was favorably considered.

A complaint about the well known drain in front of the premises of John Bolger, Water Street, was read, and some of the councillors expressed the opinion that the matter should be attended to.

A request from the Absegweit Athletic Club asking for the loan of some of the City street lamps to be used in connection with the electric sports, was referred to a committee to decide upon.

A letter from the Y. M. C. A. asked for exemption from taxation of all the property of that institution which was not producing any revenue.

A largely signed communication was read with reference to extending Rockford Street to the north of Boston, but nothing definite was arranged in regard to the matter.

DEATH OF THE REV. J. D. MURRAY

MONCTON, N. B., July 8.—The death of Rev. J. D. Murray, one of the oldest and best known Presbyterian ministers in the maritime provinces, occurred at his home in Buctouche at an early hour this morning.

Deceased had been in failing health for the last two years but was only confined to bed for two weeks. Rev Mr Murray was born at Middle River, Pictou county, (N. S.), March 27, 1834, being seventy two years old.

He labored in the ministry forty one years and during that period received into the church 400 souls, baptised 1,100, officiated at 230 marriages and performed the best rites at 242 burials.

SUNDAY OBSERVANCE BILL DEBATED IN THE SENATE

Quebec Senator Objects to Stopping Sunday Horse Races in His Province and Further Amendments are Proposed to Relieve Jews and Adventists, Also to Require Assent of Provincial Attorneys General to Any Prosecution.

OTTAWA, July 9.—(Special)—The Lord's Day Bill was before the Senate today. Senator Scott introduced it and in general he favored the measure. He did not propose to discuss the question whether the observance of the law could be enforced by legislation.

Provinces could not complain, as the Bill preserved to them all the rights they had under the B. N. A. Act to enact Sunday legislation. Senator Choquette objected to the clause forbidding games and entertainments where a fee is charged.

There is no doubt the Lord's Day Bill will pass the Senate and become law without amendments affecting any initial principle of the measure. The debate was continued during the evening and the general opinion seemed to be that the law would prove difficult of satisfactory enforcement.

PEASANTS IN BAD CONDITION

ST. PETERSBURG, July 8.—The first paragraph of the proposed Agrarian law, viz: the augmentation of the lands of the peasants by the expropriation of all state and crown domains, and church and monastery lands, has been accepted by the commission of the lower house with practical unanimity.
