CURRENT COMMENT

(Repeated from yesterday)

Continuing our consideration of that Bell Government SURPLUS of about \$3,000, WHICH ACCORDING TO THEIR OWN PRE-ELECTION ESTIMATES, SHOULD HAVE BEEN NEARER 300,000, figured upon the basis of their increased taxation, and ON THE ECONOMY which the Conservatives should have exercised, with the \$200,000 increased revenue which was "AMPLE" to meet EVERY REQUIREMENT, we suggest a very close scrutiny of such of the Accounts as are available. It must be taken into consideration that these have been prepared with the special object in view of hiding as far as possible the mismanagement of the Government, and with this thought before us to take nothing for granted, for if we do, past experience has demonstrated that we will be badly fooled. It is the hidden things which we must bring to light, and in dealing with this aggregation accept only what is proven. Let us next consider the fact that a LARGE PORTION OF THE 1919 REVENUE WAS PURPOSELY CARRIED OVER INTO THIS YEAR, with the double object in view, first of CREATING A FALSE DEFICIT against the Arsenault Government, and then of providing an INFLATED OR FICTITIOUS SURPLUS for their own year 1920.

This revenue of 1919 which was carried over by the Bell combination into 1920, WAS BY ALL HONEST REASONING the property of the 1919 year of business. It was levied and ordered for that purpose. IT WAS NOT IN ANY PROPER SENSE A PART OF THE LEGITIMATE INCOME OF THE YEAR 1920, AND NO SOPHISTRY OF ARGUMENT BY THE ACCOUNT MANIPULATORS COULD MAKE IT SO. But they held it over and are crowing in credit over it. Deducting this amount from their admitted receipts, what an awful hole it put them into. If we deduct the arrears of taxes collected by them amounting to \$69,816.71 and the \$37,000 profits on their liquor business, as shown by the statement tabled at the last session of the House, MAKING A TOTAL OF \$106,816.71 from their financial statement, it would leave them with a DEFICIT ON THEIR OWN TRANSACTIONS, AMOUNTING TO \$102,763.49. Only because they had this hundred and six thousand dollars, which they improperly appropriated from Premier Arsenault's period, were they enabled to juggle up this paltry and fictitious little \$3,000 surplus. WHAT IN THE NAME OF COMMON SENSE WOULD THEY HAVE DONE IF THEY HAD NOT THIS MONEY BELONGING TO THE LATE GOVERNMENT TO FALL BACK UPON, AND TO HELP THEM OUT? With all their enormous taxation the spendthrifts would have been ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS IN THE HOLE. And yet they had the gall to talk of the late Government's deficits manufactured by themselves.

Another impressive, almost fabulous, relation is made on page 46 of the Auditors Report. It is an excerpt or selection from the report of the Prohibition Commission. It does not pretend, and confidently we may add IT DOES NOT TELL THE WHOLE STORY, but only as limited a portion of it as the Government considers it convenient to disclose. It goes so far as to admit an actual PROFIT OF \$57,000 ON THEIR LIQUOR BUSINESS, but it does not declare this to be ALL THEIR PROFITS from this lucrative branch of the public service. Now we are not complaining, but simply calling public attention to certain actual facts, and incidentally refreshing their memories on matters of important past history. What we particularly would refer to is the bounding down, the vituperation and abuse of the late Government, by Mr Bell and his contingent, accentuated with all the scurrility that its expert mud-slingers or the Patriot could command, and by its speakers in the House and

on the platform, DENOUNCING THE TAKING OF PROFITS FROM THE POOR, THE SICK AND NEEDED. And with it we remember those emphatic and oft repeated promises to supply these ligors for medicinal purposes AT ACTUAL COST. We will not entangle upon this at present but may revert to the subject when more information is available.

Under another of its LUNAR brainstorms the Patriot has started in, babbling about the Criminal Code, suggesting in its usual incoherent way that it contains and prescribes penalties for those who "advise" against the "payment of taxes." If these provisions are not in the Code they certainly should be. It will be a necessary protection to the Conservative Government after the next election—WHEN THE PATRIOT GETS BACK AGAIN TO ITS OLD-TIME SLANDER TACTICS, and a wholesome check to the unprincipled campaign which it is certain to repeat. There are other things not now in the Criminal Code, but which should be there. There should be severe punishment for irresponsible newspaper editors who are incapable of correctly reading a paragraph in an opposing journal, from making any references to public statutes which they can neither read or understand. There are, however, enactments with suitable penalties against private individuals using the "processes of the Court" for unlawful purposes, and these laws should be so amended as to include and punish adventurers in the departments of Government when trampling the sacred prerogatives of justice in the dust, in order to extort money UNLAWFULLY FROM AN ALREADY OUTRAGED PEOPLE. There should for instance be the severest punishment for those holding the seals of office as the King's Ministers who take advantage of their position to intimidate weak minded people into making payments of cash, without the sanction of law.

If for instance a private individual were to prepare a bogus execution, SIGNED BY AN INDIVIDUAL WITHOUT ANY AUTHORITY AT LAW, and offer it to a Sheriff, the King's officer for execution, he and the sheriff and all concerned in the transaction, would be up against the penalties. But our Department of Taxation can send out those executions, with impunity, signed by the Assistant Provincial Treasurer, WHO HAD ABSOLUTELY NO AUTHORITY to sign them, and because the responsible person, the Provincial Treasurer, whose signature to the documents was REQUIRED BY THE STATUTE, was evidently unwilling to take the risk of appending his name. There should be something even further than this, in the form of a stern and strict law, disqualifying any man from holding a public office who is incapable of adopting honest means for the collection of His Majesty's revenue whether that officer holds the trifling post of the lowest subaltern or the exalted position of the chancellorship of the department.

And the Patriot says no man would "dare" speak these things on the floor of the House. It was on the floor of the House they were first spoken in burning words of the most scathing denunciation, it was there that the leader of the Opposition and Mr. J. D. Stewart painted the iniquities of their procedure in language unmistakably direct. They told them direct from the shoulder that it was UNJUSTIFIABLE "ABUSE OF THE PROCESSES OF THE COURT," that it was "THE MOST DRASTIC THING EVER SEEN ON THE STATUTE BOOKS OF THIS PROVINCE." The Hon. Mr. Arsenault declared that, "Where the sheriff WAS NOT ABLE TO COLLECT BY INTERDICTATION he had to stop—the EXECUTIONS WERE A BLUFF, simply AN ABUSE OF THE PROCESS OF THE LAW." Could anything be stronger and more emphatic? This question of the Criminal Code has been introduced by the Patriot, and it is so exceedingly interesting in its application to the biggest parcel of law disregarding administrators that ever cursed the country, that we cannot resist the temptation to deal with it still further in next Comment.

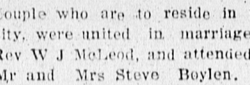
