The Inter - Mar. Rifle Match At Sussex To - Day

This match will be shot today between teams of eight men representing Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, at Sussex, N. B., commencing at ten o'clock.

The history of the Match is as follows. In 1861 the New Brunswick Government offered a valuable trophy as an Intercolonial prize and graciously invited teams of twenty men from Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island to compete for it at Sussex early in October. The ranges were 200, 500 and 600 yards. Contrary to expectations the Prince Edward Island team won the match and themselves with glory. Their average per individual was 14.1, New Brunswick 12 1/2 and Nova Scotia 11.3. Patrick Hickey of Charlottetown was the highest scorer and won the Grand Prize with 24 points.

On the team's arrival home they were met by hundreds of their fellow citizens and given a great ovation. Patrick Hickey became the Island hero and the poet LePage wrote a poem commemorating his achievement, one of the concluding verses of it is:

"Success to Hickey three times three,
The champion marksman hale,
That plucked the laurels from the tree
Which grew in Sussex vale."

In 1886 a new Inter-Maritime Match was arranged and a beautiful new trophy which cost \$500 was purchased. We believe that the three Governments contributed towards its cost. This trophy has

LESS CASH AND FEWER OFFICIALS

Canada's Olympic representation this year at Los Angeles will be smaller than at Amsterdam in 1928. The committee is up against a shortage of funds and although more money is available than has been announced, the amount now in sight is a long way short of what it cost to send 116 athletes across the water four years ago. The number of officials who will accompany the team will also be cut. Twenty-eight went to Amsterdam. The 1928 fund was \$100,000. Less than half of that is on hand this year. For Canada's 1928 expenditure this country got four firsts, four seconds, and eight thirds. Percy Williams accounted for two of the firsts, and unless he repeats this summer, it is likely that this country will have less to show for the 1932 effort.

Williams is the only Canadian who has won a double Olympic championship, his victories in the 100 and 200 metres gaining him that distinction. Besides Williams' victories Canada has won five Olympic championships since 1900 in the track and field events, as follows: Desmarteau—56-lb. weight, 1904. Sherring—Marathon, 1906. Kerr, 200 metres, 1908. Goulding—10,000 m. walk, 1912. Thompson—110 m. hurdles, 1920. Thompson and Goulding are the only two Canadians who hold world records, the former in the 120 yards hurdle and the latter in the mile walk.

The attendance at the games is expected to exceed 2,000,000. The state of California has voted \$1,000,000 toward the expenses of the games and a further \$500,000 will be raised from other sources.

WILLIAMS IN FORM

It is understood that Percy Williams is back in form, and again hopes to represent Canada at the Olympic games. With Williams on the job our hopes of again annexing the sprint title seem fairly bright.

It would be a glorious thing for Williams to win the Olympic sprint title again; it would be something that no sprinter has yet accomplished. Williams met and defeated a number of great sprinters at the Amsterdam games, when he was only a green youngster. With four years added to his age, and with more assurance than before, the Vancouver boy might easily repeat at Los Angeles.

However, Williams has yet to make the team, and the Olympic trials, which are to be held at Hamilton in July, will settle the question.
