SAFE SONIC SPEED SOUGHT BY SCIENCE

WEYBRIDGE, Surrey, England, May 5 — (CP) — To obtain data on flight at supersonic speeds, Vickers-Armstrong, airplane manufacturers, will build three large wind tunnels here at an estimated cost of £200,000 (\$800,000). Officials believe tests carried out with models will eliminate almost all hazards of initial flights with aircraft designed for supersonic speeds.

First of the tunnels to be built will have a testing section 13 feet by nine feet, an over-all length of 600 feet and a height of 40 feet. A speed of 350 feet a second will be reached in the test section by means of a seven-bladed 24-foot propeller.

A smaller tunnel will be used for routine tests. The third will be used largely to study compressibility phenomena at speeds above 2,000 miles an hour at sea level.
