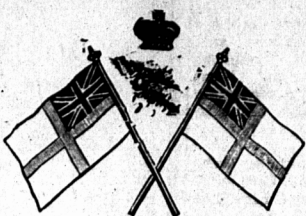

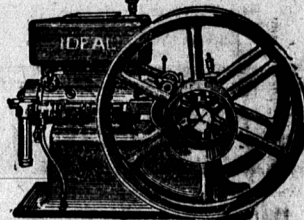

WESTVILLE, July 5—In a fast and interesting game of baseball, Halifax defeated the home team by a score of four to one. Both pitchers, Innor for the Socials and Lamb for Westville, received excellent support. The Socials got 10 hits off Innor, but he kept them well scattered. The fielding of P. Kelly was the feature of the game, figuring in two double plays, one of them being unassisted.
CYPRUS PROSPERING.
LONDON, July 2—A correspondent writing from Nicosia, Cyprus, recalls that just 24 years ago the island was handed over to the custody of the English people by the treaties of a great English prime minister. The annexation was the outcome of the Berlin conference of 1878.
The proclamation of the proposed British occupation of Cyprus was received with astonishment, not only in England, but throughout Europe, by a generation continually electrified by the picturesque statesmanship of Disraeli. The move created something like consternation in France, where it was regarded as a sign of the intention of England to extend her eastern possessions under pretext

of supporting Turkey against Russia. As a matter of fact Disraeli's sole concern was to prevent further encroachments by Russia, which might ultimately forward her ambitions on India, and he felt that by occupying Cyprus he could safeguard the Suez Canal, at the same time keeping a vigilant eye upon Russia.
A MONARCH DEPOSED.
OTTAWA, July 5—An order-in-council has been passed deposing a monarch. It does not often happen that the government is called upon to unseat a real ruler but it has been done in this instance and one Baptist Logan became a common man. The owner of this appellation is or was the big chief of the Okanagan Lake band of Indians in British Columbia and a powerful potentate in those parts. Chief Logan became addicted to the intemperate use of the white man's firewater. Under the Indian Act, an Indian chief can be deposed for intemperance, incompetence or immorality. Chief Logan imbibed so freely that it has been decided to depose him. The tribe will elect a temporary chief.

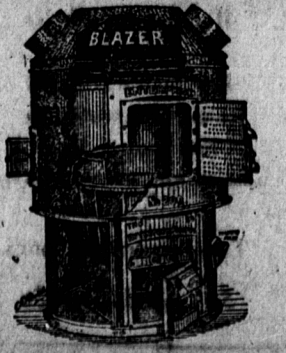
