REMARKABLE CASE OF BIGAMY EXPOSED

Married Resident of St. John Marries Chatham Girl.

A most remarkable example of rascality and gall was unfolded in the Chatham Police Court on Friday, when Francis C. Stocks, of St. John, said to be an Englishman and returned soldier, confessed to the crime of bigamy and was remanded for sentence after Rev. Dr. Wylie had appeared on his behalf and addressed the court, pleading that the cheeky scoundrel be let go on suspended sentence.

At Chatham despatch today says: The man in the bigamy case is Francis Stocks and his wife says he came out to this country twelve years ago, met her in St. John about four years ago, and after six months acquaintance were married.

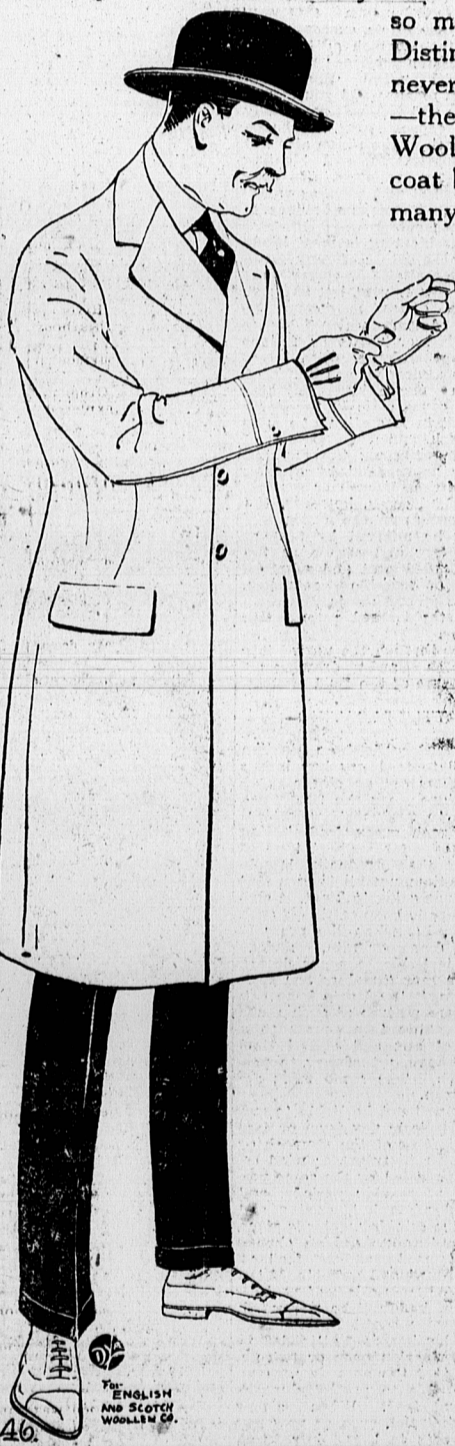
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
