**MR. S. A. MACDONALD AND THE MAYORALTY**—A largely and influentially signed petition was presented on Tuesday evening to Mr. S. A. Macdonald inviting him to allow himself to be nominated for the Mayoralty. After giving the matter due consideration, Mr. Macdonald thanked the deputation which waited upon him, and said in view of the fact that two Candidates were already in the field and that his nomination would appear like taking undue advantage of the situation he had decided not to comply with the request of the petitioners. On another occasion they desired him to come forward he would be prepared to give a more favourable answer.

**PRE-CANCELLED STAMPS**—The use of pre-cancelled stamps or (stamps cancelled before actually used for payment of postage) on mail matter other than Letters is permitted in some of the larger centres, where extensive mailings are made. These stamps are cancelled with a special die bearing the name of the mailing office, and as they are to be procured by separate requisitions, from the Department at Ottawa, applications should be made some time before they are required for use. These stamps may be used only when the postage on any mailing aggregation \$10.00 or over, that is, the minimum number of identical pieces of mail matter bearing pre-cancelled stamps that may be posted at a mailing is 1,000 pieces each bearing a one-cent pre-cancelled stamp, or 500 pieces each bearing a two-cent pre-cancelled stamp or equivalent lots. Authority has been extended to Charlottetown Post Office to obtain pre-cancelled stamps, and applications for the same may be made at the Postmaster's office.

I had a couple of letters from some of the boys since they went away, and they tell me I am lucky. They are up in billets near the trenches and one of the boys was drowned by falling into a shell hole. His name is Macdonald. I think he came from Ottawa. I got a parcel from Mrs. Taylor tonight cake and candy etc., it went fine believe me. I am not getting your letters I think they are going to France and it takes so long to get them back. The weather is very broken here now raining almost every day. Well I guess that I will stop for now, hoping to hear from you soon I remain as ever, with love to all, JAMES.—Address—No. 478955, P. P. ## SIR ROBERT MAY NOT GO TO LONDON

LONDON, February 1.—Altho the London Times has been suggesting that Sir Robert Borden should pay another visit to England in order to meet the Australian and New Zealand ministers expected, and thus have some sort of colonial conference, it is not thought likely here that the Canadian premier will come, so long as the political situation at Ottawa is unsettled.

## INTERNAL ALIEN TRIES TO TAKE HIS LIFE.

HALIFAX, January 31.—An Australian spy, interned in the military prison on Melville Island, made an unsuccessful attempt at committing suicide yesterday afternoon, by hanging himself in his cell. It was only through the prompt and efficient work of the medical men from the military hospital, that he did not succeed. He was a notorious character, brought here some time ago from Quebec. Yesterday afternoon he was found by some of the attendants, hanging by a strap from a projection or bar on the wall. He had taken a strap worn around his waist, and making a loop with the buckle, had fastened the other end to the wall and was slowly strangling. The military hospital was phoned and a doctor and orderly rushed out to the island. Artificial respiration and other methods of restoration were used, and the would-be suicide was brought to the station hospital. Ho

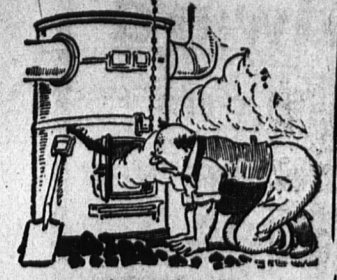

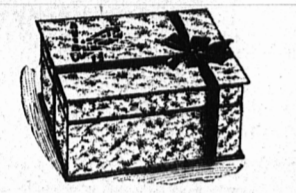
