The case turns upon the conditions under which Mrs. Stanaway was engaged or permitted to treat the patient. On the plaintiff's part it is contended that the plaintiff was to be paid if improvement was effected in the patient's condition as the result of treatment. On the part of the defence it is contended that the agreement was "no cure, no pay" and that little or no improvement was effected. There is also some conflict of testimony as to whether the patient was improved, and if so how much by the treatment. Mr. Paton had some time ago paid Mrs. Stanaway \$40. The amount sued for is \$500 less the above payment. The taking of evidence was concluded on Saturday and this morning the arguments of counsel will be heard.
