**RELIGIOUS STRIFE IN ENGLAND**

A tragic controversy arose in the first family of our race in which brother was arrayed against brother over the altar of religion, and religious strife has been the bane of every age since Adam dwelt in Eden. Just now England is becoming the scene of a bitter religious struggle. Sir William Harcourt, before his retirement from the Liberal leadership, had written a series of letters to the Times against Ritualism, Balfour, Conservative and nephew of Lord Salisbury, had propounded a scheme for state aid to a Catholic University to be established in Ireland. Probably both Harcourt and Balfour were sincere in their advocacy, but the animus of each was also largely political.

Sir William Harcourt naturally desires to please the Nonconformist and Low Church elements which together form so large a proportion of the Liberal electorate. Mr. Balfour is more than willing to make a further bid for Irish support, which, since the abandonment of Home Rule and the death of Mr. Gladstone has gravitated to the Tory standard. And although Mr. Balfour's proposal in regard to the Catholic university seems to have been rejected by the cabinet, the situation has developed an exciting "No Popery" cry.

An incident of the struggle was the great meeting in Albert Hall, noted in our despatches of ten days ago, where 10,000 people met to protest against Romanizing tendencies in the Church of England, cheered wildly for Harcourt and Kensit and savagely hissed the Archbishop of York and Canterbury. Kensit is the man, by the way, who goes about interrupting Ritualistic services. Attacks upon Balfour have been also frequent and strong, in which Rev. Hugh Price Hughes, the well-known Methodist divine and leader has taken a share.

Now we are told in a cable letter that Lord Halifax, leader of the Ritualists, who within a few years made a strong effort to induce the Pope to recognize the validity of Anglican orders, declares that there are a thousand clergymen of the Church of England who will never abandon Ritualism, no matter how strongly they may be enjoined to do so. Moreover the Ritualists have announced their intention to vote against any member of parliament of whatever party who has shown sympathy with the attempt to enforce the principles of the reformation upon the church of England. They claim they are strong enough to control fifty-seven parliamentary seats. It is not a pleasing prospect to contemplate, but the Mother Country seems face to face with an angry sectarian struggle.

And now Japan is preparing to assert herself as an industrial member of the family of nations by holding an international exhibition in 1902.

In New Brunswick there are now full government tickets in every constituency, and opposition tickets in all but four—Restigouche, Gloucester and Madawaska.

**BORN.**

At New Haven, January 26 h. '99, to Mr. and Mrs. Robert R. Frizzle, a daughter.

Prince Alfred of Saxe Coburg, whose death was announced a few days since, was the only son and heir of the Queen's second son, the Duke of Edinburgh. A consequence of his death is that the Duke of Connaught, third son of the Queen, becomes heir to the reigning dukedom of Saxe Coburg. But as the Duke of Connaught had chosen a military career with an aspiration to become commander in chief of the British army, he will have to choose between this and reigning as a petty German sovereign. Should he decide to remain an Englishman he will resign the Saxe Coburg succession in favor of his eldest son, Prince Arthur. The duchy has an area of 755 square miles, about one third the size of P. E. Island, and a population of about 210,000.

From Indiana comes an exposure of the latest trick in circumventing the secrecy of the ballot. The trouble with the briber has always been to make sure that the bribed voter marked his ballot in the manner he promised. At length a plan was hit upon that worked admirably. Each voter was furnished with a ballot paper which was a facsimile of the real ballot. With this he was given a piece of carbonised paper of the same size and shape. When the voter went into the booth to mark his ballot he placed the bogus ballot underneath the real ballot, with the carbonised paper between them and then marked the ballot in the usual way. By means of the carbonised paper the bogus ballot was marked in precisely the same spot as the real ballot. The voter carried the bogus ballot thus marked to the briber, and on this conclusive evidence received his bribe.

Spain has probably got the best of the bargain in selling her title to the Philippines for \$20,000,000. She never had full possession of the islands, and at the time when the war with the United States broke out had only a few ports and cities with but very little of the country behind them under her control. For years Spain's war outlay in the Philippine group had been far in excess of any receipts therefrom, and the experience of the Washington government for years to come will be much the same. The Filipinos are in possession, and it may be, and probably will be cheaper to buy them out than to conquer them. Possibly Aguinaldo may reduce his demands with something of the same facility that Gomez in Cuba dropped from sixty millions to three millions.

An Ottawa despatch to the Halifax Chronicle, which is not improbably inspired, speaks the extension of Governor Howland's term and has the following to say in regard to his probable successor:

The question of his successor is now a live one. Already the name of one gentleman, Hon. Daniel Davies, uncle of Sir Louis, has been prominently brought forward. The question is by no means settled. Mr. Davies would fill the office with dignity. The other possibilities are Hon. Donald Farquharson, premier of Prince Edward Island, and Dr. McIntyre, ex-M.P. One of the three will likely receive the appointment. Mr. Davies is an Englishman and a member of the Church of England. Mr. Farquharson is of Scotch descent and a Presbyterian, and Dr. McIntyre is of Scotch descent and a Roman Catholic. As the present incumbent is a Roman Catholic the chances of Dr. McIntyre may not be as good as the others.

**ACADIAN MAY BE FLOATED.**

SYDNEY, February 7.—The steamer Acadian, Captain Couillard, ran ashore Sunday evening, while entering Louisbourg. The vessel struck on Mad Mo and drifted off and grounded on a rocky shoal. There is fifteen feet of water in the hold. If the wind continues off shore she may be floated. W. H. Dobell & Co., Quebec, Archibald, North Sydney; Charles Archibald, Halifax, and Captain Couillard, are the owners. No insurance.
