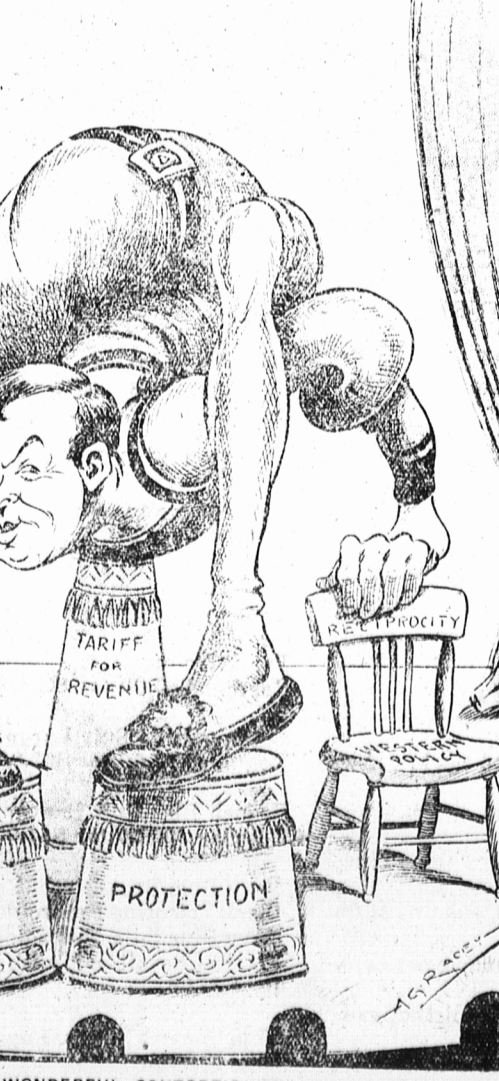
AMERICA FLOATS CHINESE LOAN

Fears Expressed on Irish Settlement

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Nov. 24.—The negotiation for an Irish settlement are feared to be nearing an unfavorable end according to a high authority today and there is apprehension that next week may witness their collapse unless more favorable circumstances now unforeseen should develop. It is stated that Clarendon is no longer presenting the sole obstacle but that Sinn Fein has refused to accept allegiance to the King although willing to take the oath to an Irish constitution. Furthermore an equally important factor is the fact that the Sinn Fein will not agree to a vote of Irish legislation by the British Crown. The Sinn Fein idea is said to be a completely independent Irish state although loosely connected with the other states in the Empire. Acts of parliament creating British Dominions give the King the power of assent to all legislation but the Sinn Fein would not exercise this power. The Sinn Fein is declared to have made known its belief that a similar decision regarding Ireland would be a vote of Irish legislation by the British Cabinet. The Sinn Fein regards this as a difficulty as it is asserted that the Sinn Fein attitude regarding the negotiations is high quarters must come to an end.

Diamond Jubilee of Mgr. Dugald MacDonald

Mrs. Dugald MacDonald, the venerable and beloved pastor of St. Simon and Jude Church of Tignish, celebrated his diamond jubilee on Tuesday last when impressive and memorable services were carried out. At 7:30 Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by His Lordship, Rev. Dr. O'Leary, Bishop of Charlottetown, with Rev. Dr. Gauthier, Canon, Rev. T. Campbell, St. Deven, Mr. J. C. McLean, Macdonald, Master of Ceremonies, and a number of other clergymen in the Sanctuary. The spacious church was crowded with people. The sermons in English and French were preached by Rev. J. A. Macdonald, Grand River, and Rev. P. P. Arsenault of Mt. Carmel respectively. An address in English was read by Mr. John A. Hackett and one in French by Mr. J. J. Arsenault. Pious and fitting references were made to the long years of faithful and devoted services of Mgr. MacDonald his scholarly attainments, his unremitting care for the spiritual welfare of his people, and the affectionate relations between pastor and parishioners. Mgr. MacDonald was presented by the members of his congregation with a beautiful golden chalice, studded with diamonds, the presentation being made by the oldest parishioner, Urban Gallant, Sr., aged 99. The Monsignor who was depicted by the tokens of affection and esteem, expressed his gratitude in an appropriate and feeling way. At the close of the service, His Lordship the Bishop delivered from his pulpit a brief, effective, and happily worded address, summing up the sentiments, so admirably given expression to, in the congratulatory address from the people. In the afternoon a banquet was held in the Convention Hall, Rev. A. J. MacDonagh, assistant priest at Tignish, presided. An informal dinner was served, only the 100 guests included members of the clergy, the four laymen who were in attendance, Senator Murray, St. Charles, Dalton, A. J. McQueen, at Tignish, and Dr. W. J. P. MacPhail of Charlottetown. All of whom paid worthy tribute to the honored pastor of St. Simon and Jude.
