### MRS. JOHNSON IS STILL ON STAND IN DOWNING CASE.

HOPEWELL CAPE, A. C., April 13.—Mrs. Alice M. Johnson was on the stand all yesterday with the exception of a few hours in the morning. In the case against Jethro J. Downing, charged with attempted murder. Mrs. Johnson was on the stand Saturday and from present indications she will be under examination another day. The probabilities are that the Downing trial will not be finished before Wednesday night, and the case promises to be the longest trial in Albert since the Collins murder trial. The court opened at ten o'clock, pursuant to adjournment. For the first half hour the Committing Magistrate E. E. Peck, was on the stand and gave evidence regarding several letters which were produced in court in the case. At 10:30 Alice M. Johnson resumed her testimony and detailed the relations existing between her and the prisoner since early in the year 1913 down to September last. She was practically on the stand all day until 3:30 yesterday afternoon, when court adjourned until to-day at 10 o'clock. A large number were present from different sections of the country and great interest is taken in the case. It is thought that Mrs. Johnson will be on the stand at least a day to complete her testimony.

### CONCERT AT SOURIS.

On Easter Monday night the Souris Dramatic Club presented the comedy drama, "Eileen Oge." The play was a success financially, as well as otherwise, the sum of \$120 being realized for the Belgian Relief Fund. The following is the cast:—Patrick O'Donnell, an honest farmer—Mr. Geo. J. McQuaid; Mr. Moriarty, Eileen's husband—Mr. Hughbey; Bryan O'Donnell, O'Donnell's friend—Mr. E. F. Feehan; Henry Loftus, a wealthy young landlord—Mr. J. F. Sterns; Rev. F. Mahoney, parish priest—Mr. J. A. Campbell; McLean, Loftus' agent; Mr. J. D. McEachern; John Thomas, Loftus' servant—Mr. L. F. Paquet; Tim the penman, a slave to drink—Mr. J. H. Beatty; Mr. Nolan, guest—Mr. Frank Tierney; Mr. Officer—Mr. Carl McDonald; Policemen—Messrs. L. F. Marcou and J. J. Turnbull; Eileen Moriarty—Miss Corneila Paquet; O'Donnell's sister—Miss O'Donnell's sister—Miss Josie McQuaid; Bridget McGuire, Eileen's maid—Miss Agnes McInnis; Mrs. O'Donnell, O'Donnell's mother—Mrs. P. A. Scully; Stage manager, Mr. P. A. Scully; accompanist, Miss Mary McDonald; leader of orchestra, Mr. E. L. Wright; property man, Messrs. Arthur, F. Paquet and Angus Lavin. The first act opens with Bridget, a sprightly Irish maid, having a peppery confab with John Thomas, a cockney valet; they are rudely interrupted by the entrance of Henry Loftus, a brother of a boy, Bryan O'Donnell, and words both reveal that he and Bridget are lovers. O'Donnell is sorrowful on his wedding morning, for he has failed to get a renewal of the lease of his farm. He feels that he should not ask Eileen to marry him unless he is rich or poor and it is decided to proceed with the wedding. In his desperation to stop the marriage, McLean has Tim, the Penman to forge O'Donnell's name to a letter, wherein the life of the landlord is threatened if he fails to evict O'Donnell from his farm; for writing this letter O'Donnell is arrested on his way to the church. He is convicted and transported for life. Five years afterwards Mr. Moriarty was financially ruined and in arrears for rent to Henry Loftus, who eagerly seeks the hand of his daughter. A warrant to detain on Mr. Moriarty's crops is issued. As the officers attempt to seize the hay a fight takes place in which Moriarty's men come off victorious. Eileen, although she still loves O'Donnell, decides to give Loftus hopes that she will wed him. In the meantime O'Donnell has returned, and in fear of being found out, wears a disguise and frequents an old water mill, which is supposed to be haunted. A letter O'Donnell had written to his sister falls into the hands of McLean and reveals the secret. O'Donnell and Bryan accidentally meet and go to the old mill, where O'Donnell is to meet his sister Nora. Shortly after Bryan leaves, O'Donnell is assaulted by McLean, overpowered and thrown into the stream. Just as Nora appears, McLean seizes her, they struggle, Bryan hearing the noise suddenly returns and drops McLean by a pistol shot. He is carried to an hospital and recovers. As he is about to leave the country, he is arrested on the charge of attempting to murder O'Donnell and is lodged in jail to keep company with his associate, Tim, the Penman. 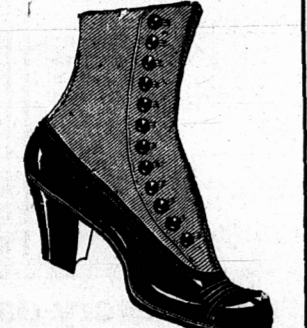
