NEW ARRANGEMENT BETWEEN THE STATES AND CANADIAN GOVTS.

Passage of U.S. Seaman's Bill Followed by Recognition of Canadian Able Seamen's Certificates.

(From Our Own Correspondent.) OTTAWA, June 22.—The passage of the seaman's bill by the United States Congress has been followed by a new arrangement between the Canadian and United States authorities regarding the treatment of Canadian shipping in United States ports.

ARABIAN REVOLT AGAINST THE TURKS

Holy City of Mecca Captured by the Arabs Who Denounce the Turks as Vassals of Germany.

LONDON, June 22.—Reports have been received here that a serious uprising against the Turks is in progress in Arabia and that the rebels have captured the Holy City of Mecca. The London newspapers declare that the rebellion is certain to have an important bearing on the war, especially as regards the participation of Turkey.

GREECE HAS ACCEPTED UNCONDITIONALLY THE DEMANDS MADE BY THE ALLIES

ATHENS, June 21.—Greece has accepted unconditionally the demands made by the Entente powers. This decision was communicated to the French legation by M. Zaimis, the former Premier, to whom the formation of a cabinet is reported to have been entrusted.

NOTHING BUT A MIRACLE CAN SAVE AUSTRIAN ARMY

Russians have Captured Radutz, 30 Miles South of Czernowitz and 10 Miles from Roumania Border, Holding Stretch of 20 Miles on Sereth River. An Austrian Army Shut Up in Angle of Frontier Completely Surrounded by Russians.

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, June 22.—An official announcement by the Russian war office of the capture of Radutz, a town of 13,000 inhabitants, situated 30 miles south of Czernowitz, and ten miles from the Roumanian frontier, shows how actively General Letchitzky is pursuing the broken Austrian forces.

AMERICANS AND MEXICANS IN A SERIOUS CLASH

American Cavalry Clashed with Carranza's Forces, Both Sides Suffering Heavy Casualties. 12 Americans Officially Reported Killed, Besides 17 Taken Prisoners. Incident Likely to Precipitate Immediate War.

EI PASO, TEXAS, June 22.—A detachment of American cavalry clashed with Carranza forces at Carrizal, about ninety miles south of El Paso, early yesterday, according to unofficial reports received by Mexican military authorities in Juarez tonight.

MORE ISLANDERS KILLED AND WOUNDED

Two more brave sons of Prince Edward Island have made the supreme sacrifice on behalf of the Empire and liberty. The sad news was received that Archibald Campbell of Long River, and George A. Campbell of Cape Traverse had been killed in action in France.

STILL FIGHTING IN VERDUN SECTOR

LONDON, June 22.—On both sides of the Meuse in the region of Verdun and to the east the Germans are heavily bombing the French. There were heavy attacks against Hill 304 and Le Mort Homme north west of Verdun and north east of the fortress around Thiaumont, Vaux road, Chapitre and Fort Lauffes.

SIR DOUGLAS HAIG COMPLIMENTED THE P.E.I. HEAVY ARTILLERY

Artillery Boys in Action Have Made a Name for Themselves. Forty-eight Hours Under a Hail of Shells

A letter from a member of No. 2 H. Artillery dated Belgium, May 6th, received in Charlottetown a few days ago, has some interesting things to say about the Island Battery as the following extracts will show:— "Well, I must tell you something about the Battery. Barziz none, we are the best battery in Belgium to-day. Everybody knows his work and does it like a man. You can certainly be proud of the boys that left the Island, for they have proved themselves time and again, and never better than in our last bombardment when they worked for forty-eight hours under a perfect hail of shells—gunners to their guns and the drivers to their teams with ammunition.
