## Splendid Meeting Held at Kinkora

(Continued from Page One.)

A reference to the matter of mud in which Mr. Bell imagined he had discovered a mare's nest, Mr. Myers asked if that gentleman knew that the people of Prince County had sent a petition to the late government asking to have mud raised from Richmond Bay. A survey had already been made, and steps taken for a railway line there. The whole of the bay, he understood, was available for the purpose, with perhaps the exception of that part owned by Mr. Bell himself. Mr. Bell had found great fault that we had only expended half the amount of the \$5,000 grant for seed grain. Our people are frugal and it was to their credit that we had our own seed and were independent of the Dominion Government in this respect.

In reference to the question of teachers' salaries, when the Dairy men's Association and other bodies passed a vote in favor of raising salary for them, Mr. Lea had then said to go ahead. Mr. Myers replied effectively to the various other arguments put up by the Opposition candidates to show why the Government should be deprived of office and shattered each in turn with ease. He was loudly applauded at the close of his address.

Premier Arsenault, next called on received loud and hearty applause as he came forward.

After dealing with the criticism offered by the Opposition, the Premier pointed out that this was simply a political game, that he proposed speaking to the people on a higher plane and did not intend, like the Liberals, to appeal to their passions and prejudices but rather to their common sense.

He then went on to show that the growth of the province was stunted in 1912, owing to insufficient revenue, that when the Conservatives came in they immediately formulated, presented and pressed the claims of the province for an increased subsidy, claims which for twenty years previously had been dangled before the people as an election bait, but had been entirely neglected by the then government in power.

After having these claims recognized, additional subsidy attained, the province was placed in a position to enter, on a period of progress and development. Forty thousand dollars additional a year was paid towards education, an average of fifty thousand a year was expended on permanent public works including steel bridges, and the yearly recurring deficits were stopped.

The war, however, broke out, prices went up, and the value of the dollar as compared before the war, fell to less than fifty cents; so that the present revenue of about \$50,000,000 really worked less in purchasing power than the revenue which the Liberal had in 1910 and 1911.

If the province is to take advantage of the road grant offered by the Dominion, said the Premier, it must have more money added to the revenue. The money is due the province by the Dominion.

The present Liberal-Conservative party is the one that has already to be named, presented and pressed these claims with success. It is the same party that also obtained the C. P. Ferry, the docks at Tormentine in Borden, built at an expense of two million three hundred and forty million dollars, which has obtained the standardization of our railway, it is the party which is familiar with all these matters.

Is it not then reasonable to suppose, continued the Premier, that the people continue their confidence in this party and in the men at the head of it, that they can best have our claims recognized and obtain the measure of subsidy necessary to our provincial existence, our progress and our development?

The people should look at the larger issues. In 1915 a campaign of criticism was made by the Liberal with the object of drawing the attention of the electors away from the good things done. It had its effect and the government was returned with a largely reduced majority. The cabinet at Ottawa came to the conclusion that after all the people of P. E. Island did not want the things that had been done for them since they nearly turned out of power the men who had obtained them.

The same campaign of criticism and misrepresentation is being carried on in the present election. Let the people make no mistake. The Government needs the same strong backing from the people that they had in 1912 in order to stand on its hands in the pressing fight for our just rights with the federal authorities.

Let the people speak. On their verdict depends whether we will give our rights or whether we will have to go on living from hand to mouth as far as provincial affairs are concerned.

The Premier ended by saying if he had full confidence that the people would trust those men who had already accomplished so much in the way of having our claims recognized rather than the men who for so many years talked and dangled our claims before the people and did absolutely nothing towards having them recognized.

## Inter-Church Forward Movement

### Large and Enthusiastic Attendance at Inaugural Meetings.

The Inter Church Forward Movement was inaugurated here yesterday at gatherings which were influential and enthusiastic and which were representative of the whole province and of all the churches which are concerned.

The opening meeting was held in the hall of Zion Church under the presidency of Rev. H. D. Raymond of St. Paul's Church and was attended by members of the Anglican, Methodist, Baptist and Presbyterian communities. After devotional exercises the chairman explained the object of the meeting and called upon the Archbishop of the Diocese to introduce the subject of the "Forward Movement" and the relation of the churches to the same. His Grace then in clear and forcible terms spoke of the great need of the churches since organized for the betterment of the national life. It was imperative that the spirit of sacrifice which was so nobly displayed by all during the years of warfare should be perpetuated for the uplift of the people. For this reason a movement had arisen in the various churches whose object was primarily an extension of the Kingdom of God, his could only be brought about by greater consecration to the aims and ends of the Kingdom as set forth by the great King and Head of a church.—The Lord Jesus Christ, made a touching appeal for personal effort and for the manifestation of that co-operation and unity of spirit which were easily possible in the working out of this great theme for the utilization of the Christian forces of this country.

The Rev. D. G. Cook, a missionary from a furlough from India was the next speaker. He outlined the history of the movement, showing how the great denominations had, with a marvelous spontaneity, reached the same conclusion, namely that our splendid contribution to the war and our magnificent victory should be marked by a re-dedication of life that would express itself in a way that would appeal to all nationalities and would result in placing Christianity where it ought to be in the hearts of mankind. Mr. Cook frequently dwelt on the needs of humanity and of the ability of the churches to meet such needs if each individual would only rise to the occasion which this great "Forward Movement" brought within reach of all who had an interest in the propagation of the gospel.

Rev. G. F. McL. Smith then spoke plainly that he was the Inter-Church organizer in New Brunswick and was present owing to the inability of the National Organizer—Mr. A. Warburton of Toronto to attend. Mr. Smith emphasized the optimistic note so ably sounded by the other speakers and made an effective appeal for the rebuilding of the family altar in the homes in Canada.

He outlined the programme of the participating churches, laying stress on the spiritual aspect of the movement as being the thing of essential importance. He gave direction as to the various committees and the work that would fall to them in presenting the movement to a successful termination.

A large committee was appointed to nominate a provincial executive for submission to the evening meeting. The executives will be composed of the clergy and ten laymen from each of the denominations participating.

### Evening Meeting

The evening meeting was presided over by Rev. G. C. Taylor who, after devotional exercises made a few appropriate remarks and to the meeting of the gathering and called upon His Grace the Archbishop of Nova Scotia to address the meeting.

The Archbishop congratulated the audience on its size and rejoiced in the purpose which had brought them together. He emphasized the thought that no man liveth unto himself, and that one dynamic which lifts the individual and the nation out of selfishness, is what the old Hebrew called the "fear of God" and what we designate faith in Jesus Christ. There is a part in this great work for all and until we attain that union which will eventually be realized in the one great church we must co-operate for the common advantage of the church and state. The church is a great adventure for the extension of the Kingdom of God in our own and in other lands.

His Grace then made an eloquent and touching appeal to the power of the Cross and called upon all to make the Cross a reality in their lives for the sake of mankind.

He was followed by Rev. Mr. Cook who related many experiences from his mission field of far off India. Rev. Mr. Cook told his story in a most fascinating way and showed that the opportunities for the extension of the Christian cause were never as numerous as they are today.
