A very pretty wedding took place at the home of John A. and Mrs. Bruce, Kingsboro, Lot 47, on Wednesday, October 18th, when their daughter Georgia became the bride of James W. Jardine, also of Kingsboro, the ceremony being performed by Rev. G. F. Camp, pastor of the Kingsboro Baptist Church. The parlor was most attractively decorated for the occasion. The bride, who was very becomingly attired in a blue tailored suit trimmed with cream satin, and cream silk overlace, entered the parlor leaning on the arm of her father, while the wedding march was rendered by Mrs. G. F. Camp. Both parties were unattended and the ceremony was performed in the presence of about fifty invited guests. Immediately after the ceremony a bounteous wedding supper was served. Mr. and Mrs. Jardine are both widely and favorably known and their popularity was amply attested to in the numerous useful and valuable gifts of which they were the recipients. The groom's gift to the bride was a beautiful muff. The Guardian joins with the many friends of the contracting parties in extending best wishes to the newly wedded couple.

The funeral of the late Mrs. J. M. Clark, which took place yesterday at the Casumpec Methodist Cemetery, was very largely attended, people coming from all parts to pay the last tribute of respect to the deceased who was held in very high esteem in that section of the province. The services were conducted by Rev. J. A. Winfield, Episcopal Clergyman at Alberton, assisted by Rev. Mr. Strathie, Methodist pastor. His Honor Lieutenant Governor Rogers and three brothers of the deceased, Dr. George A. Warburton, Dr. James Warburton and A. B. Warburton of Charlottetown, were present, also the only surviving sister, Mrs. R. B. Stuart of Stratgartney and her son Allan Stuart. The late Mrs. Clark leaves one son J. W. Clark at home. Her husband died several years ago. The death of Mrs. Clark will recall a very extraordinary and almost tragic circumstance in connection with the shipping on the Island. When a very young woman, she visited friends in Ireland and took passage to return on the ship "Majestic" owned by Hon W. W. Lord. The ship caught fire at sea and the men gallantly fought the fire for forty-eight hours when they were rescued by a Cunard Line steamer, which owing to some cause or other had been driven considerably out of her course. The late Captain Cameron, subsequently Captain of the S. S. Northumberland was also on board at the time. The loss of the "Majestic" was quite an event at the time, owing to the courage displayed by some of the officers and by the late Mrs. Clark, then Miss Warburton, who was given in charge of the stores served out to the men working on the burning ship. The Majestic after being abandoned, burned to the water's edge. The English papers and even those of New Zealand and other parts of the Empire contained eulogistic references to the event. Old men today will remember the incident although it may not be familiar to the present generation.

The funeral of the late Walter McDonald, Summerside, took place yesterday morning at 9.30 a. m. The remains were taken to St. Paul's Church where Rev. F. Monaghan, officiated at a Requiem High Mass. The body was then taken to Grand River for interment. The Summerside Labor Union, of which the deceased was a member, marched in a body to the church. The pallbearers were: Ernest Palmer, Semour Fanning, David Grady Fiddell, Gallant, Moses Blaquiere and Andrew Blaquiere.—S.

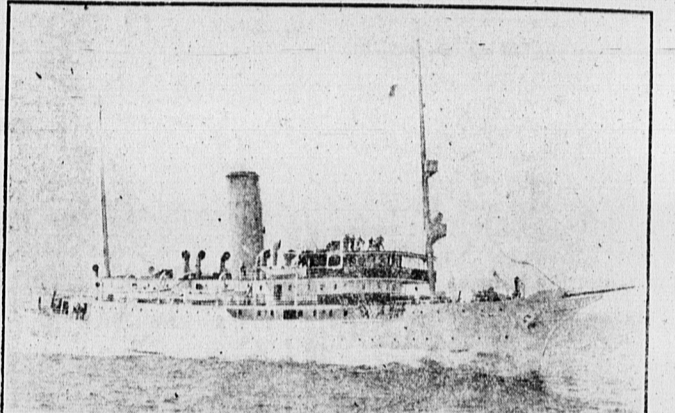

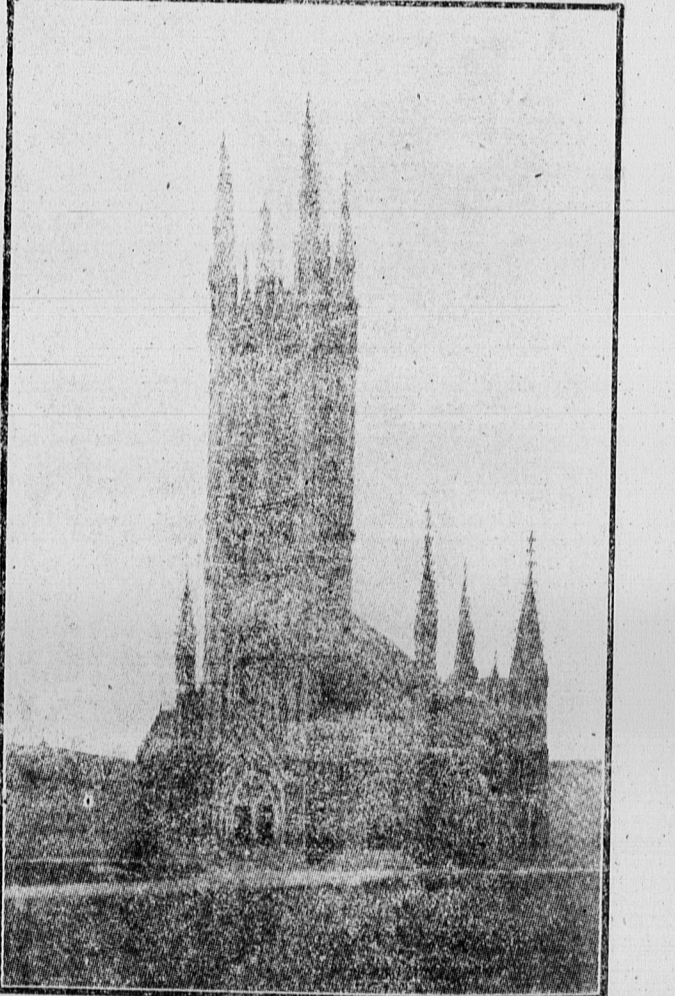
