THE SUMMERSIDE COUNCIL

Pass Resolution Requesting Citizens to Observe Saturday.

HOLIDAY AS TRIBUTE OF RESPECT TO QUEEN

Market Hall Granted for a Memorial Service.—The Dog Poisoning Affair Discussed and an Investigation Will be Made—A Mass Meeting of the Children of the Schools on Friday—Death of Dr. Black.

On Sunday last in St. Mark's Church previous to the memorial service the Rev. I. S. Winfield preached a sermon on behalf of the P. E. I. Hospital, taking for his text John. 5: 6. Wilt thou be made whole? The preacher said: When man came from the hands of his Creator he knew no ills or sickness. And the fact of nature fighting against sickness and our aversion to it demonstrates that this body was never intended to be sick. But by the fall of man came death, preceded by sickness. Without doubt intended and personal sin is responsible for all the suffering of humanity. And in the case of the impotent man Jesus said "Sin no more lest a worse thing come upon thee." For many centuries man suffered and had to bear his sufferings with but little sympathy. But the dawning of Christianity brought a revolution in the teaching by the Church of God, of the brotherhood of man and his practical application of the same infused new feelings and desires in the human race with the result that men commenced to devise means whereby they could ameliorate the sufferings of their brethren. The mantle of Christ's sympathy fell on the Christian Church with the great results that we see to-day. The love and care for the sick and suffering is the direct offspring of Christianity. Christianity studies to economise human suffering and this is seen in the magnificent buildings and institutions in our midst. Mr. Winfield then dwelt on the great London hospitals where he had visited. Also the P. E. I. Hospital, which he had also visited. He also paid a glowing tribute to the medical profession, quoting instances of wonderful courage and heroism displayed by doctors. In fact every doctor is a hero, and heroism but a glorious concentration of courage. The reverend gentleman also spoke of the qualities of the staff of the P. E. I. Hospital and said that something more than care was displayed here. He believed that all were actuated by a motive from a Divine source. The reverend gentleman also quoted from the report, and stated that the percentage of clever men was very high. This in itself spoke volumes, and he hoped all present would do all that lay in their power to promote the interest and welfare of this noble institution, of which Islanders should be proud. The impotent man in reply to Christ said:—"I have no man to put me in the healing stream." Brethren, let not that be said to-day. But by your liberal offerings to-day you all may assist in putting the sick in the way of healing. A collection for the Hospital was taken up at the close of the service.

A special meeting of the town council was held last night. A resolution was passed that citizens of Summerside be requested to observe Saturday the 2nd day of February as a public holiday as a tribute of respect in memory of Her Late Majesty Queen Victoria.

On motion the market hall was granted to any denomination or union of denominations to hold a public memorial meeting on Saturday next. The dog poisoning scare was brought up and a motion passed to the effect that the police be instructed to make inquiries into the matter and find out if possible who has bought poison during the past few months.

On motion it was decided to pay off the amount of \$500 loan to Mr. P. Brown and secure a deed of property also \$1,500 of the current account to the town's credit at the bank he put on special deposit to bear interest.
