Feeding silage of this quality will increase the amount of protein fed in the form of roughage and consequently reduce the percentage of this nutrient required in the meal. Clover silage may be substituted for hay up to one-half of the quantity fed, allowing three pounds of silage for one pound of dry roughage replaced.

(Experimental Farm News) The use of clover silage as a feed for dairy cattle has resulted from a study of the effect of winter feeding material compared to grain pasturage. Clover silage was found to be a valuable feed for dairy cattle. It is high in protein and contains a high percentage of water-soluble carbohydrates. It is also high in fiber and is well liked by the cattle. The study showed that clover silage is a valuable feed for dairy cattle and should be used in winter feeding programs.

Following is a copy of a letter received by Mrs. Daniel Bradley regarding the death of her brother, Corporal Francis MacEachern.

"Dear Mrs. Bradley: I am very sorry to have to write you regarding your brother who I and the boys knew as 'Wackie' that was his nickname and he was an inspiration to the men in my platoon.

I met 'Wackie' when I first came to the company about three months ago and through the following six weeks had promoted him to platoon sergeant which was his position when we lost him.

He was an admirable and outstanding N.C.O. and well on his way to success in my estimation and that of Major Jones.

I would like to say that if it had not been for 'Wackie' I did not suffer and never knew what happened that the purpose of my writing is accomplished and I do believe that you can be very proud of him as he had campaigned ever since Sicily and through unfortunate and had luck through some miserable days to put through. He surmounted all this and as I have already said turned out to be one of the finest N.C.O. in the West Nova Scotia Regiment.

We are all proud of him and the boys still are in writing you to let you know that he did such a fine job.

If there is anything I can do for you please do not hesitate to call on me and just as soon as I know where he is buried I will let you know at the earliest opportunity. I am sure that you will be proud of him and I believe that is where he is now. Very best and kindest regards.
